

## LOVIN' LIMA ~ THE LIMA SANDWICH SHOP Part 2

**RESET** - Last week we told you about our attendance at the joint meeting of the Lima Town and Village Boards where we informed them of the details of this "Lovin' Lima" series we have been publishing. One comment Supervisor Mike Falk shared with us at that meeting was that we should definitely talk with longtime Lima resident, Dennis Lakis. So we put that on the back burner of our to-do list.

**CHANCE MEETING** - Back in Lima the next week, we are leaving a meeting with Mike Falk at the Town Hall, and heading for the American Hotel. As soon as we hit Main Street we notice a man on the other side of the road who is walking in the opposite direction, but obviously staring across the street at us.

That is not a particularly unusual experience because many people recognize us from seeing our picture in the paper, but we do not recognize this gentleman. So, there's a short moment of uncertainty where we're not quite sure in which direction this encounter is going to go.

But then the man stops, turns around, starts walking in the same direction as us while continuing to maintain eye contact. So, at this point it becomes obvious that we are about to make a new friend. We initiate the direct contact by crossing the street whereupon approaching the man, he looks at us and says, "I know you from somewhere, don't I?"

At this point we're not sure, but in similar situations Deb usually leads with, "Well, we write a weekly feature for the *Sentinel*..." and before she can finish her sentence he says, "That's it; I read your stories every week."

Deb confirms, "Yep, we are Deb and Tim Smith."

**HELLO, IT'S ME** - At that point he says, "Let me introduce myself; I'm Dennis Lakis." So, it turns out to be

one of those more memorable moments that have manifested themselves in our *Sentinel* sojourn. What are the odds?

So now that we've shared the details of this fateful rendezvous we should probably circle back and also share the backstory on why Dennis Lakis' name would float off the lips of the Town Supervisor as a local legend. We'll also preface this teaser with the fact that Deb has a connection card in her back pocket which she will soon be able to play.

The Lakis family has been ensconced in the fabric of Lima history for over a century now. The family owned and operated a diner on East Main Street for over six decades. When Deb was a kid, it was to this establishment that her mom Jackie Gonyea made milk shake missions family traditions.

**MY FAVORITE GREEK WEDDING** - The Lakis family emigrated from Greece to America in the early 1900's. In 1915 Dennis' grandparents Paris and Adamantia moved to Lima, bought the building which is located four establishments east of the corner from where the American Hotel stands. They moved into the second floor and opened up a diner on the first floor. This year also happened to be the year Dennis' father was born.

The eatery originally opened with a name you have to love... it was the Lima Candy Kitchen. Almost makes your mouth start to water before you've placed your first order.

After WWII, perhaps reflecting more series times, the restaurant renamed itself with the more purposefully descriptive moniker of the Lima Sandwich Shop. It was during this era that Dennis' parents, Peter and

Ann Lakis took over the business.

On one of the main thoroughfares of the Crossroads of Western New York, the Lima Sandwich Shop would thrive for decades to come. Featuring fan favorites such as the house specialty barbecue sandwich, and chocolate milk shakes using homemade ice cream, the Lakis family continued to serve Lima.

**END OF THE TRAIL** - But the times, they were a-changin'. By the late 1970's Peter and Ann were nearing retirement and their son Dennis, who was working at Kodak came to the realization that his gig was better than theirs. As he worded it to us, "I just didn't want to work that hard. My parents worked all day long every day

and I knew that wasn't for me."

The figurative flag of the Lima Sandwich Shop was last lowered in 1981. That was the year the Lakis family eatery closed its doors after operating continuously since 1915. The family tradition has been continued in the sense that if you call the phone number for 7310 East Main Street, the message you will hear from Dennis on the answering machine still rewards you with the acknowledgment that you have reached the Lakis residence. Old Lakis legends die hard.

### From Honeoye Falls-Town of Mendon Historical Society President Drew Saur

#### HF-M Historical Society hoping to re-start programs in the Fall

To our dear Town & Village Residents:

The Honeoye Falls-Town of Mendon Historical Society has missed seeing so many of you since our health crisis began over three months ago.

First off, we've had to cancel the last two monthly programs of our Spring calendar:

"The 50th Anniversary of the Honeoye Falls-Lima School Merger" by Tim & Deb Smith, Authors, *Mendon-Honeoye Falls-Lima Sentinel*; and "A Historical Account of the Creation of the Lehigh Valley Trail" by John Farrell & Arlene Cluff, Directors, Mendon Foundation.

The good news is that both presenter groups have graciously agreed to reschedule their presentations for the 2020-2021 program season.

At our recent Trustees meeting, which was held via Zoom on June 3rd, our Trustees agreed to attempt to hold our Fall meetings as originally scheduled. Our recent attendance levels have been low enough so that we feel we can keep satisfactory social distancing practices in place, with good airflow, at our September meeting. This presentation, currently planned for Thursday, September 10, 2020, will be "The Rochester Subway" by Jim Dierks, Trustee, New York Museum of Transportation. This special event, which was coordinated with the Town of Rush, is scheduled to take place at the William Udicious Pavilion, 1900 Rush Scottsville Rd, Rush, NY 14543. However, since the virus and the social situation surrounding it are admittedly unpredictable, we will be keeping our

eyes on things and will clarify plans as we inch closer toward September.

Secondly, our Museum has been closed for the longest period on record. Our Museum at Harry Allen Park is a source of considerable pride for our community. It houses countless items that we put on rotating display for all to enjoy. Behind the scenes, our volunteers have been taking turns working solo on-premise for the past few months. Interim Curator Bill Lane, Vice President Charles Woolever, Trustee and Conservator Gary Albright, and long-time volunteer Kathy Eastman have all been organizing, cleaning, reducing clutter, and increasing exhibit focus on the main floor as well as in the archival collections. We have done similar work in the Schoolhouse in Harry Allen Park as well.

We have been issuing updates via our website (<http://hfmhistorical.org/>) and taking questions via Facebook (<https://www.facebook.com/hftmhs/>), but we are eager to open to the public when we can.

The substantial knowledge wisdom of our docents comes with life experience that unfortunately puts them in the "at risk" category, and we need to implement safeguards to protect them as well as potential visitors when we resume our normal Sunday hours of 2PM-4PM. We anticipate limiting visitors to no more than one family or two couples at a time, and we will enforce sign-ins (as we always have) as well as requiring masks and social distancing protocols. Our Museum operation falls under "phase 4" of the New York



State Guidelines, and we are awaiting clarity from the resources located at <https://www.businessexpress.ny.gov/app/nyforward> before we finalize our plans.

If you haven't visited our Museum before, please think about putting it on your plans for later this summer when (we hope and plan!) it reopens.

As we do reopen, we hope to ramp up interest in Society memberships, which have plateaued for the last few years, and we will also start developing a new generation of Museum volunteers and docents to drive us into the future. More on that in our next column. In the meanwhile, if you have questions about anything related to our local history, please feel free to call me at 624-5148, and I will either answer your question, or I will direct you to people who can. We are here to serve, whether we are physically open or not!

