Brian Timmons at the ReMax Realty Group has the listing. The building has been listed for sale at \$550,000 according to the website.

The American Hotel has a long and storied history in Lima and has been owned by the Reynolds family since 1920. There has been an American Hotel on the site, though since about 1790. Today, the hotel is owned and operated by brother and sister duo Pat and Rose Reynolds. The hotel is well-known for its food, particularly the soups which are homemade by Rose.

The listing has the following description:

"An incredibly rare opportunity to own an iconic, turn-key business. The American Hotel of Lima has been the center of area history for over 230 years. Located at the gateway to the Finger Lakes Region, there has been

an American Hotel on this site since 1790! The present day building was built in 1840, and is still currently operated as a full service bar, hotel, and event space, with many of the second floor rooms available for rent, as well as a spacious party room for larger gatherings. The American Hotel is part of the National Register of Historic Places, and it is ready to start the next chapter of its life. The possibilities are endless for this multi-use facility, at this high visibility location, at the intersection for routes 20 & 15A. This facility would be a successful location for a tasting room for any of the hundreds of local wineries, breweries and distillers, with a perfect setting for an outdoor beer garden. Other options are a test kitchen, boutique hotel/Airbnb, retreat or event center. Please do not approach owner or staff directly for information or tours."

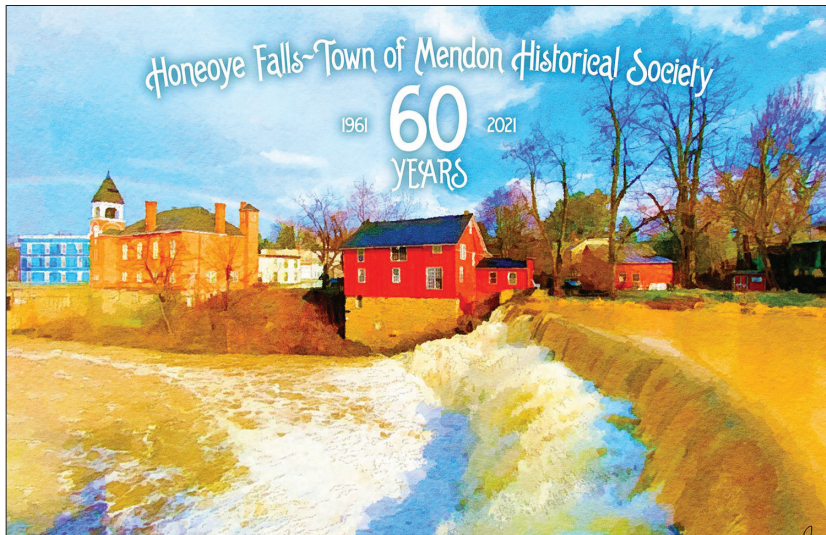

Plan

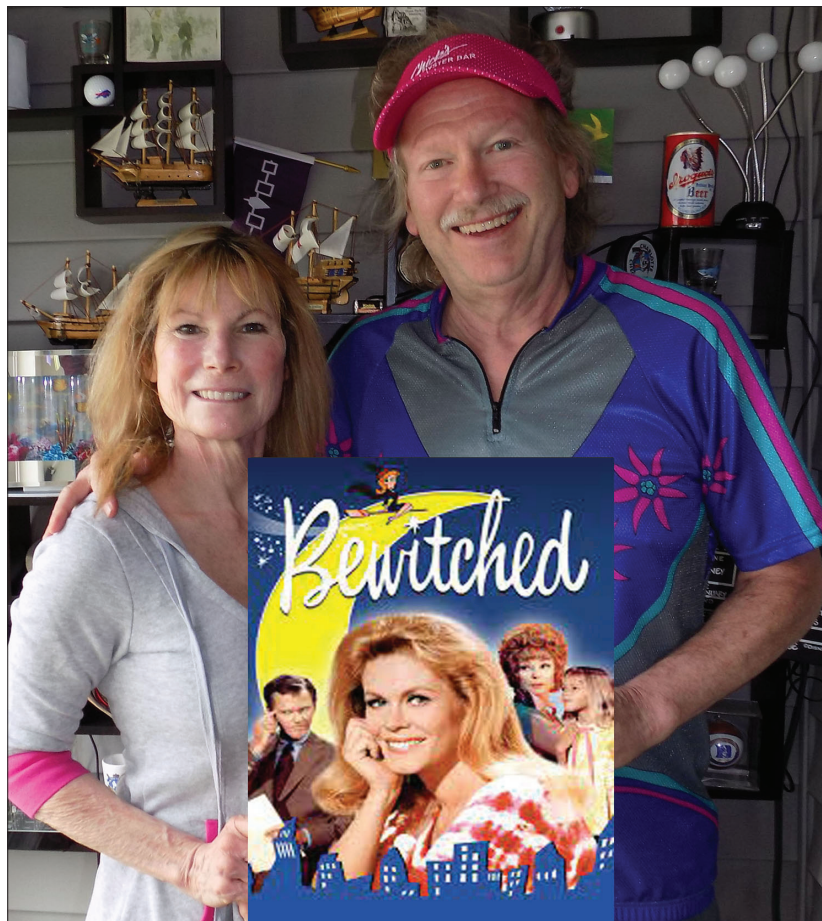
Last month, the Livingston County Board of Supervisors unanimously adopted a new 2021-2022 Strategic Plan, which focuses on policies, objectives, and goals for county government over the next 18 months. The strategic planning process included a comprehensive review of all aspects of county government and its connections to the community, economy, and environment.

County departments collaborated on the plan, which also included valued advice from residents. The Board gathered input from citizens through public meetings and the ongoing Conversations with the County monthly town hall series.

