Local Rotary Clubs Support Annual "Mr. HFL" Contest

Honeoye Falls-Mendon Rotary is recognizing the hard work and dedication of the Honeoye Falls-Lima High School Interact Club during this very challenging year. These teens managed to bring some cheer and good fun to a community struggling its way through the pandemic.

Elise Lupisella, 18, served as President of Interact, a club which develops leadership skills and taps into the power of a fundamental Rotary tenet, Service Above Self. Interact organizes at least two projects every year. Rotary members mentor, advise and help them as needed. This year was mostly about encouraging members to be creative and to not give up. Elise and her team accomplished both!

Now this 2021 graduate heads off to a six-year program at Nazareth to become a Doctor of Physical Therapy. Rotary asked Elise to tell the community, in her own words, what Service Above Self meant for the Interact Club during the pandemic. Here's what she had to say:

"Since eighth grade, I was determined to be Interact Club president my senior year. I pictured numerous service events and leadership opportunities. Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, the service opportunities were immediately limited. However, I knew I wasn't going to let COVID ruin Interact."

"First, we started with our annual clean up at Rotary Park in Honeoye Falls, which was able to proceed as normal with added masking of course. Next, we were stumped, as we knew our annual Halloween party could not take place. Our board went to work, brainstorming possible COVID-safe options for the community. I stumbled upon a Halloween scavenger hunt with an added twist: local businesses volunteered and provided candy for their designated pit-stops. Interact members distributed balloons to mark each location and handed out candy to "trick or treaters." Prior to the hunt, we organized a costume parade around Pinehurst to include all residents of the community in a safe manner. The Halloween party was just one modified event this year due to the pandemic. Throughout the year we innovated and thought of safe ways to carry out other events as well."

"One of our main events was the annual Mr. HFL male pageant. After the difficulties of this past year, Interact was determined to put on an incredible Mr. HFL performance. On May 29th, seven contestants competed for the 14th annual title, and the grand prize of \$500,

donated by the HF-M Rotary Club. Each contestant learned a group dance, performed a talent, and competed in a question and answer category. Talents ranged from jazzercise with Jack Graney to Bohemian Rhapsody played and sung by Alec Bhaskaran. Ultimately, Eddie Gartland claimed the Mr. HFL title with his original song about the past year. Alec Bhaskaran came in second place with an impressive question and answer paired with a fantastic talent, winning \$200 donated from Lima Rotary. Third place was awarded to Adam Santucci for his creative and humorous musical interpretation of HFL faculty, winning \$100, which was donated in part by Lima Rotary and HFL Interact."

"The profits from the show are used to refund the Interact Club account, and the excess funds are donated to a charity of the club's choosing. This year we chose Linking Hands for Learning, a nonprofit organization focused on building schools in the remote mountain communities of Nicaragua."

HFMVA Thanks Lachlan Youngblut for Helping Others During the Covid-19 Pandemic

Covid 19 altered, but did not stop, the activities of Honeoye Falls Boy Scout Troop 10 or the Honeoye Falls-Mendon Volunteer Ambulance.

One particular scout, Lachlan Youngblut, was looking for a community service project with HFMVA and eventually got into contact with John Walsh, a HFMVA volunteer. John had previously presented a CPR/AED and First Aid course for Troop 10 before the pandemic restrictions went into effect.

Getting help to people who need medical care quickly is a very important part of what HFMVA does, and Lachlan aided in this effort. People who need help are often anxious until an ambulance crew is on scene. HFMVA crews use the latest navigation systems and their local knowledge to get to patients as quickly as they can. However, the navigation system is not always perfect and neither is the information callers provide to

911, creating gaps in the information provided to crews at the time of dispatch, which do not cover the precise location of trailer park homes and some apartment complexes. After discussing this need with John, Lachlan set out to map the individual location of trailer homes and apartments for every unit in HFMVA's district. The maps that Lachlan developed using Google Maps and physically mapping each unit at each site will help HFMVA get to patients sooner, help reduce patient anxiety, and may one day save someone's life.

All the work performed for this project was done meeting the Covid19 restrictions for HFMVA and Troop 10 scouts. Lachlan's attitude about his volunteer scouting activity was expressed very succinctly in an email he wrote stating "Just give me some deadlines and I'm on it.", which is the embodiment of the Scout motto "Be Prepared".

Accidents keep HF Fire department busy

A portion of Cheese Factory Road in Mendon was closed for a while in the morning on Monday, August 9, due to a crash.