# You'll Turn to Stone Once You Realize Your Sales Pitch Inadvertently Contains this Common Mistake

You're always selling. You may not consider it as "selling," but you're always trying to convince someone to do something.

It doesn't have to be about trying to get someone to buy something from you or your company. It could be anything. Maybe it's what to have for dinner. Maybe it's what movie to watch? Maybe it's swaying your boss to give you a raise.

Do you find your pitch is less persuasive than you hoped for? You could be making a common mistake without knowing it. What is that common mistake and how can you avoid it? Perhaps we should start with a metaphor.

Have you ever been to the Petrified Forest?

No, I'm not referring to the 1936 movie *The Petrified Forest*, starring Leslie Howard and Bette Davis, which also featured Humphrey Bogart when he was still cutting his chops playing the villain. Such was Bogey's performance on the undercard that the American Film Institute included his character Duke Mantee among the nominees of the greatest heroes and villains of all time. (That AFI groups heroes and villains on the same list should tell you a lot about moral relativism in modern times.)

The "Petrified Forest" I'm referring to is the same setting of the film by the same name. It's a National Park located on the border of Navajo and Apache counties in the northeastern quadrant of Arizona. Scattered among the colorful but eerie badlands lay fossilized conifers and pine trees dating back to the Triassic Era some 160 million years ago.

Oddly, unlike their contemporary peers, these trees did not turn to coal. The rivers that carried them once they fell (likely due to natural causes) allowed them to settle into enveloping sediment. This wasn't ordinary silt. It represented the final resting place of the same volcanic ash spewed from ancient eruptions. The minerals from this ash not

only painted the surrounding landscape, its silica also provided the necessary ingredient to convert the tree into fossilized stone.

According to "A Brief Guide to the Petrified Forest National Monument Arizona" (United States Department of the Interior, September 1941), "in the process much silica was freed, leached out, and carried by underground waters into the logs. There, slowly, the silica was deposited, impregnating the wood and replacing the wood fiber until the pine logs became logs of stone... The great variety of red, brown, and yellow colors are usually produced by minute quantities of iron oxide stain in the silica, and similarly the black is produced by iron and manganese oxide pigment."

These beautiful rocks, once discovered, became attractive souvenirs.

Think about what that meant. As more people "harvested" these trees for their own rock collection, there'd be fewer and fewer samples for visitors to see. Eventually, the Petrified Forest would become nothing more than simply another painted desert. Theodore Roosevelt recognized this problem and declared the area as the "Petrified Forest National Monument" in 1906. (It would finally become a National Park in 1962.)

A 1953 booklet on the Petrified Forest National Monument issued by the National Park Service contained this warning:

"Please help to maintain and protect Petrified Forest National Monument by refraining from destroying or removing specimens of petrified wood (no matter how small the piece) or defacing or marking ruins, pictographs, petroglyphs, or other works of prehistoric man. If each of the hundreds of thousands of yearly visitors took pieces of petrified wood, there would soon be none left. Once removed, it is gone

forever—it cannot be replaced."

To emphasize the seriousness of this bad behavior, the pamphlet further threatened "to impose penalties of fines or imprisonment, or both." On a more positive

note, it did suggest "You may purchase petrified wood from the monument concessioner, who gets his supply from dealers handling wood obtained from private lands outside of the monument."

If you're seeing a kind of mixed message here, you aren't alone.

In his book *Yes! 50 Scientifically Proven Ways to Be Persuasive*, co-author Robert Cialdini, a renowned behavioral psychologist, describes an experiment he and his colleagues performed in conjunction with the Petrified Forest National Park.

It began when they heard a story about a park visitor. She noticed a sign in the park that read "Your heritage is being vandalized every day by theft losses of petrified wood of 14 tons a year, mostly a small piece at a time." Her immediate response was, "We'd better get ours now."

Think about what that sign just told the visitor. First, people are stealing petrified wood and apparently getting away with it. Second, it's a whole lot of petrified wood that's being stolen. Third, pretty soon, there won't be any petrified wood for visitors to see. Finally – and this is the really great part – it tells you exactly how to steal petrified wood and get away with it: "a small piece at a time."

Not very effective. In fact, Cialdini calls this "negative social proof." Think of "social proof" as a form of peer pressure.

Except it doesn't have to just be about pressure. It could also be a form of justification you use when you know you shouldn't

do something. It's what your mother warned you against. (You remember, "If all your friends jump in the lake, does that mean you should jump in the lake?") Face it, how many times have you

wanted to jump in the lake simply because all your friends are doing it. ("But, ma, everyone else is just fine when they do it!")

Well, according to Cialdini and friends, your mother was right. (Was there ever any

doubt?) His researchers put up two signs. One, like the original, reinforced negative social proof. The second sign, however, merely advised "Please don't remove the petrified wood from the park, in order to preserve the natural state of the Petrified Forest." (N.B.: This second sign uses another tactic Cialdini's research has shown to be effective, but that's beside the point.)

Under the negative social proof sign, people were nearly four times more likely to steal petrified wood versus the second sign. In addition, fewer people (by about half) stole the rock when reading the second sign versus seeing no sign at all.

What does this tell you? Your mother may have been right, but her persuasive pitch was wrong. The minute she says all your friends are doing it, she's inadvertently telling you it's OK for you to jump in the lake, too. That's not the message she wants to convey, but that's what you're hearing.

What's a better way for mom to communicate? She could say, "Johnny, who just flunked out of school, jumps in the lake. Billy, who never jumped in the lake, just got a college scholarship."

How does this work in the real world? Read any financial media and you'll certainly see a piece about the importance of saving for retirement. How many of those articles also include some sort of fact saying, "too few people are saving for retirement" and what does that tell you?

It tells you it's OK to jump in

the lake.

A better choice of words (and sources) would be to highlight that (rare) case where someone who didn't save enough is forced to live a sorry lifestyle in retirement. At the same time, the article can put the shine on multiple cases of those everyday "millionaires next door" who saved during a lifetime of work to live a retirement beyond their dreams.

That's just one example. Every industry, every organization, every cause, each has the opportunity to accidentally fall into the trap of reinforcing negative social proof.

How many times have you gone to church or received a plea from a non-profit saying "not enough people are donating?" Does that inspire you to give your money or does it make you think, "well, if everyone else is doing it...?"

How many times do you hear your boss complain that "too many people think they can arrive late to work or leave early from work?" Does that make you begin to wonder if it's also OK for you to start shaving a few extra minutes off your work hours?

And don't think you can get around negative social proof by spouting "the average" in hopes of boosting those performing below average. Cialdini calls this the "magnetic middle." His research (in looking at energy consumption) shows this approach has an unintended effect. Yes, it encouraged people who were below average to save more energy. At the same time, however, it also encouraged people who were above average to save less energy – to get closer to the average!

The lesson here is simple. If you want to convince someone to do what you want them to do – from buying more of the widgets you produce to working harder to supporting your charity – don't employ a pitch that reinforces negative social proof.

Or you can join the rest of your friends and jump in the lake.

## Supervisor Moffitt extends state of emergency

On June 8, Mendon Town Supervisor John Moffitt extended the Local State of Emergency which was originally declared on March 18. The declaration also directs that door-to-door solicitation of any type or purpose within the town is prohibited until further notice.