"These policies are aimed at improving resident quality of life and providing innovative, best-in-class public services," said Chairman of the Livingston County Board of Supervisors David LeFeber. "We're very excited about our 'Light Up Livingston' Broadband Initiative, which aims to bring high-speed Internet access to every home, farm operation, and business in the County. What (And Why) Is Greater Western New York?

Believe it or not, we're fast approaching a seminal anniversary in the history of Greater Western New York. At some point in the final days of August 1779, the first scouts of the Sullivan Expedition represented the first citizens of the new nation to step foot into what would become Greater Western New York.

They weren't the first people in Greater Western New York. They weren't even the first of European descent to enter the region.

They were, however, the first Americans to do so. And that is why Greater Western New York is often referred to as "America's First Frontier."

For those who were absent from school when they taught this, the Sullivan Expedition, while containing no major battles, represents a significant turning point in the Revolutionary War.

Following the British surrender at Saratoga in 1777, the Tories shifted their emphasis from the north to the south. Washington followed suit and redirected American forces to the southern colonies.

In the meantime, King George's commanders relied on their Indian allies to foment what amounted to what we would call today a terrorist campaign against the American Patriots. The hope was to entice Washington to split his troops into a two-front war.

The American leader did not fall for this ruse. His response was muted following the gruesome July 1778 Wyoming massacre, although he allowed soldiers from that region to return to defend their homes. There were a few

tit-for-tat exchanges between local Patriots and the British/Iroquois opposition, each in turn burning each other's outposts and villages.

But when Butler's Rangers ruthlessly attacked and killed women and children in German Flatts and Cherry Hill outside of Albany, Washington had had enough. He eventually found Major General John Sullivan to lead a substantial number of troops to thwart this guerilla activity by "taking the war home to the enemy to break their morale."

That Sullivan's campaign was a military success is beyond doubt, despite revisionist historians who suggest otherwise. Contemporary reports, which must be the source of any historical account, attest to this.

Sullivan's campaign burned and destroyed nearly all the villages and crops of the Seneca; the tribe primarily responsible for the greatest atrocities. Very few on either side of this effort were killed (although the horrific torture and mutilation of Lieutenant Thomas Boyd and Sergeant Michael Parker in Groveland just south of Conesus has been highly chronicled).

As a result of the Sullivan Expedition, the British were forced to house and feed Iroquois refugees at Fort Niagara. Not only did this place more pressure on the Crown's resources, but the terror raids never again reached the same level as they had before.

foremost, it opened the eyes to Americans to this immense fertile region.

From the moment they first marched into New York from Pennsylvania in what is now Chemung County (where the first and only major battle occurred just east of Elmira), they were awestruck by the beauty of the land.

Major John Burrowes notes in his August 26, 1779 journal entry "As soon as our tents were pitched I amused myself with walking on the bank of the river which brought to my view a large bottom or beautiful plain, not a stump to be seen, a great burthen of wild grass, and with little industry (from the appearance of the soil) would make most excellent meadows, the upland very indifferent."

Similar comments from soldiers describing the corridor between Seneca and Cayuga Lakes also contain the word "beautiful." In fact, if you search all the journal entries for the word "beautiful," you'll find scores of references. Understand, this is in the middle of a war where the enemy showed no desire for taking prisoners (a fate, as demonstrated by Boyd and Parker,

worse than death). Yet, they nearly all invoke the word "beautiful."

As they reached the pinnacle of their campaign, the vast vista of the Genesee Valley appeared before them. Lieut.-Col. Adam Hubley, in his September 14, 1779 journal entry, described the "Seneca country" as "containing not less than six thousand acres of the richest soil that can be conceived, not having a bush standing, but filled with grass considerably higher than a man... which afforded a prospect which was so beautiful that, to attempt a comparison, would be doing an injury."

There was a clear promise to Revolutionary War soldiers that they would receive land grants once the War was over. The beauty of Greater Western New York was not lost on them. Many prominent early settlers in this region were veterans of Sullivan's campaign.

There was an impediment to settlement, however. The various treaties following the Revolutionary War left the western border of New York State in flux along the Niagara River. In addition, a large portion of New York State, including nearly all of Greater Western New York, was also claimed by the State of Massachusetts. This dispute wasn't resolved until December 16, 1786 – the official birthday of the Greater Western New York Region (see "Happy Birthday Greater Western New York," *Mendon-Honeoye Falls-Lima, Sentinel*, December 15, 2016).

Still, despite the apparent peace, the battle for Greater Western New York continued. The

British, both through loyalists who settled in Greater Western New York and their Iroquois (again, primarily Seneca) allies, continued to seek inroads to split Greater Western New York from New York State. The aim was to eventually absorb the region back into the British Empire. This effort wasn't ended until the end of the War of 1812 (and, in fact, with a stronger America, the British found the tables turned a generation later).

Emigration into the region came from two main sources: Pennsylvania and New England (the latter which accelerated once the Erie Canal opened). Yet, despite the different origins, the shared region seemed to forge a single cultural identity.

This isn't surprising given the nature of moving to a new frontier. It takes a pioneering spirit to venture into the unknown – and for nearly all these newly christened Western New Yorkers, America's First Frontier was very unknown.

It took more than mere hope to survive and thrive on this burgeoning edge of civilization. It took perseverance. It took resilience. It took the kind of rugged individual required to tame a new land.

And that led to innovation, invention, and, more important, imagination. Once the War of 1812 resolved the uncertainty of the border and the enemy threat, the Greater Western New York region blossomed. It put the "Empire" in the Empire State.

For nearly two centuries, the two New Yorks worked in tandem to build America. Then something happened.

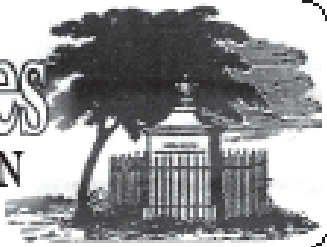

Revisiting HF Cemetery Summer 2021 – Week 5

News & Notes from Honeoye Falls (Community) Cemetery

Chester Carmichael, Big Leaguer (January 25th, 2007)

The yellowed newspaper clipping belched the headline: “CARMICHAEL HAS THE BUGS AT HIS MERCY; BISON ANNEX 5 TO 1.”