Livingston County Approves \$97K in Funding for Pioneer Library System

The Livingston County Board of Supervisors approved \$97,000 in funding for the Pioneer Library System (PLS) during their July 28 regular board meeting. The funds will go directly toward improving and expanding PLS library services in their eight Livingston County library locations.

"Livingston County is the only

one of our four counties in the Pioneer Library System that offers any type of county-based funding directly to libraries," said PLS Executive Director Ron Kirsop. "I think that's pretty incredible and I can't commend Ian Coyle and the rest of the Board enough for their continued support, especially considering what we've been through with COVID and tighter funding. We appreciate it a lot and we're glad they keep libraries, literacy, and education at the forefront of their minds."

A large portion of the funding will go directly toward supporting Livingston County libraries and the services they offer, such as community outreach, training and education, and inter-library loans. PLS will earmark a smaller percentage of the funds for competitive grants among those same libraries. The grants will make possible specific, small-scale capital improvement projects that wouldn't otherwise be covered under currently available library construction aid. Kirsop explained these projects could be anything from general maintenance to repairs and upgrades.

PLS is a New York State-chartered, cooperative public library system, which serves 42 public libraries in Livingston, Ontario, Wayne, and Wyoming counties. One of 23 public library systems in New York State, PLS was created to enhance the service of and promote cooperation among its member libraries.

FOUR RIGHTS YOU HAVE AT YOUR AIRPORT SECURITY SCREENING

With the light at the end of the pandemic tunnel finally creeping into view, we're all finally starting to venture out into the life-gets-back-to-normal mode. To that end, we thought we'd take a look at some airport protocols just to get you up to snuff before you take your comeback flight.

Next week we're going to brief you on the 7 foods the FAA doesn't want you to bring on flights. But before the flight attendant confiscates your lunch, let's at least get you through your initial security screening. There are actually four specific rights you have during that process which you may not know about, but we're here to fill you in on what they are.

#1 DATA PRIVACY - As you move your personal belongings through the process, probably included in the mix would be your phone and some type of tablet or laptop. And on those devices you probably have hundreds, if not thousands, of emails, pictures and personal files.

Airport security can't touch these without a warrant. The law reads, "It's unconstitutional for TSA (Transportation Security Administration), officials to search your electronic devices without reasonable suspicion of criminal activity." This is similar to restrictions placed on police officers who cannot search your vehicle or home without a warrant (unless, again, they have reasonable suspicion).

#2 -NURSING MOTHERS - Mothers Must Receive Reasonable Accommodations When Nursing. In 2018, the Friendly Airports for Mothers (FAM) Act was signed into law. This legislation requires all medium-to-large sized airports to provide appropriately furnished lactation rooms in every terminal. And also breast milk is exempt from the maximum limits for carry-on liquids; nursing mothers can carry reasonable quantities of breast milk, formula, or juice through airport security.

#3 FACIAL SCANS - It's hard to watch a crime drama on TV without facial recognition technology popping up somewhere in the storyline. But some people would rather not have their face floating around on the internet where it might be susceptible

to nefarious access. If asked by TSA officials to agree to a facial scan you have the right to refuse.

#4 PRACTICAL ACCOMMODATIONS - There's no getting around an airport screening, but you do have some rights on how you are screened. If you choose, you do have the right to a private screening if, for example, you're embarrassed to be screened in public or you have fears concerning the health risks associated with electronic scanners. You also do not have to remove items worn for religious reasons such as burkas (Muslims) or turbans (Sikhs).

CLOSING BONUS - We thought we'd throw in a little airport trivia as a free bonus to this piece. Did you know that there is one huge international airport that sits on a manmade island? That would be Hong Kong International Airport and here's the backstory. Hong Kong is a city on an island which is one of the most densely populated areas in the world.

The original Hong Kong airport had been built in 1925 and by the end of the century, the upsizing of aircraft in the world of aviation had rendered the old airport obsolete. Given the density of the buildings and population on the island there was absolutely no possibility for expansion of the original site.

In exploring this option, Hong Kong landed on a rather unique strategy. Hong Kong owned two uninhabited islands off its coast and it was determined that if all the land that was above sea level could be flattened, the two islands could be connected and joined as one. So what started out as two separate islands with some hills and terrain was transformed into a single larger flat island.

It all worked out pretty well with one caveat being that the new airport is 20 miles from the city proper. The airport is connected to Hong Kong by a network of bridges and tunnels. Then-president Bill Clinton was one of the new airport's first foreign passengers to arrive, landing only hours after it opened on July 6, 1998.

The Carosa Commentary

Journey Beyond the Center of the ‘Stacks’

Science majors got their own libraries. These contained the specialized journals of their respective fields. Much smaller than expansive University-wide libraries, they offered cozier confines, their size based on the number of students majoring in that subject.