The text of the declaration is as follows:

WHEREAS, on June 8, 2020, I continued the Local State of Emergency in the Town of Mendon, originally declared on March 18, 2020; and

WHEREAS, both travel-related cases and community contact transmission of COVID-19 have been documented in New York State and are expected to continue;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, John D. Moffitt, Supervisor of the Town of Mendon, by virtue of the authority vested in me by Section 24 of Article 2B of the Executive Law of the State of New York, do hereby direct that door to door solicitation of any type and for any purpose in the Town of Mendon is hereby prohibited until further notice.

## Monroe County publicizing contact tracing

Monroe County is trying to make the public aware of the New York State Contact Tracing program.

As the state battled the coronavirus, tracing exposures to COVID-19 is important to stop the spread. The NYS Contact Tracing Program works with confirmed positive COVID-19 people to determine who they have been in contact with. Trained specialists reach out to those contacts about possible exposure. If you have been identified as a contact, you will get a call from "NYS Contact Tracing" (518-387-9993).

Because the disease can be transmitted without symptoms, notifying people about a possible exposure is critical to stop the spread. So, if you get a call from "NYS Contact Tracing" (518-387-9993), please answer the phone. It is confidential and private. As the state program's ads say: "You've stayed home! You're wearing masks! Now, answer the phone!"



## Revisiting HF Cemetery – Part II – Summer 2020

### The Evolution of a Small-Town Newspaper Column

Commencing with the June 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2004 edition of *The Sentinel*, a new era in local journalism was begun. Local history was delivered from the viewpoint of our community cemetery with “*News & Notes from HF (Community) Cemetery*” by P. J. Erbley (a nom de plume).

Except for a period from late June 2006 to late August 2006, a version of “*News & Notes*” has run continuously for nearly sixteen years... but with changes. In August 2007, the writer’s tenure as superintendent of Honeoye Falls Cemetery came to an end with my resignation. The column, however, lived on in a new format - actually three new formats.

The first dabbling was a spoof called “*News & Notes Goes to the Movies*,” in the August 23<sup>rd</sup> edition. That was followed by “*News & Notes On the Half-Shell*,” another spoof, based on a 1911 cookbook for the ladies of Lima Presbyterian Church. That took care of the editions of August 30<sup>th</sup> and September 6<sup>th</sup>, 2007. Then it phased into gathering local lore, with “*News & Notes from Local History*”... and a subsequent name adjustment to cover a wider territory, “*News & Notes from Hither and Yon*.”

Periodically ranging far afield, Honeoye Falls and towns/hamlets around are the usual backdrops for the protagonists in my stories. Ideas are on file, in the air and in the passing of every day. There’s a never-ending supply of material. It has been a fun ride so far. When they carry me out feet first, this *Sentinel* column may have come to an end.

The following begins the second summer of revisiting, in this case, the middle third of columns from “*News & Notes from HF (Community) Cemetery*.” Last year, the first third of the collection was presented - covering July 8<sup>th</sup>, 2004 through September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2005. This year of 2020 will present columns from September 8<sup>th</sup>, 2005 through November 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2006.

People were fearful of the Wild West atmosphere (that included killings in drunken rages), so a local temperance movement arose and led to a No Liquor License ordinance.


But Caswell skirted the issue and set up a revolving tray operated by a bartender hidden behind a curtain. A client approaching on the outside of the building, would place two bits coinage on the tray, which prompted a magical rotation that, in short order, slaked a teetotaler’s thirst.

Philip Caswell, for one, wanted us to be happy.

Mr. News & Notes won’t name names, but HF Cemetery has a displaced marker of a little boy with quite a family heritage.

Dad was one of America’s great entrepreneurs. Dad owned the largest farm in America at one time, a 40,000 acre spread south of Chicago. Dad owned the largest farm in New York State at the same time, 3,500 acres near Auburn. And Dad was the wealthiest businessman in Rochester in his heyday... when seed growing and innovative long-distance communication resulted in fabulous riches.

He wasn’t a pompous, selfish ogre either. His philanthropy in constructing learning centers at the U of R and Cornell University remains an everlasting tribute to his good will. And his spouse, Elizabeth, was of the same quality, for she saw to the erection of the Episcopal Church of North Adams, Massachusetts, the village of their nativity.

Back in the early days, however, when their talents had yet to reach fruition, their first born, Giles, failed to survive to his second birthday. As both of the parents’ families settled in these parts, Elizabeth’s family plot received his casket.

Over the decades, the gravestone was snapped at its base, and now leans forlornly against the family obelisk. Meanwhile, his parents and siblings moved on to success and status. Their impressive corner plot adorns one of the prettiest locales in Rochester’s Mount Hope Cemetery. Step across Mt. Hope’s cobbled drive and you’re at the gravesite of suffragette Susan B. Anthony... nearby are Messrs. Bausch and Lomb.

Our people in HF Cemetery may not be that famous, but the connections to fame and fortune are, in the case of little Giles, sadly evident.




The famed family plot at Mt. Hope Cemetery, Rochester, 2005.

“*Honeoyed*,” a proud tradition since 1838.

### Adelaide Hoyt Diary

(September 29<sup>th</sup>, 2005)

Historical snooping has many rewards... and coincidental discoveries. Take this item - a 1907 *Excelsior Diary*, kept by Adelaide E. Hoyt (1846-1917) of Honeoye Falls.

The reader must be persistent, since “*went to Gertie’s*” was penned with maddening regularity and there’s no shoot-em-up, Peyton Place stuff on a single daily entry. [Purchased on eBay, the only obscenity associated with this little reverse time-machine, was the auction price.]

Ms. Adelaide is nowhere to be found in HF Cemetery [it turns out, she was over to Mendon Cemetery], but numerous folk she mingled with are interred here in HF.

Max Ney, the harness-maker noted in this column in early August, was a



favorite notation. He's in an unmarked grave in Association Section D.


And the oft-visited Gertie (perhaps Addie's sister?) is attached to enough clues to make her Mrs. Warren Diver, who came to HF Cemetery (Section E) at age 93 in 1975. Warren preceded her in 1970. [Subsequent research pegged Gertie as Adelaide's daughter.]

The most coincidental items were the notes that Charles Hall was taken to Rochester July 8th, where he died on July 18th and the funeral followed on the 20th. He was 78 and interred in Old Association B.

Now, track down a copy of the freshly minted book, Around Mendon and Honeoye Falls, and turn to page 55. The top photograph is a fascinating scene within the burial grounds and it will get more ink at a later date.

It appears to be a Memorial Day... say about 1910. The crowd is gathered about the G. A. R. marker, the site where folks gathered when it was called Decoration Day.

Charles Hall is in that picture... but where? Do you see him? You won't. He's memorialized with a tombstone

## Livingston County Continues Advocacy for Equitable Federal Aid to Local Governments Impacted by COVID-19

Livingston County officials are continuing to advocate for federal appropriations to local governments to blunt the negative budgetary impacts caused by the COVID-19 global pandemic. County officials, led by Board of Supervisors Chairman and Avon Town Supervisor David L. LeFeber, have contacted the County's U.S. Senate and Congressional Delegation explaining the necessity of equitable federal funding.