When the slow winter season brought farmers and shopkeepers around the pot-bellied stove, such a declaration was fodder for debate over America's pastime of baseball. While the game may no longer be the nation's favorite sport, baseball terminology is forever embedded in the American lexicon, including the aforementioned activity dubbed the “Hot Stove League.”

There was probably a time when tongues wagged over the prospects of this guy Carmichael in places like Seymour & Hook's (Write Books today) or Freddie Wolfsberger's (now a parking lot). He'd squashed the Bugs even more thoroughly on another occasion and was a tough cookie for John Ganzel's pennant-winning Rochester Hustlers at the Bay Street grounds.

In the headline example from the 1910 season, the Buffalo Bisons' young Chester “Chet” Carmichael set down the Jersey City Skeeters (“Bugs” if you will) on an efficient five-hitter. He was at them again several days later, this time hurling a gem that kept his name in the record books for the rest of his life - a “perfect game” (27 batters up, 27 batters out). It was a feat unmatched from when the International League evolved in the 1880's until another Buffalo flinger, Dick Marlowe, did it against Baltimore in 1952.

Carmichael's baseball career carried him into the acquaintance of many of baseball's great players during the “Dead Ball Era”... that period overshadowed by the coming of a home run slugger named Ruth. As a lanky flamethrower with an intimidating delivery, Chet went to his grave a bona fide Major League Baseball player (“... he can cut loose with an underhand ball which starts about a foot above the ground, and comes sailing up with a lot of speed and blows the batter's cap off,” wrote one sportswriter).

But his career was more like Moonlight Graham of “Field of Dreams” movie fame, than, say, Hall of Famer, Bob Gibson. And the bulk of his life was not spent around Boston,

(b. Fayetteville, NC 1876 – d. Chisholm, MN 1965)

Chicago or New York - it played out near Honeoye Falls, with the end written in granite at Honeoye Falls Cemetery. [News & Notes will “steal” a closer look at Carmichael in the next chapter. Also, he was variously known as “Chet” or “Mike” in newspaper reports.]

Chester Carmichael, Big Leaguer (Part II) (February 1st, 2007)

OK, so it was a meaningless game between two also-rans mopping up the National League baseball season, but September 5th, 1909 was magical for Chester Carmichael.

The 21-year-old rookie made a remarkable ascension into the ‘Bigs’ since his debut in Eaton, Indiana. From his hometown nine to ever faster Indiana teams - Dunkirk, Muncie and Vincennes - he then pitched himself into another state, Class A Cedar Rapids, Iowa, where he caught the eye of Clark Griffith.

Known in later years as “The Old Fox,” Griffith went into Cooperstown's Baseball Hall of Fame as a crack player, manager and, eventually, the team owner, who kept the ‘Nationals’ in Washington. He was managing the Cincinnati Redlegs when Carmichael made his debut, versus Philadelphia in the famed “Palace of the Fans.”

The grandiose venue was unforgettable, with Corinthian columns, opera boxes and a frieze with ‘Cincinnati’ chiseled in the center. The opponents featured “Harvard Eddie” Grant (who died in the Argonne Forest during WWI) and two area men, who later passed away in Rochester and Syracuse, respectively, “Red” Dooin and “Fiddler” Corridon.

It was an inauspicious beginning for the nervous young hurler - three innings, four hits, four runs, two men hit by his pitches and a fielding error. The umpires were Rochester native, Bill Klem, the greatest arbiter in big league history, and Bob Emslie, the man who was calling the bases when “Merkle's Boner” became baseball lore.

The performance was followed by another opportunity, September 23rd, at the Palace against the St. Louis Cardinals. Featuring one of the five ballplaying Delahanty brothers and Allan Storke, an Auburn native who died tragically a few months later, the contest was umpired by Hank O'Day. Hank was also in on “Merkle's Boner” and, on another day, he called the only unassisted triple play ever executed in the big leagues.

Carmichael's second pitching line, however, was similar to his mediocre debut, so Cincinnati shuffled him off to Buffalo to begin the 1910 season... and that fateful day in Jersey City. [Next week, this column will give a ‘rundown’ of Chester's life after baseball.]

Chester Carmichael, Big Leaguer (Conclusion) (February 8th, 2007)

Chester Carmichael was undeterred by his ticket to the minors to start the 1910 baseball season.

Though he missed the pre-game antics of last year's teammate, Hans Lobert, known for racing horses around the bases at Cincinnati's Palace, Chet knew his pitching wildness kept him from the big leagues. So he worked hard for Buffalo, grabbed the ball at every opportunity, piled up the innings and gained the swagger of a man expecting Clark Griffith's call-up any day.

But the season dragged into the final weeks with no call from Cincinnati. With pitching starts every three or four days, Carmichael's tiring arm continued to produce. The perfect game in Jersey City, two wins over Newark's Joe “Iron Man” McGinnity, a future Hall-of-Famer, and a tough loss against Rochester, were not enough for a promotion.

In 1911, he turned up with the New Orleans “Pelicans” and for half a season, was putting up creditable numbers. That campaign, and, apparently pitcher Carmichael's baseball career, appeared to reach an end. Chester's throwing arm may have given out... at the ripe old age of 23.

It happened often to hurlers in those days, when a pitcher started a game with the intention of completing it, win or lose. The aforementioned Joe McGinnity pitched over 400 innings one year... when half that number is considered a feat

Cincinnati May Recall Carmichael Who Pitched a Shut-Out Game Yesterday



Jersey City, Aug. 10.— Clark Griffith, of the Cincinnati Reds, will probably send out a hurry call for Chester Carmichael, a pitcher he farmed out to Buffalo, of the Eastern League. Griffith needs good pitchers badly and Carmichael got into the “good pitcher class” yesterday when he shut out Jersey City, without giving up a single hit. Carmichael didn't allow a base on balls and there were no errors behind him, not a single Jersey City player getting to first base. He did not go in for any strikeout records, but his steady pitching held the Jerseys safe at all times.