Yale’s Astronomy Library was also probably the smallest library on campus. I was the only Astronomy & Physics major in my class. (Back in my day, the only way you could major in astronomy was to double major in physics. It was a lot of classes, with precious little room for elective courses like philosophy, literature, history, and, well, just about everything else.)

My virtually personal reference room was a treasure trove of ancient knowledge. And by ‘ancient’ I mean the actual data is centuries old. Astronomy, for the most part, collects light data from distant stars, galaxies, and nebulae. The objects responsible for these traveling photons lie lightyears distant, sometimes thousands of light years away.

While a light year represents a measure of distance, it also tells you how long ago the source originally emitted that light. For example, the nearest star (Proxima Centauri) is a little more than 4 light years away. The light we see from that star today is therefore a little more than 4 years old. Likewise, the light you see from Antares in the constellation Scorpio, the very bright reddish star you see above the summer horizon, predates the Magna Carta.

Incidentally, in case you’re curious, the farthest star you can see with the unaided eye is 16,308 light years away. It’s in the circumpolar (which means we can see it all year) constellation Cassiopeia. Don’t bother looking for it, though. The skies here are too bright.

The other aspect of “ancient,” though isn’t that old, it only seems that old. I’m talking about the facility itself. It was probably new at some point (I’m guessing the 1950s, maybe mid-60s). When I first stepped into its brightly lit interior in 1978 it looked dated.

Located in a building called “J.W. Gibbs” (which looked like the kind of building a 1950s sci-fi artist would have drawn), the library itself was housed in the far end of the equally typical sci-fi-ish hallway (you know, the dimly lit one with antiseptic walls and solid color doors you swear would swoosh! open like on *Star Trek*.)

My first experience there definitely awed me. My assignment for the very first Astronomy class I took (“Observational Astronomy”) had me trek to the library. It was not quite a light year away, but it was on the other side of campus (and uphill both ways!). I had to dig through old plates of negatives to determine stellar motions.

Yeah, I know. That sounds boring to you. But to the 18-year-old me, it was a dream come true. (Go ahead, call me a geek. I was a proud nerd and loving every minute of it.)

Honestly, I don’t remember going to the “real” library much. My classmates would go to “Cross Campus Library” – a futuristic underground labyrinth complete with private study carrels and the usual kind of library bookshelves you’d normally find in your favorite local library.

Cross Campus also had something else: a snack center, complete with one of those new-fangled (remember, this was 1978) kitchen appliances called a microwave oven. This device was the reason for most of my visits to that library.

No, it wasn’t to make “microwave popcorn.” (The nation was enthralled in its Orville Redenbacher Phase at that point. Microwave popcorn, though

invented in 1947, didn’t achieve mass market popularity until the 1980s.)

Rather, I would walk through the wintry weather to reheat the lasagna my mother included in her periodic care packages. (These were homemade, so it really was her lasagna.)

Funny story about that. The Cross Campus snack center was located within the bowels of the library. You had to go through a security check to enter or exit that library. When I was carrying out my lasagna in a big cardboard box, the security guard, suspecting I was stealing books, asked me what I had in the box.

“Lasagna,” I snapped back. He rolled his eyes in skepticism. Then he opened the box and became a believer.

The real library story had to wait until senior year. That’s the moment when a couple of elective classes took me to Sterling Memorial Library, Yale’s main library. Supposedly connected to Cross Campus via underground tunnels (I never traveled this route, but I trust the others that say they did). It’s seven story tower contains 16 levels of stacks.

You must understand this. Ever since I was a young boy, my mother not only taught me to appreciate the sweet taste of homemade lasagna, but she also impressed upon me the glory of libraries. We’d visit them wherever

we traveled. Now you know why I was so at home in the Astronomy Library.

But when I (finally) stepped foot into Sterling Memorial Library, I felt like Dorothy in Oz, except I had no desire to go home. In fact, there was one section in particular that I wanted to bring home with me. Here’s the story of what got me there.

Taking a rare non-science course, the professor gave us our assignment. We were to present a recommendation to the leader who was about to make a historical decision. But – and here’s the twist – it had to be from a point of view contemporary to the time the decision was made. In other words, we could not use any information that was unknown at the time, we had to mimic how then current decision makers would be thinking, and, in general, we were required to become method actors.

The critical question was how does one travel back in time?

That’s when I discovered the magazine stacks in Sterling Memorial Library. Imagine entering a closet and turning left to find a never-ending narrow alcove containing nothing but musty old bound magazines encased in wrought iron mesh cages. There, I found my time period (August of 1945 – I was writing about the decision to drop the atomic bomb to end World War II) and leafed through the pages.