A previous round of aid to local governments distributed by the federal government under the CARES Act's State Stabilization Fund was inequitable, according to County officials. This aid was directly appropriated only to local governments with a population of 500,000 or greater.

Livingston County and a majority of other counties and municipalities across the nation and New York State did not meet the onerous population requirement set by the Act. Instead, they were eligible to receive indirect, much smaller appropriations of aid distributed through the states.

"During this time of budgetary strain caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, it is important that all local governments are eligible to receive fiscal aid from the federal government," said LeFeber. "I have been in regular contact with the offices of Senators Charles Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand, along with that of Representative Tom Reed to highlight Livingston County's needs during this trying time. I will continue my advocacy efforts on behalf of the County for the quick adoption of a law to provide equitable federal aid to all local governments."

Two pieces of legislation have been introduced in the Congress to distribute federal aid to all counties regardless of population size. The HEROES Act, which has passed the U.S. House of Representatives, would distribute a portion of \$1 trillion to every county in the United States regardless of populations. The SMART Act, which has been introduced in both the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate, would distribute a portion of \$500 billion to all counties regardless of population size.

## Livingston County Plans for Sales Tax and State Aid Losses

Position Freezing, Furloughs and Cost Cuts Round out Response Measures

In response to both realized and expected losses of revenues from major impact areas like sales tax and state aid, Livingston County government has tightened its belt.

As COVID-19-related business impacts abound, the County is on pace to experience a significant loss in sales tax revenues. "Our largest revenue center is sales tax. Reports indicate we will be far off from our budget projections given the economic calamity statewide," stated County Administrator Ian M. Coyle. Losses of 10-25% are expected with corresponding dollar totals in the \$3.5 - \$8 MM range.

Additionally, Governor Andrew Cuomo is signaling his intent to cut State Aid, another major revenue center for the County, by up to 20%. "This number, if fully materialized, is around \$4-5 MM," stated Coyle.

The County, with excellent bond ratings and a healthy fund balance, is in a better position than many to withstand the pressures but difficult decisions have been made, with many more, draconian-level cuts pending State Aid discussions.

"We have furloughed employees and processed around \$2MM in budget cuts to the 2020 adopted budget. These efforts, coupled with some surpluses in departments and one-time revenue uses will allow us some breathing room in the months ahead as we look to start work on the 2021 budget," commented Coyle. "We are prepared for some of this in that we have reserves, we have a contingency account and we have healthy fund balances. All the years of effort of this Board and these Department Heads to buy into a system of planning ahead and fiscal prudence are on full display right now as we weather this fiscal crisis."

The fiscal crisis, coupled with unemployment rates not seen since the Great Depression, will make the 2021 budget process the most difficult one on record for the County.

"Absent Federal support and/or the holding off of projected State Aid cuts, I see a large budget gap and I do not see a scenario where all county programs and services can be maintained. We cannot tax our way out of a hole that big," said Coyle.

## Livingston County to offer Weekly Drive-Thru Food Distribution in Livonia June 24

Livingston County has been and will be partnering with Foodlink and local school districts to hold weekly drive-thru food distributions throughout the summer months. The goal of these distributions is to assist households in need of food support during this public health emergency. Food will be distributed on a first come, first served basis to Livingston County residents only. Registration is *not* required.

Each vehicle will receive three (3) boxes of pre-packaged food, totaling approximately 75 pounds. The boxes will contain dairy, produce and other perishables.

These events will involve no-touch distribution. Proper social distancing will be maintained at all times in order to protect the health and safety of everyone at each location.

Angela Ellis, Deputy County Administrator, stated, "The previous food distribution events demonstrated that there is growing demand for emergency food support during this challenging time. We look forward to continuing these events throughout the summer. Thank you to all of our partners and volunteers for making these events so meaningful for so many."

The summer food distribution events will be held each Wednesday from 2PM to 4PM and rotate among school districts. The next distribution will be June 24 at Livonia Central School District, 2 Bulldog Boulevard in Livonia.

Schedules for July and August will be released as the events draw near.

County officials ask that: 1) **NO EARLY ARRIVALS, PLEASE,** 2) You must be 18 years or older to accept food, 3) **THESE ARE DRIVE-THRU, CONTACT-FREE EVENTS** so You must stay in your vehicle with the windows rolled up. Please write the total number in your household and number of older adults, if any, on a piece of paper to be displayed in your vehicle window, 4) **WAIT TIME:** You may experience a wait time as the drive-thru volume increases. Follow signs as you pull into the parking lot. Please be sure your vehicle has enough gas, 5) **PLEASE HAVE TRUNK CLEANED OUT:** The boxes of emergency food will be placed into the trunk of each vehicle. Once your trunk is closed and tapped, you may drive away.

## HF-L boys track could have contended for sectional title

With numerous members who had scored points for the team at the Section V Class B Championship a year ago coming back this spring, the Honeoye Falls-Lima Boys Varsity Track team might have made a run at another sectional title this spring but COVID-19 stepped in its path and forced cancellation of the spring sports season.

HF-L coach Bernie Gardner welcomed back seniors Philip Ackerman, Kiernan Beckett, Austin Everhart, Nate Grey, Turner Kamm, Hank Lehning, Jacob Lehning, Ian McGuire, Joaquin Riley, Cole Siewert, Sam Tvrđik, Michael Viggiani, Matthew Volkman-Lien, Teddy Warfle and Turner Wilson, juniors Omar Armbruster, Alec Bhaskaran, Ryan Dailor, Michael Feeley, Eli Grout, Gavin Henderson, Jack Hulsey, Kevin Powell and Jake Williams and sophomores Knox Ackerman, Brodie Atkinson, Cody Brisbane, Samuel Gaylord, Seamus Gillis, Aidan Goold, Zac Meacham, Kenneth Morrell and Connor Schaefer. Newcomers to the club would have been seniors Christopher Goetz, Jon Kabes and Nikolas Sirvent, juniors Christian Coler, Tyler Terwilliger and Braden Wagner, sophomores Cole Chiapperino, Deshawn Owens and Joseph Rogers and freshmen Ryan Casler, Robert Cohen, Griffin Englert, Andrew LaMonica, Gavin Letendre, Clark Palen, Caedan Quinn, David Tuller and Daniel Vullo.