“Shut-Out Game” was also a “Perfect Game” [27 up – 27 out] - the first one in Eastern/International League history.

today. That's why they called him "Iron Man Joe."

Now, fast-forward to a small article by Dean Scott in the *Honeoye Falls Times*, September 1st, 1960. Mr. Carmichael was dead, services had been held at the Merton Kays Funeral Home and interment took place next to his wife, Blanche, who'd passed in 1949.

Since the man was childless, with only a surviving sister in Indiana, Scott contacted neighbors near the Carmichael home on the S-curve of Parrish Road. Under the headline, "*Mike Carmichael, Famous Pitcher, 72, Buried Here*", the *Times*' piece noted he was a retired carpenter and electrician, and "...many faded newspaper clippings attested to his skill on the slab."

Fast forward again to 2006, when News discovered Scott's article, revealing that a Major League ballplayer was interred in HF Cemetery. Rhetta Dusett, a widow, the aforementioned neighbor on Parrish Road, and the keeper of Carmichael's scraps of memorabilia, responded to News' "Who Knows?" question in the *Genesee Valley Pennysaver*.

Unfortunately, we'll never know what happened to Chester's diamond career, or how he and Blanche came to reside in these parts. While they were Rhetta and Allen Dusett's good friends, he lived a quiet life, didn't talk about his long-lost pitching prowess, his perfect game, or a Major League career of seven innings. Some revelations are better left unsaid.

One thing is for sure. While there are others whose big league stats were microscopic, Chester "*Chet*" "*Mike*" Carmichael and Archie "Moonlight" Graham of "*Field of Dreams*" cinema fame, have something more in common. Photos show a handsome man in his late sixties, with the chiseled facial features of the actor who played Dr. Archibald Graham, the older "Moonlight" Graham in the movie... the immortal Burt Lancaster. [And to think, Chet's interred just a "*Texas Leaguer*" away from North Main Street.]

To say that the 2020-2021 school year was a strange one for the Lima Christian School athletic program would be an understatement.

The impact of COVID-19 on athletic schedules by shifting starting dates and compacting seasons was one factor. The other thing that was different for the LCS athletic program was the lack of boys teams at the varsity level. With low numbers of boys in the senior class (seven in the Class of 2021) and the junior class, Athletic Director Mike Burns and the varsity boys soccer coach, varsity boys basketball coach and varsity baseball coach made the decision to field junior varsity teams in those sports rather than have mostly sophomores, freshmen and some eighth-graders or seventh-graders take on mainly juniors and seniors. The feeling was that the student-athletes would hopefully gain some confidence as they played teams that they could be competitive with and also have a bit more fun. That left it to the Lady Saints squads to carry the school's banner on the varsity playing field.

Lima Christian's girls also did well in the classroom with two of the four senior girls on athletic teams also making the honor roll this year. Of the 10 senior girls in the Class of 2021, four of them played at least one varsity sport and three of them were three-sport athletes.

LCS plays in the Private-Parochial League and each year that league recognizes Athletes of the Year from each school. The two LCS student-athletes selected for the honor this year were Grace Britton and Rebecca Tillapaugh.

Britton played on the varsity soccer team

for four seasons. A co-captain, she was a starting defender and a midfielder, tallying one assist last fall. She competed on the varsity basketball team for three years. A co-captain and starting guard/forward, Britton was third on the team with 56 points (8.0 points per game average). Britton was on the varsity softball team for two seasons. She was the team's starting first baseman and was fourth on the team in hits with 14.

Tillapaugh competed for the varsity soccer team for four years. A co-captain, Tillapaugh started at either midfielder or forward and led the team with nine goals with two assists. She played varsity basketball for four years. Tillapaugh was a co-captain and a starting guard/forward, leading the team with 80 points (11.429 points per game). Switching from starting catcher to starting shortstop this spring, she led the team in hits with five and in runs scored with five while also finishing with five stolen bases and one run batted in.

Polisseni, a Class of 2021 graduate, played soccer, hockey and golf. Polisseni was on the varsity soccer team for four years. He was a starting defender and helped the unit record two shutouts. He also competed for the combined Gates Chili/Wheatland-Chili/Eastridge/Wayne varsity ice hockey team for four seasons. Last winter, he was a forward and led the team with 16 goals and was third on the team with 13 assists. He joined the varsity golf team this spring and had a 65.8 average for a round.

The year also saw the retirement of legendary Wheatland-Chili Girls Varsity Soccer team coach Gary Ward, who retired following the end of the girls soccer season in November 2020. His daughter, Jen Quinn, has been named the team's

Swimming: The Lady Wildcats were 0-8 and did not compete in the Genesee League Championship and the Genesee/Niagara/Orleans Girls Championship was cancelled due to COVID. The boys also were 0-8 and did not compete in the Genesee League or Section V Class D Championships.

Boys Basketball: The Wildcat boys compiled an 11-4 record and, seeded second, won the Section V Class D1 title for the team's first sectional title since 1985.

Girls Basketball: The Lady Wildcats were very young this winter and finished 2-7, not qualifying for the Section V Class D1 Tournament as they were the #11 seed and only eight teams qualified this year.

Ice Hockey: The combined Gates Chili/Wheatland-Chili/Eastridge/Wayne team posted a 10-4 record and lost in the Section V Class A semifinals.

Girls Volleyball: W-C was 3-10 this spring and lost in the Section V Class D3 quarterfinals.

Golf: This squad had a 3-7 record this spring.