Something happened at that moment. I wasn’t only reading the current reporting on the subject. I was also scanning the ads, the editorials, the letters to the editor, and taking in how current events had shaped the writing of all other articles.

These magazine pages revealed a collage of context you could not possibly obtain from merely reading the single relevant article you were looking for. Their placement,

format, and juxtaposition with all the other content told a much fuller story.

In those hours, I came to love the magazine stacks. I would visit them without an assignment just for fun. I’d pick a week or month or event and read all the different magazines’ takes on the topic. To repeat, I did this just for fun. It was like going down a rabbit hole just to see what you could find.

And I dreamed that, one day, I would be able to recreate that same feeling in my own library. I saved every newsweekly, science journal, in fact, every magazine I ever subscribed to.

I am happy to report Providence has blessed me with the discipline to realize, albeit on a much smaller scale, this very dream.

And now, for the rest of the story...

Yale razed the J.W. Gibbs building to build a more modern science building. In the process, the astronomy department was relocated to some random Victorian-Era homes at the bottom of the Science Hill. I have yet to know what happened to the library.

It gets worse. Several years ago, when travelling to New Haven, I took my usual diversion into the magazine stacks. What I discovered horrified me. The magazines had all been purged. “Why?” I asked the librarian. “Because all the articles are digitized now for easy retrieval,” he said.

Just like that, decades of immeasurable context had been evaporated. Students today can no longer discover what I had once found. The hidden story within the pages of stories is forever gone.

For me, I can continue to tilt at technology’s windmills.

I have my own stacks.