The Cougars went 3-0 and captured a Monroe County Division title as well as the Section V Class B Championship a year ago. McGuire, Warfle and Jacob Lehning made up three-quarters of the 3200 relay team that won a sectional title (8 minutes, 22.04 seconds). Grey won the discus event by launching the discus 145 feet while Volkman-Lien took third (131-5) and Wilson sixth (120-1). Hank Lehning accumulated a winning total of 2,777 points to take the pentathlon. Siewert was second in the 400 hurdles (59.19), third in the 110 hurdles (15.79) and fourth in high jump (5-8). McGuire was third in the 800 meters (2:05.33) with Jacob Lehning seventh (2:11.81) and Warfle 10<sup>th</sup> (2:15.06). Goold, Siewert, Riley and McGuire combined for fourth (3:39.04) in the 1600 relay. Phil Ackerman was fourth (12-3) in the pole vault, Hulsey fifth (11-6) and Powell sixth (11-0). Feeley and Armbruster were fourth (11:12.14) and sixth (11:21.74), respectively, in the 3000 meter steeplechase. Riley and Goold comprised half the quartet that took fifth (47.06) in the 400 relay. Grout collected 2,177 points for fifth in the pentathlon. Riley took sixth in the 400 meters at 54.69 seconds. Warfle was sixth (4:52.86) and Kamm eighth (4:58.06) in the 1600 meters. Goold finished eighth (38-7.5) in the triple jump. Tvrđik placed ninth (39-2), Grey 11<sup>th</sup> (38-11) and Volkman-Lien 12<sup>th</sup> (38-9.25) in the shot put.

"We might have been able to win sectionals again," Gardner said. "We had an incredible group of boys back and many of them had scored points in sectionals last year, led mostly by members of this year's senior class."

**Phil Ackerman** would have started his fourth year on the varsity. Ackerman was likely to compete in the pole vault, triple jump, the 100 meters and the 200

meters. He soared 12 feet, 3 inches to claim fourth in the pole vault at the Section V Class B Championship last spring and cleared 11-6 for 12<sup>th</sup> in the event at the Monroe County League Championship.

**Kiernan Beckett** would have competed his fourth season on the varsity. Beckett was going to be competing in the 100 meters, 200 meters and 400 meters and as a member of the 400 and 1600 relay teams. He won the 100 meters (11.8) and the 200 meters (24.5) at the HF-L Twilight Invitational in 2019.

**Austin Everhart** was entering his fourth year on varsity. Everhart would have run the 1600 meters and the 3200 meters this spring. He finished in 14<sup>th</sup> place in the 3000 meter steeplechase at the Section V Class B Championship a year ago with a time of 12:43.39 and he was third (11:07) in the 3200 meters in a league meet against Greece Odyssey-Olympia on April 25, 2019.

**Christopher Goetz** was going to be a newcomer to the varsity this spring. Goetz was penciled in to compete in the 100 and 200 meters and some of the jumping events.

**Nate Grey** would have concluded a four-year varsity career. Grey was to compete in the discus and shot put. He won the discus with a throw of 145 feet at the Section V Class B Championship and 11<sup>th</sup> with a toss of 38-11 in the shot put after placing second in the discus (128-7) and 37<sup>th</sup> in shot put (36-2.25) at the Monroe County League Championship in 2019.

**Jon Kabes** would have started his first year with the varsity. Kabes would have helped an already deep team in the discus and shot put events.

**Turner Kamm** was going to finish his fourth year on varsity. Kamm was to compete in the 400 meters, 800 meters and 1600 meters and on the 1600 and 3200 relay teams. He placed eighth in 4:58.06 in the 1600 meters at the Section V Class B Championship and was part of the sprint medley team which took second at the event at the Victor Invitational with a school record time of 4 minutes, 1.5 seconds in 2019.

**Hank Lehning** would have concluded his fourth season on the varsity. Lehning was slated to compete in the 110 hurdles, the high jump and the long jump in league meets and in the pentathlon at invitationals. He won the pentathlon by compiling 2,777 points (taking first in the 110 hurdles, high jump and long jump, second in the shot put and sixth in the 1500 meters) at the Section V Class B Championship in 2019.

**Jacob Lehning** was going to finish his fourth season on the varsity. Lehning would have competed in the 800 meters and 1600 meters and as part of the 1600 and 3200 relay teams. He was part of the 3200 relay team that turned in a winning 8:22.04 at the Section V Class B Championship and also took seventh (2:11.81) in the 800 meters at sectionals after placing seventh in the 800 meters at the Monroe County Championship in 2019.

**Ian McGuire** would have competed on varsity for four years. McGuire was going to be in the 800 and 1600 meters and part of the 1600 and 3200 relay teams. He helped the 3200 relay to victory (8:22.04) at the Section V Championship and also

Veterans of the team were seniors Jada Balmer, Kara Balmer, Danielle Fisk, Zetta Hayes, Asha Hotaling, Samantha Jacopille-Bornheimer, Kennedy Martin, Rylee Penders, Gabriella Piccirilli, Leah Samson, Margaret Tuttobene, Rachel VanderVen and Casey Walike, juniors Ciarra Franz, Marisa Hartwick and Jaelyn McClean and sophomores Ann Brennan, Jaily Clark, Anna Everhart, Abigeal Finn, Ella Henzel-Cronin, Olivia Hullihen, Teagan Kamm, Mackenzie Kettlehone, Jayme Knapp, Sarah Moon, Brynn Mooney, Virginia Roth, Anya Sheradin, Emma Stefanou and Elizabeth VanDick. Newcomers to the club were going to be senior Anna Cole, juniors Emma Garry and Jasmyn Gibson, sophomores Olivia Blodgett, Bilanca Lopez Mart and Katherine Stansbury and freshmen Dortha Ackerman, Mia Arena, Sophie Bagley, Grace Casler, Ella Clark, Sophia Dulieu, Lana Fisk, Claire Francis, Ella Heminway, Allison Hulsey, Molly Kraynick, Cayla Lawrence, Alia Spaker and Emily White.

Fisk won the Section V Class B title in the high jump with a leap of 5 feet, 1 inch and, two weeks later, cleared 5-6 to win the New York State Public High School Athletic Association Division 2 (small schools) title in the high jump. Mooney, VanderVen and Henzel-Cronin formed three-fourths of the 1600 relay that took a sectional title in 4 minutes, 15.30 seconds. Franz hurdled her way to a win in the 100 hurdles in 16.69 seconds. Walike grabbed second in both the 1500 and 3000 meters. Penders earned fifth in the pentathlon. Kamm, Everhart and Sheradin made up three-fourths of the 3200 relay that took fourth in 10 minutes, 32.37 seconds.

"Danielle could have repeated as a sectional and state champion this year," coach Bernie Gardner said. "I think Ciarra had a shot at earning her second straight sectional title in the 100 hurdles and Casey would have had a strong season as well."

In any case, the 14 seniors would have played prominent roles in the 2020 season.

**Jada Balmer** would have completed her fourth year on varsity. Balmer was likely to compete in the 400 meters, the 800 meters, the 1500 meters and the 3000 meters and as part of the 1600 and 3200 relay teams this season. She finished eighth in the 1500 (5:32.73) and eighth in the 800 (2:37.45) at the Section V meet in 2019.

**Kara Balmer** was set to be in her fourth season on varsity. Balmer was going to compete in the triple jump, the shot put, the 400 meters and as part of the 1600 and 3200 relay teams. She claimed ninth in the triple jump by covering 29 feet, 1 inch at the Section V Class B Championship last spring.

**Anna Cole** would've been in her first year on the varsity. Cole was slated

to be in the 400 meters and 800 meters.