Softball: The Lady Wildcats went 0-12 this spring and did not compete in the Section V Class D1 Tournament after receiving the #12 seed.

Tennis: W-C finished with a 9-5 record and lost in the Section V Class D2 Team Tournament quarterfinals.

Track: The boys squad had a 2-3-1 record and claimed sixth at the Genesee Region League Championship and seventh in the Section V Class B4 Championship. Junior Aaron Lund won two sectional titles with a time of 16.60 in the 110 hurdles and a 1 minute, 0.94 second winning time in the 400 hurdles. The girls were 1-5 and wound up ninth in the league championship and 14th at the Section V Class B4 Championship.

Town & Village Update

Mayor, Supervisor Weekly Update As Of Friday, July 9th Police Matters, Job Openings, and New Projects

Village of Honeoye Falls

Rick Milne, Mayor:

"It's great to be on and see everyone, as always, from Honeoye Falls the keepers of the southern gate of Monroe County. You know Gerry you always talk about Rush being the best kept secret, and that may be the case, but you are no secret. Oh, that is for sure. And then I just also wanted to say, 'thanks' to Mike great job with Senator Galvin on that bill. It's very important, so kudos to you."

"Following up on village aspects, a little bit of an update or follow up on things we've been talking about for the last couple weeks. Some things have been made a little bit more formal in the last week. This past week the Village did sign the agreement and a new ambulance has now been ordered for the Honeoye Falls/Mendon Voluntary Ambulance. We expect that rig to be delivered in two or three months' timeframe."

"Again, as I mentioned last week, we appreciate our partners in this. This will fully be paid for out of capital reserve money that the Town of Mendon, the Village of Honeoye Falls, and the Town of West Bloomfield that was set aside through our agreement, so this is great for the ambulance."

"The Village also approved phase one of the new fire hall project in that space. This is specifically design planning and financial related. This will provide our estimated cost of the facility and what the concept design will be and the costing estimate. This phase will then allow the village to move through to the referendum process. We would expect that portion to be completed in the first quarter of 2022."

"So again, this is simply a planning and cost estimating phase, if you will, and design phase. Then also the Village this week did sign formally the agreement to move forward with the Hyde Park project. We expect this project to begin in late July, possibly early August, but it's being scheduled now. All Hyde Park residents and property owners that are specifically adjacent to Hyde Park will be notified well in advance of the project beginning and details of the project and that will certainly be sent on to the SENTINEL as well. Our expectation and desire is to have the Hyde Park repairs completed and the road open back to one way traffic before school opens this year."

"On a little side note, there is still potentially some litigation that is going to be taking place for the cost of this project. The Village Board felt very strongly that we needed to move this project forward before any further deterioration of Hyde Park occurs. These storms we've had over the last couple weeks have shown us even more erosion to that area. And we can't let it get out of control, so we need to move this project forward, and so we are doing so, so that is really what's happening in the village right now."

"We also and I'll just dovetail again a little bit into what Gerry said. Our meetings are all fully open to the general public, now moving forward for all of our meetings, but we will continue to have a zoom aspect as well, at least for now, so we appreciate the opportunity."

"Thanks to everyone else for all you do."

Village of Scottsville

Eileen Hansen, Mayor:

"We're doing well, good afternoon everyone. The Village Board of Trustees meeting will be held this week on Tuesday July 13 at 6:30pm in the municipal building. Again, remember that now they are in person meetings so you can come right down to the municipal office if you want to join in at the meeting. Vaccinated people are not required to wear masks but may do so if they want. It's a personal choice, but we do ask non vaccinated people to please wear a mask."

"Kristine Uribe, manager of the Greenway Trail, will be speaking at our Village Board meeting about the Greenway and work that is being done on the Greenway this summer. Remember, they are going to be working on resurfacing the Greenway from Oatka Creek up through Ballantyne Road. The bridge across Oatka Creek will be completely closed down during that time, so we want you to just remember that."

"And then she will also be discussing the fact that Scottsville is a trail town. We've been designated a trail town along the Greenway and, as such, there is a tentative plan for some improvements within Canawaugus Park itself, water stations, signage for history, for businesses in the area, that kind of thing. She will also present this to the board. I think they're talking about some increased parking spaces, which would be a real plus for our Park."

"Speaking of Canawaugus Park and the Greenway, I have been receiving comments and concerns about the Park from residents. As I've discussed before on this program, we've been overwhelmed with people since we were put on social media. It's not local people. We're getting a lot of people from around the area. I've been getting calls about being threatened and being harassed. We are addressing these problems."

"We have been talking about this for the past few months over the winter and spring with the Greenway people, with the Town, the Village, and we have called a meeting of the Greenway Manager. We had the Regional Director of the Parks. We had all the law enforcement from this area, including Monroe County Sheriff, State Troopers, the Park Police, the DEC police, and anyone else that might have some contact with this area."

"All of this, you know, has been addressed, and is being addressed. We have completed the signs for the park. There will be rules put up in the Park stating the guidelines for using the Park and we ask everybody to please follow these rules, the DPW will be installing these signs shortly."

"And let me remind residents, especially if you see any illegal activity or anything that could cause you concern, please call 911. Do not engage with any individuals if spoken to, says law enforcement. About this, they were hoping for increased coverage in the park."

"We want to make sure the park is safe for everybody visitors and residents alike, so please if you see something that shouldn't be going on, please call 911. That way, the police have a record of it and it helps us monitor the park."

"We are getting applications to fill a DPW Labor vacancy. Contact the Village office for details. Applications are due by July 16, and that is it for Scottsville right now."

Town of Mendon

John Moffitt, Supervisor:

"Thanks again for having us, we always look forward to this venue to explain to various people throughout our community and in our neighboring communities what's going on in the Town of Mendon. One good thing that we've all heard recently is the Mendon Carnival is back on for September. After Labor Day we're all looking forward to that and the more of these types of events that take place and where we feel like we're getting back to normal."

"Also on our next Town Board meeting, which is July 12th, the Town Board will be having a public hearing to abolish are Planned Unit Development portion of our code. We have felt that the current Code is lacking in terms of what Planned Unit Development really is. We've actually run it by Monroe County and they have said that what we have in our code really is not acceptable for a traditional PUD ("Planned Unit Development"), so we will be reviewing that going forward and establishing a new portion of our code for Planned Unit Development. We're not going to get rid of it permanently, but what we have now we're looking to abolish so that public hearing will take place on July 12th."

"Summer Rec is up and running we've had reports from the Director and everything seems to be going very well. We're once again pleased to see that event take place this year."

"We did receive a notice from the state that we will be receiving \$655,680 for the ARPA, which is funded through the federal government. That comes through and what they call two tranches, one this year and one next year. There's still a lot of information coming down on that, and now that the Board is looking at various aspects of that funding and how that funding can be used to utilize the best interest of our residents."

"The former librarian and the director of the Mendon Public Library is retiring and I believe they are interviewing. It is a civil service position, and they are interviewing people off the civil service list."

"We have sent out a request for some speed monitors. Recently I was over in Farmington and saw some monitors that they have that are very mobile. They're also solar powered. I did talk to the supervisor over in Farmington and we did send out an RFP so we're hoping to get some responses from that and be able to put up some further speed monitors throughout town."

"We also have an Eagle Scout project that is for retiring flags at the Community Center which also is the location of Post 664 of the American Legion. That will be around the backside of the building off the parking lot and people can bring their American flags there for legal and proper disposal."

"And that pretty much covers

Mike Falk, Supervisor:

"The Conesus Lake Association, July 24 and August 3, will be offering free pontoon boat tours to Livingston County veterans. Anyone who is interested in more information can call 346-6864 to sign up. This is part of the Outdoor Rec Program that the Livingston County Board of Supervisors funded."

"This spring I asked Senator Galvin to consider sponsoring the Assembly bill for veterans school tax exemption in the Senate. I was notified this past Thursday, that this has come true. S7277 is the companion bill with Senator Gavin's name on it and has been referred to the Rules Committee. The bill requires school districts, to provide veterans alternative exemptions, with the cost borne by New York State. Now, with it in both houses, it can move forward."

"I attended a press conference at Mulligan Farms this past Tuesday, where Senator Schumer announced \$11.3 million in USDA funds for fiber optic based broadband in Livingston County. Empire Access is going to be the vendor for this. Empire Access, of course, was voted best in class high speed provider by PC magazine. Lima residents and both the Village and Town are encouraged to go to the Empire Access website and sign up if you are interested in your service. The timeline of course for installation is not set yet, but the work is to start almost immediately. The matching money comes from Livingston County and that has to be spent first so there's nothing holding the project back."

"The Crossroads Festival signs are going up, and we are less than three weeks until the opening parade which is July 28 at 6pm. See Lima fest.org for all the details, there is still room for a couple of teams in the bed races area and a couple of teams in the Barbecue competition."

"The Lima Town Board this past Tuesday approved a public hearing for the August meeting to set water rates for the water districts, which are outside of the village. You'll see it published in the SENTINEL what the proposed rates are."

"What you should know is that Rush is the best kept secret in Western New York and boy, are we proud of that."

"I would like to talk about an involvement that we are going to pursue. It's called a Stop the Violence Mission. I know John was there about a month or so ago when we had a meeting with Gates Police Chief James VanBrederode, State Police, Livingston County Sheriff and some others."

"Their concern is, and you don't always see this in the media, but their concern is that violence is creeping into the suburbs and I think that includes us. And we are going to become involved and do whatever we can to maintain the peace and tranquility that has been part of the Rush environment since the beginning of time."

"We don't want violence impacting our community, and we also don't think that other communities should tolerate it either so I'm hoping that everyone will get involved. There's going to be a march on Thursday July 15th that's sponsored by Henrietta, Rush, and the Brighton Collaborative March, and I hope that people will become involved in that. For anyone who wants to have answers to their questions, you can call me at 533-9058. I have a flyer that I can send out via email. The bottom line is we've got to put a stop to this before it gets to our shore. Some of these things can take on a life of their own and then it's harder to deal with, so we want to make sure that we deal with that, right now, when it's in the bud stage."

"We are, as I said in last week's program, we are proceeding forth with the budget period of time, and I hope that citizens will become involved at least as spectators to the budget proceedings."

"We now have open meetings where you can walk in and attend the meeting with no restrictions unless of course you're not vaccinated. If you aren't vaccinated, we ask you to wear a face mask. Otherwise, no restrictions and you can watch also on Zoom. Zoom is an option that citizens can use if they don't want to come out in inclement weather or the heat or whatever. We will continue to have our meetings broadcast via Zoom."

"I think I'll leave you with that, been talking more than usual, but I hope people will become involved in the Stop the Violence Mission so that we don't have to tolerate it here."

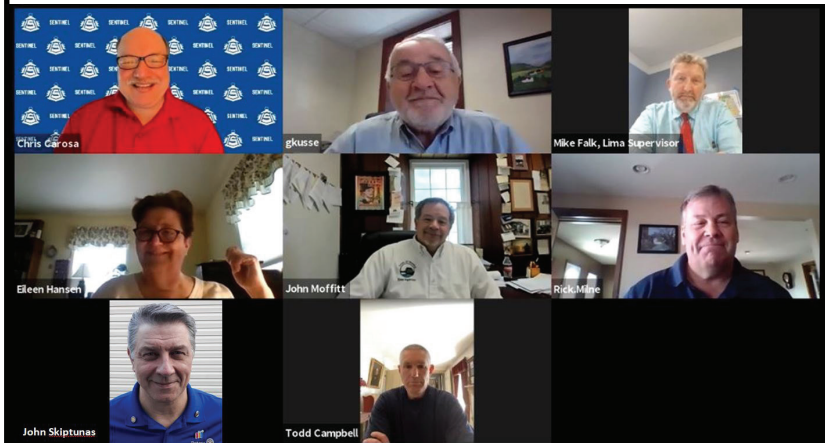

Empire Access and Livingston County Announce Receipt of Public-Private Partnership Grant

\$11.3 Million in Federal Funding for Broadband

Thousands of addresses in Livingston County are slated for high-speed Internet access as part of a \$11.3 million grant award announced last week by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development Broadband ReConnect Program. The award was presented to Empire Access, a local Internet provider, which established a creative public-private partnership with Livingston County at the outset of the grant application process. Livingston County was a sponsor of the grant application and will provide match and seed capital for the effort.