**Danielle Fisk** was going to conclude a stellar four-year varsity career. Fisk was scheduled to compete in the high jump, 100 hurdles and the long jump in league meets and in the pentathlon at invitationals. Injuring a knee at the team's own Twilight Invitational on May 10, 2019, she competed in just the high jump at the Section V Class B Championship just over two weeks later and won the title with a leap of 5-1 (it was her second straight Section V title in the event as she won it in 2018). She then broke a 30-year-old school record with a leap of 5-6.75 to win the high jump in Division 2 (small schools) at the Meet of Champions and then won the state title in the high jump with a leap of 5-6.

**Zetta Hayes** would have begun her second season on varsity. Hayes was going to be competing in the 100 meters, 200 meters, 400 meters and the pole vault as well as being a part of the 400 and 1600 relay teams. She was part of the 4x200 relay which finished second and also was 16<sup>th</sup> in the 100 meters (16.04 seconds) at the Warsaw Invitational on April 27, 2019.

**Asha Hotaling** was entering her third season on varsity. Hotaling would have competed in the pole vault, long jump and triple jump this spring. She tied for eighth at 7 feet, 9 inches in the pole vault at the Section V Class B Championship in 2019.

**Samantha Jacopille-Bornheimer** was set to start her second season on varsity. Jacopille-Bornheimer would have competed in the discus and shot put this year. At the May 1, 2019 meet against Eastridge, she had a personal-record toss of 73-4 for third in the discus.

**Kennedy Martin** would have begun her fourth season on varsity. Martin was likely to run in the 200 meters and 400 meters and been a part of the 400 and 1600 relay teams this spring. She helped the 1600 relay team to fifth at the Monroe County Championship as the group combined for a 4:16.09 and they were second (4:11.55) in Division 2 at the Meet of Champions in 2019.

**Rylee Penders** was entering her fourth year on varsity. Penders was penciled in to compete in the 100 hurdles, the long jump and high jump in league meets and in the pentathlon at invitationals. She registered 1,719 points for fifth in the pentathlon at the Section V Class B Championship and 1,709 points for sixth in the event at the HF-L Twilight Invitational in 2019.

## NYSPHSAA Holds First COVID-19 Task Force Meeting

The New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA) held its first meeting of the COVID-19 Task Force on Wednesday, June 10. The Task Force is comprised of school district superintendents, high school principals, athletic directors, NYSPHSAA officers, as well as a representative from the New York State Athletic Administrators Association, an athletic trainer, a district transportation director, and members of New York State Education Department and New York State Department of Health. Area representatives on the Task Force are Section V Executive Director Kathy Hoyt, a graduate of Honeoye Falls-Lima High School, and Pittsford Athletic Director Scott Barker.

The Task Force heard reports and updates from Governor Cuomo's office, the New York State Education Department and the New York State Health Department pertaining to the COVID-19 crisis and the impact it has had upon education and the reopening of schools.

"Having representatives from these offices provide reports today was extremely beneficial to the work that the Task Force will do over the course of the next few months," said NYSPHSAA President and Task Force Chair, Paul Harrica. "From the reports provided, it is clear school district facilities cannot be opened for student participation until Phase 4 is entered. The health and safety of our student-athletes remains our top priority."

On Friday, June 12, the Task Force released guidance pertaining to on-campus summer conditioning workouts as well as an update to its Frequently Asked Questions document that NYSPHSAA released on May 7th. School districts are encouraged to get acclimated with CDC and local health department guidance as well as Governor Cuomo's restrictions, local laws and policies.

The Task Force also discussed and examined the result of a COVID-19 survey, distributed by NYSPHSAA, to gather a statewide perspective on the impacts and potential response to the COVID-19 crisis; roughly 6,000 athletic directors, administrators, and coaches submitted responses to the survey. "Today's meeting was our first step in addressing concerns and examining readily available information related to the COVID-19 crisis," said Dr. Robert Zayas, NYSPHSAA Executive Director. "We are all focused on providing student-athletes with the opportunity to participate this fall with guidance from the Department of Health and in accordance with Governor Cuomo's restrictions."

The next meeting of the NYSPHSAA COVID-19 Task Force will take place at the end of this month with a date and time to be announced next week.

## FLCC offers new summer scholarship for high schoolers

Rising high school juniors and seniors and homeschooled students can now get up to 100 percent off tuition for Finger Lakes Community College summer classes through the Early College Scholars program.

Early College Scholars allows students who have not yet graduated high school an opportunity to get college credit with a scholarship covering 50 percent of tuition.

For summer 2020, students who meet income guidelines can get a scholarship covering full tuition. Tuition for a typical three-credit course is \$591.

The funding has been provided by the FLCC Foundation, which raises private sector support for educational programming. Income thresholds are based on family size; for example, a family of four with an annual income of \$47,638 or less can qualify for a full-tuition scholarship.

"Early College Scholars is a longstanding year-round program at FLCC. Since many summer options are no longer available for teenagers, we worked with our Foundation to find a way to make summer classes even more affordable for rising juniors and seniors," said Robert Nye, president of FLCC.

The scholarship does not cover books or the \$37 per-credit-hour fee (a three-credit course fee would be \$111).

Students should start by reviewing summer course offerings on the summer sessions webpage at [fccc.edu/summer](http://fccc.edu/summer).

All summer classes are remote with most online on your own schedule and others with scheduled online lectures. Available courses

include several introductory level classes: Public Speaking, Introduction to Programming, English 101, Early Western Civilization, Pre-Calculus and Introduction to Nutrition.

"Taking FLCC summer classes offers high school students the opportunity to test-drive college-level coursework and save money, depending on where the student ultimately plans to attend college," said Carol Urbaitis, FLCC vice president of enrollment management. "Plus, colleges love to see that students used their summer productively. Taking FLCC summer courses demonstrates motivation and dedication on the student's part."

The next four-week summer sessions begin on June 22 and July 20; the next six-week summer session begins on July 6. The dates will appear in the course listing.

# Town & Village Update

## Mayor, Supervisor Weekly Update Cautious Openings, Virtual Meetings to Continue Where Possible

### Town of West Bloomfield

Todd D. Campbell, Supervisor:

"Our Town Hall will start to be open on Monday. We intend to split the difference a little bit. We're going to have the door unlocked. We're going to keep some of the signage on the building as far as information about the crisis and asking people and making sure they're wearing masks, etc.... We going to continue to request appointments. Our Town Hall is not that big and I had a concern about the number of people coming in the front door. One or two might not have a mask and I didn't want three or four people in the lobby not able to be socially distant. So we are going to continue to ask people to make appointments for the individual they have to see to try to minimize the number of interactions."

"Our playground is currently closed. We don't have enough staff to disinfect and clean the playground. The way I read the current guidelines, you need to do that on a regular and frequent basis. I can't really have the Highway Department out there 3-4 times a day cleaning the playground if people start to use it. When we make a determination to allow people to start using the playground again, there will at least have to be some signage along the lines of 'Don't presume the person ahead of you took care of it. If you're going to use something, clean it yourself, then clean it when you're done. It's much better to have something cleaned twice than not cleaned at all. It's the best way to protect yourself.' I would definitely be an advocate of that."

"We are pretty much back to full operation within the Town. We're working on oil and stone projects with a couple of other municipalities along with the Highway Department."

"For Ontario County, we're looking for the sales tax distributions from the State. We haven't seen the April and May numbers yet. We have a presumption of a reduction of approximately 18-20% in sales tax revenue. Not all of the businesses have had to report in the last couple of months, so even if the numbers are down, there may still be businesses that are not reporting their results yet. So the actual numbers may not be known until the July/August time frame."

"Ontario County is back to full operations. The DMV is going to start on Wednesday. They are requesting appointments as well. There will be Sheriff's deputies at the door to make sure the flow is controlled. The Canandaigua DMV is a primary site for DMV operations in Ontario County."

"We have been doing our meetings via Zoom and we will continue to do them via Zoom. I had a concern about the number of participants in a meeting. I didn't really want to close it off to the public and have two members of the public come in and have others stand outside. That doesn't feel right because they wouldn't be able to get on the virtual portion unless they had a smart phone. For the long term, we've talked about what things we're doing now that we will continue to do. There's a little hesitancy in regard to the virtual aspect with respect to how do you control an equalize participation between the public willing to come in and those who are attending virtually. This is a bigger issue for the Planning Board and the Zoning Board of Appeals than the Town Board. The Town Board tends to be more about processing the bills, transactional, etc... where the Planning Board tends to have more discussion back and forth so it's a little bit different from the different board perspectives. We'll continue to investigate that as we move forward."

### Village of Scottsville

Eileen Hansen, Mayor:

"Our Village Board meeting was held remotely on Tuesday, June 9th. We shall be watching State guidelines as we decide on an in-person meeting in July."

"One of the items we have worked on is an extension of licensed premises on municipal property (sidewalk) for outdoor dining. Our Code Enforcement Officer worked with the restaurant owner and it is working well."

"As we move into Phase 3, we are discussing the opening of playgrounds. Our DPW's biggest concern is the cleanliness of the equipment: Does it need to be cleaned daily? If so, once/day, after anyone uses it, etc? I have been looking for any more guidance in this matter so we can make a decision early next week. What are your municipalities doing in terms of playgrounds? This is one item that was sent to me from the Town Supervisor's group:

### Town of Rush

Gerald Kusse, Supervisor:

"We completed our second week of appointment-only business conduct. We have been incident free, so it means on Monday the 15th we will go to walk-in service. If people will want to conduct business, they can just walk into the Town Hall. There will be requirements - masks, hand sanitizer, a sign-in sheet - but basically you go in as you want, do the business you want to conduct, and leave."

"I think most of the people in Rush are excited because we are going to have our restaurants open. I asked the Code Enforcement Officer and he informed me they are all in compliance with the opening plan requirements, although he didn't know exactly when they will open. That means a lot to Rush. We only have three. It's not like some of the burgers around us where you have such a big choice. We've got to take advantage of the three we've got and we're looking forward to that."

### Village of Honeoye Falls

Rick Milne, Mayor:

"Our Village has a little bit slower approach to our opening. On Tuesday, June 16th, we're opening to our full-time hours but that will still be by appointment. We anticipate that will continue for another couple of weeks. After those two weeks, when we get everything back in motion, we will have full-time staff manning or staffing those full-time hours. For the next couple of weeks, we'll be open full-time hours but it'll be half-staff. The other folks will be working at home and they'll split days."

"We're looking forward to getting open again. We haven't been bombarded by calls and by people that are trying to get in. That's why we're taking a little bit of a slower approach. We don't have a large office, so our people are fairly close to each other. We're taking it a little bit slower from that standpoint."

"We are also looking forward to our playgrounds being reopened. They will officially reopen on Monday. Even though the County says they are open now, it's up to the municipalities. We have not sprayed them down. We have not sanitized anything. We will be following health department and State guidelines to the best of our ability. We've actually just received some sanitizer material today for the playgrounds. We will be buying a fogger that will be able to spray down the equipment every week or so."

"We are still going to be very vocal with our residents. You should bring sanitizer with you. If your kids are playing on the playground, you should sanitize their hands and such before they go on the playground and sanitize them when they come off. We think it's just good policy."

"And, really, when you're on the playground, adults, etc... if you're by other people you should still be wearing a mask. We're still in that mode where, if you're out in public, around other people, you should be wearing masks. Try to be vigilant at that."

"Our Village Board of Trustees and our other committees will be going more to live meetings. Our meeting on Monday will be live and in person for our Village Trustees and our staff, but anyone who wants to attend our meeting will still have to do so virtually. We're not going into public meetings just yet. If we did have a controversial issue or some sort of a public meeting that we needed to, we'd work around that. But right now, the meetings for the public will be virtual and the meetings for our boards will be live as we move forward. We hope that will be another week or so. We're just trying to get back on track."

"Moving on to Phase Three, we're looking forward to our restaurants being open as well. Certainly, a lot of them have been doing take out already, but not all. I do not have any time table as far as when any of the other restaurants will be open for indoor seating, but they're all going to do what's best for them."

"Supervisor Moffitt and I were on a meeting call with our Monroe County Sheriff's B Zone Captain to discuss the Rally in the Village planned for Saturday the 13th."

"We are also looking forward to having our playgrounds open because a lot of little kids use them. A lot of mothers with kids go down there during the day. We're going to take advantage of that. I've been reading the sanitizing requirements and directions and I've passed that on to our recreation director."

"Hopefully, come next week, everything will be on track. Maybe not the way it was before, but it'll be close. And we're all looking forward to that."

### Town of Mendon

John Moffitt, Supervisor:

"We are operating at full staff for both the Highway Department and the Town Hall, however, the Town Hall is still locked and it's by appointment only. We are anticipating unlocking the doors and go back to what we all call 'normal' on Monday, July 6th. That's the plan, unless there's something different healthwise that changes that scenario."

"Our playing fields are now open as far as softball, tennis, basketball and the rectangular fields on Semmel Road for soccer and lacrosse. They haven't started playing baseball games yet but they are going to start. I know one of the teams is using it for practices. Softball folks and soccer folks are getting the schedules modified. Obviously, anyone can go use the field, but you can reserve them. We have not officially opened the playground. We're still working through a few things and hope to have that open relatively soon."

"We had a Town Board meeting this past Monday in person at our Community Center. It's a fairly large area and can accommodate thirty-some people with keeping all the six-foot rules in place and people in masks. We've had a Town Board meeting, a Planning Board meeting, and a Zoning Board meeting under those circumstances. We're going to continue with that. Because that building doesn't have internet, I'm going to look into getting internet access so we can have people come to meetings and participate as well as watch the meetings on the internet to both view and possibly participate in all the meetings. We're looking at getting the internet in there, making sure it's strong enough and those kinds of things. We

Mike Falk, Supervisor:

"The Town Hall will be opened and doors unlocked on Monday June 15th. Folks do not need to call for an appointment anymore. Same drill - masks, sanitizers, and all that stuff."