The award is one of the first steps toward the County fulfilling its ambitious 'Light Up Livingston' initiative, which aims to offer high-speed, fiber-optic Internet to every address point in the county.

As part of the public-private partnership, Empire Access will own and operate hundreds of miles of a fiber optic network that will offer reliable, high-speed Internet access to the County's most underserved and unserved areas. Upon completion, household, farm, business and school addresses on the network will have access to 1 Gigabit-level Internet service. The fiber-to-the-premises network will be capable of delivering services of 100 Mbps to 10 Gbps depending on the need of the customer.

It is anticipated that the design and engineering of the network will be completed in 2021 and construction will begin in 2022.

It returned to in person services on Sunday, June 6. The new CDC guidance gives us a path forward with the effectiveness of the vaccines. Life with the (Word) Smiths

OUR TOP 10 MOST BIZARRE SUMMER OLYMPIC EVENTS

This story took a left-hand turn when COVID turned everyone's world upside down in 2020. In anticipation of the pending Summer Olympics in Tokyo, we had written a piece about the most bizarre events to ever take place at the games. For obvious reasons, that one went on hold until now. With the rescheduled games slated to start in Tokyo on Friday, July 23, we're pulling this piece out of moth balls and trotting it out to get everyone psyched for the 2021 games.

Rather ironically, it was a local history story we were working on that sparked our interest in the concept of quirky Olympic events. How many of you knew that there was a world-record-holding member of the U.S. Olympic Women's Swim Team who lived in Scottsville for 70 years? Well, it's true.

Her name was Charlotte Boyle and after her Olympic years, she ended up marrying Wheatland writer Henry Clune (1890-1995, yes the dude lived to be 105 years old!) His 80-year literary career included writing 14 books and a long-running column called "Seen and Heard" which appeared for decades in the *Rochester Democrat & Chronicle*.

So we're going to use this as the lead-in to the main theme of this feature which is to share with you our personal Top 10 list of the most bizarre sports to actually become official events at the Summer Olympics. We're sure you won't want to miss that but before we begin our countdown with #10, here's the scoop on the Scottsville swimmer.

WRITING & ROMANCE -

Apparently writing for the paper back in the 1920's was a career that carried some provocative perks, one of which was the ability to hook up with world class Olympic athletes. Such was the case with hometown Henry when he found himself dating 1920 Olympic team member Charlotte Boyle whose aquatic talents were actually quite diverse.

In terms of seductive pick-up lines a woman might have at her disposal, Charlotte was armed with one of the best. When their romance began in 1921, Charlotte was able to honestly tell Henry that within the past few years she had on multiple occasions broken the world record in the "Plunge for Distance."

In a classic one-thing-leads-to-another scenario, our exploratory dive into the depths of the history of the "plunge" exploded into this manifesto on the summer games most maniacal moments. After Henry personally experienced Charlotte's Plunge for Distance his only option was obvious. He married her and the couple spent the next 70 years living together in Scottsville.

Sexual double entendres aside, let us share some of Charlotte's stats after which we will proceed to our Top 10 list of the most bizarre Summer Olympic events ever. In one of our motifs, back by popular demand, we have also composed a limerick for each event. At the 1920 Olympics in Antwerp, Belgium, Charlotte Boyle competed in the 100-meter freestyle. She was also a world record holder in the 200-meter freestyle.

Another event at which Charlotte excelled was the aforementioned Plunge for Distance. While Charlotte was breaking world records in this event in 1920, it does not appear on her Olympic résumé because, for reasons which will soon be explained, the Plunge for Distance had been



dropped as an official Olympic event by the time of the 1920 Olympics.

#10 - THE PLUNGE FOR DISTANCE

At this point we'll begin our countdown by designating the #10 spot on our list of most bizarre Summer Olympic events to the Plunge for Distance. So, on that note, ladies and gentlemen, let the games begin!

While the Plunge is occasionally attempted by modern-day swimmers as a novelty, it had disappeared from any serious competitions by the 1930's. The Plunge For Distance enjoyed a reign of popularity from the mid-1800's through the 1920's. The zenith of credibility for the Plunge occurred when it was named as an official event at the 1904 Olympics, but by the 1930's it was basically shamed into retirement.

WHAT WENT WRONG? - So what in the world was this Plunge For Distance, and why in the world did it go from Olympic status to extinction in just a matter of decades? Here are the details regarding the rules of the event.

In 1920 the American Swimming Association's Official Swimming Guide offered the following definition of the event ... *the Plunge For Distance is a dive from a stationary take-off, which is free from spring, from a height of 18" above the water. Upon reaching the water the plunger glides face downward for a period of 60 seconds without imparting any propulsion to the body from the arms and legs.*

So in layman's terms, the contestants dove into the water and glided as far as they could in a minute. Sounds like perhaps an interesting activity for a summer day at the lake but hardly an Olympic event, right?

HERE'S THE SKINNY - But

what was it that caused the event to be shamed into extinction? The Plunge For Distance came to be dominated by overweight people who had little or no athletic ability. Let's analyze the physics involved in this "sport". There are really only two factors in play.