"As far as Livingston County goes, we've checked with Senator Schumer's office that the Federal stimulus packages that are being considered are going to be tabled and won't be taken up until probably after the 4th of July recess is done. ## Life with the (Word) Smiths

### WENDING OUR WAY WEST TO WHEATLAND: GARBUTT

BY DEB AND TIM SMITH

**RESET** ~ Beginning this week we are going to share with you the specific storylines behind the historical hamlets in the Town of Wheatland and we'll begin with Garbutt. Garbutt is located on Scottsville Mumford Road and there are still green road signs demarking your entry into the hamlet from either direction. The only commercial entity left is an antique shop located in the old Garbutt homestead. More on this a bit later.

**GARBUTT FAMILY** ~ As we enter the hamlet that was originally known as Garbuttsville, we'll reference a comment we made back in the first week of this series. If you had to designate one surname as being the most significant in the history of the Town of Wheatland, it would be Garbutt, with kudos extended to other family names such as Scott, Sheffer and McKenzie.

It is duly respectful to this family that the little community which once bore its name is properly saluted in our shout out to Wheatland. While it is true that what was once a thriving little hamlet is today merely a crossroads with a few scattered houses, the story of Garbutt is definitely one worth telling.

The first settler of this hamlet was John Garbutt who arrived with his daughter Elizabeth in 1804 after becoming the first white man to purchase a plot of land in what became Garbutt. He built a log cabin, 150 feet north of Oatka Creek, and 100 feet west of Union Street.

More settlers from Scotland joined them and by 1808 the first school in Garbutt opened in a log cabin with Elizabeth Garbutt as its teacher. Elizabeth is actually the star of one of our favorite Wheatland stories which we shared in Week 2 of this series. Our source for this is the book *Tales of Old Wheatland* by Town Historian Barbara Chapman and Catherine Gilbert.

**EDUCATION IN GARBUTT** ~ Since we shared with you the fact that Elizabeth Garbutt was the town's first schoolteacher, we'll use that impetus to segue into our segment on schools. We know that by 1808 Miss Garbutt was conducting class in a log cabin. The first actual schoolhouse was completed in 1813 on the southwest corner of the crossroads of Union Street and Scottsville Mumford Road.

That building served until 1831 when it was sold and replaced by a new stone schoolhouse. From that year until 1852 the elementary students attended school in the new stone building while the older kids took their classes in the church building south of the cemetery on Union Street.


Garbutt's final academic building was a new framed schoolhouse built in 1870. That one lasted for the duration of education in Garbutt. On May 13, 1940 a resolution was passed to send all Garbutt students to Scottsville. Barb Chapman always felt that was the prettiest schoolhouse in the town and unfortunately, it is the only one that has been demolished. It was razed in the 1960s because of vandalism. All the other schoolhouses have been repurposed.

**PRAYER IN GARBUTT** ~ The storyline of Garbutt contains only one church. Garbutt Presbyterian on the east side of Union Street, north of the crossroads, was built in 1827. This church was evidently not particularly well built. Being used by the school in the 1850's, the structure was deemed unfit and razed in 1856. By that time there were active Methodist and Presbyterian Churches in Scottsville where the Garbutt folks could go to church.

**GARBUTT HISTORY** ~ In 1810-1811 John Garbutt built a framed house on the west side of Union Street. The family lived in the east half of the house and opened a general store/trading post in the west half. This business was called "Break-of-Day" which was an Irish phrase




CURRENT VIEW OF GARBUTT FAMILY HOMESTEAD

for "good morning". This establishment was frequented not only by the settlers, but also by the Indians.

Another prominent man in town was Peter Sheffer II who built a sawmill and then a gristmill just north of Oatka Creek in the early 1810's. The Garbutts and the Sheffers became connected by marriage when John's son Phillip Garbutt married Peter's daughter Nancy Sheffer in 1815. At that point, Phillip bought the mills from his father-in-law and the town became referred to as "Garbutt's Mills".

Since we've just stumbled upon the topic anyway, let us take you through the storyline of the town's names. By 1825 "Garbuttsville" had become the go-to moniker for the hamlet and by the end of the century that had been shortened to simply "Garbutt".

**ROARING 20'S AND THRILLING '30'S** ~ In 1828 Phillip Garbutt built a stone building west of the four corners on the north side of Scottsville Mumford Road. This edifice was to be the new home of his Break-of-Day store which really came into its own during this era. Garbutt would travel to New York City to buy his inventory and the quality and diversity of his merchandise exceeded any store west of the Genesee.

This 1828 building is still standing. Town Historian Barb Chapman told us

that this is the one remaining building in Garbutt which is not strictly a residence. The Phillip Garbutt building currently hosts an "on-again-off-again" antique dealer. "I believe he has the store full of antiques," she told us, "but rarely sells anything."

Exerting his prowess on water as well as land, Garbutt purchased his first river boat, the "Flower of Wheatland" in 1832. This ship made as many as 60 trips a season between Wheatland and Rochester, sometimes bringing city folks down to stay at the newly constructed two-story brick hotel on the southeast corner of Union Street and Scottsville Mumford Road which had been opened by Jefferson Edmonds, also in 1832.

**FABULOUS 40'S AND 50'S** ~ The Phillip Garbutt empire continued to prosper throughout the 1840's, eventually reaching its zenith during the first half of the 1850's. At that point he owned mills in Garbuttsville, Mumfordville and Scottsville with all three locations operating around the clock and his Break-of-Day store was flourishing.

Garbutt had assembled an entire fleet of boats and had become extensively involved in the shipping business. And just to show that his range of talents spanned the spectrum from business to politics, he served as Supervisor of the Town of

Wheatland from 1849-1854.

**TOXIC TURNAROUND** ~ Unfortunately for Garbutt, 1855 would turn out to be the year in which his life began to become the human embodiment of the cliché "What goes up, must come down." What went wrong? Here's the scoop.

The summer of 1855 would go down in history as "the wet summer". Profuse precipitation pummeled and punished the wheat crop bringing great hardship upon the farming community. And let's face it; they called the town "Wheatland" for a reason. Wheat-less Wheatland was walloped and things would get way worse.

The wet summer of 1855 was followed by three years of crop infestation by the wheat midge. The wheat midge, full name "orange blossom wheat midge", is an insect that feeds upon the kernel of the wheat. Originally native to Europe, they made their way to Canada in the 1830's when they appeared on the scene in western New York in the 1850's the agricultural community was initially hit hard.

**GARBUTT TURNOVER** ~ So, with multiple years of devastated wheat

crops, Garbutt's three mills, which had been operating around the clock, became barely operational. While times were tough for everyone, Phillip Garbutt seemed to basically bale. In 1857 he turned over all his businesses to his son John. In 1859 he moved to Ohio and in 1864 he died there.

John Garbutt headed the family business throughout the rest of the century and while there was somewhat of a recovery from the disastrous late 1850's, the company was never able to regain the giddy heights of its glory days. John Garbutt sold the mill business in 1903 and the Garbutt family continued to operate their store until 1943.

The hamlet as a whole followed the pattern of many other bygone historical hamlets, gradually following the path of decline from a viable village to a common crossroads. A 1972 local history book identifies two small general stores as being the only surviving businesses, the last of which survived into the early '90's.