#1) The contestants needed to launch from the starting gate as strongly as possible in order to generate the greatest forward propulsion and granted, there would be an element of athleticism to this component of the event.

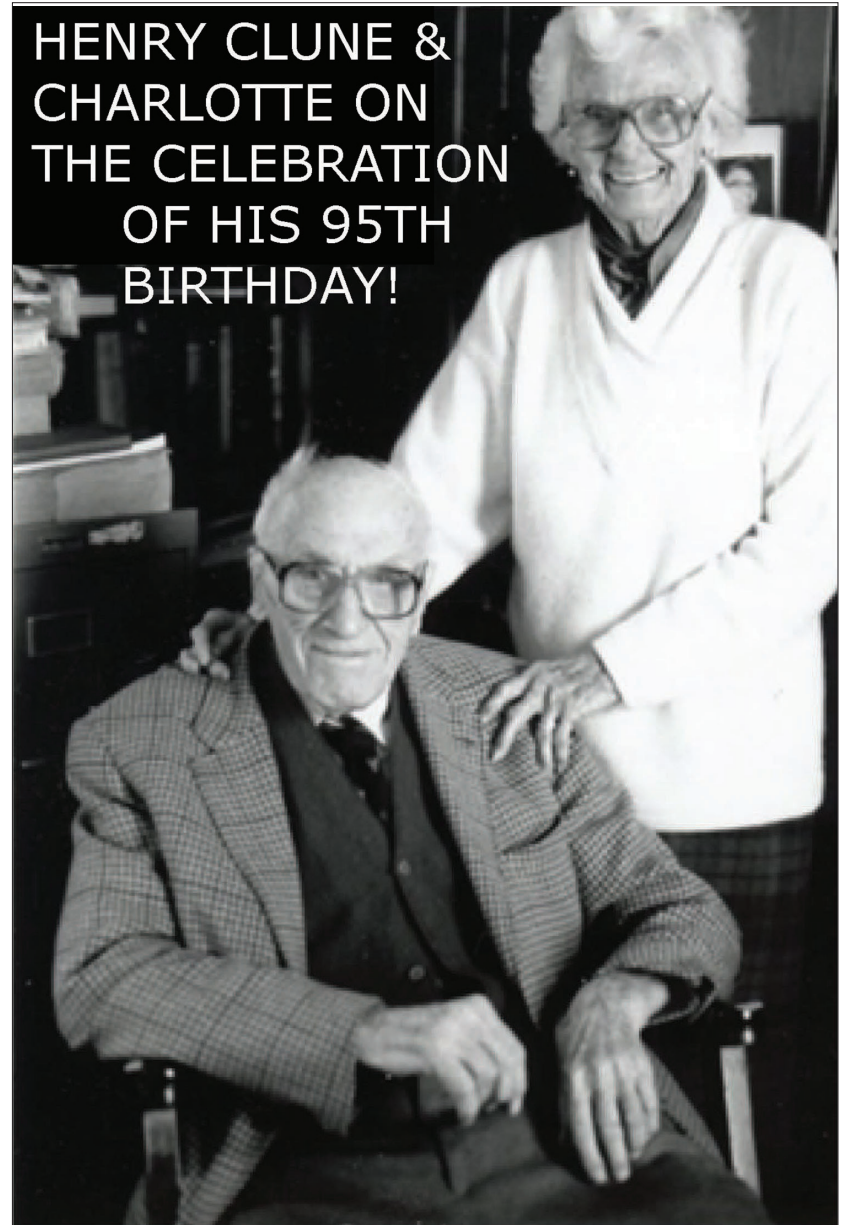
#2) But once in the water, if we can return to the analysis from the perspective of physics, it all boiled down to the principle of inertia. As the bodies glided through the water, the greater the weight, the greater the forward momentum.

TERRIBLE TESTIMONIALS - The *Boston Globe* described the Plunge For Distance as, "a competition favoring mere mountains of fat who fall in the water more or less successfully and depend upon inertia to get their points for them."

New York Times sportswriter John Kiernan wrote that the event was, "the slowest thing in the way of athletic competition," and that, "the stylish-stout chaps who go in for this strenuous event merely throw themselves heavily in to the water and float along like icebergs in the shipping lanes."

At this point people's reactions to the Plunge For Distance might range from appealing to appalling but wherever you might personally fall on that spectrum, there's one general question we feel many might be wondering. Approximately what were the winning distances? How far could the best in the world glide in the water after diving in from a stationary platform?

RECORD SETTERS - As your trustworthy source for information both trivial and triumphant, here are

your winners. In the 1904 Olympics, the only time the Plunge For Distance was an official event, the U.S.A.'s William Dickey won the gold medal with a distance of 62 feet, 6 inches. Assuming the sport does not mount an unlikely comeback that will forever remain the Olympic record.

As we said, U.S. Olympic swimmer Charlotte Boyle was a standout competitor in this sport who eventually married Henry Clune and lived most of her life in Scottsville. She broke the women's world record multiple times between 1917 and 1920, with her peak performance settling at 66 feet.

As the sport was fading to non-existence in the 1920's and 1930's, world records in the event continued to be extended. Both existing records are held by Brits. The final landing points have the women's record of 71 feet being set by Hilda Dand in 1925 and the men's record of 86 feet, 8 inches was achieved by F.W. Parrington

in 1933.

FINAL PLUNGE - So the story of why the plug was pulled on the Plunge For Distance will always remain a paradoxical piece of Olympic history. While every other event on our list was terminated at some point, the Plunge is the only one where the phrase "shamed into extinction" might be appropriately applied. Apparently that's the risk you run when the athletes dominating your sport can legitimately be compared to mountains of fat who float along like icebergs in the shipping lanes. Too bad the Titanic didn't run into a Plunger rather than an actual iceberg.