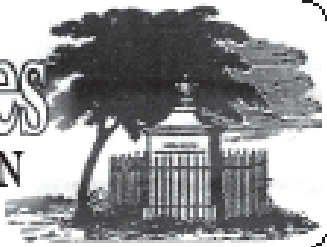

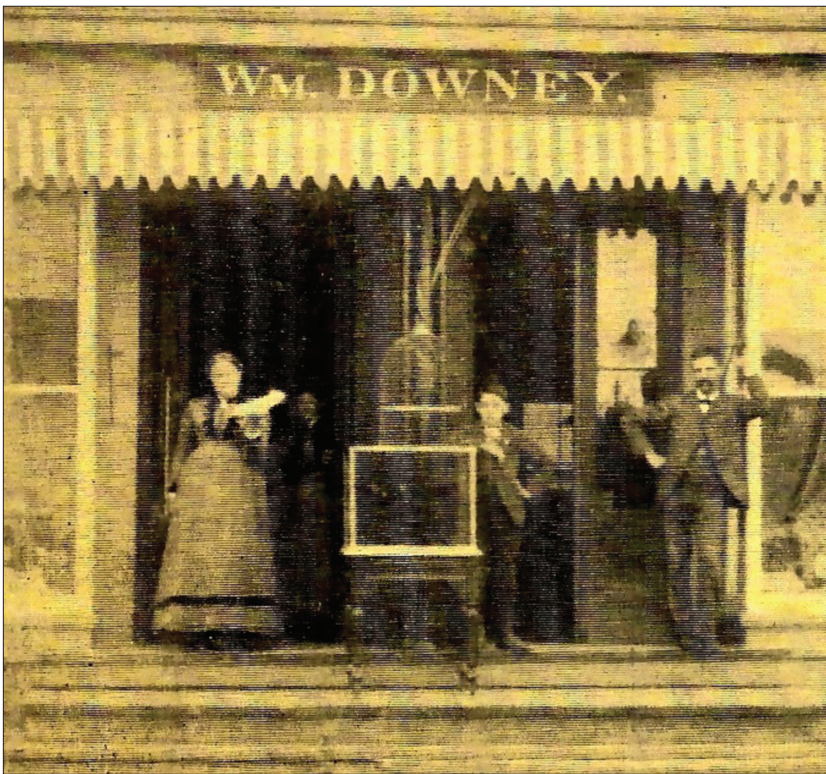

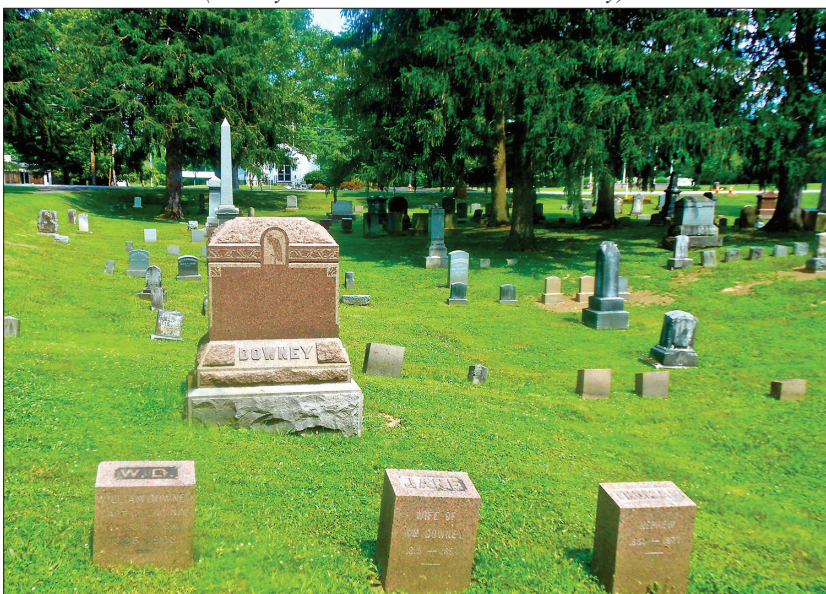
But Will, do ya know who rides out that flood and comes out dry, purty and smellin' like a rose every year?

Have you seen the latest copy of *New York State Conservationist*?

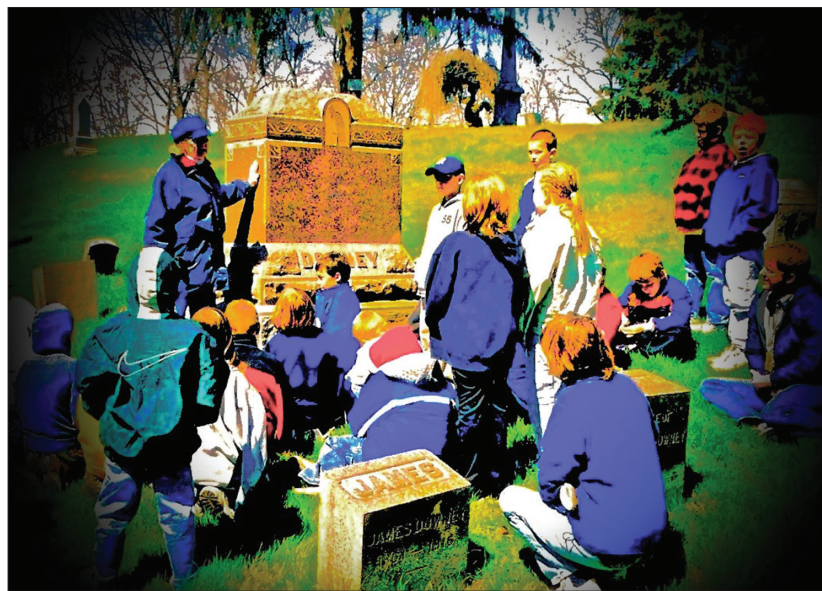

"Winter in the Valley of the Mohawk," shows hunters returning to their long-house village with bounty for the cooking fires. Considering our latest weather, the viewer can feel the chill settling in on the closing day. Though the distant river can't be mistaken for Honeoye Creek, you could almost think it was our own Totiakton, the 1600's Seneca town along present-day Plains Road.

Mayor, Supervisor Weekly Update As Of Friday, August 8th Hyde Park Repair On Time, Delta Variant/ARPA Funds Update

Village of Scottsville

Eileen Hansen, Mayor:

"Good afternoon, everyone, and thank you for this time to speak to the people of the Village of Scottsville. There is a Board of Trustees meeting on Tuesday August 10 at 6:30pm in the municipal building. With all the new Delta Variant and everything, masks are required for any unvaccinated visitors. We're strongly recommending masks for vaccinated visitors as per CDC guidelines, so please do consider that if you're coming to our meeting on Tuesday."

"The first portion of our ARPA funds have been released. My Treasurer has informed me that it is deposited in our account. The Board is looking at the best possible uses for this money. We have to meet the pandemic response needs and to prepare for the future. So, we have a few things that we're considering and we'll be discussing this a little more at our board meeting on Tuesday."

"Some of the things we can do with the money are public health expenditures, negative economic impacts caused by this public health emergency, replacing lost public sector revenue, premium pay for central workers, and investing in water and sewer infrastructure. As we've researched a little more, it also says some things about parks and outdoor recreation, so we have some real flexibility in these areas and we'll be discussing that at our board meeting on Tuesday."

"Our Canawaugus Park and Greenway update. I know I mentioned last week that the bridge would be closed starting Monday, but they've decided to do some trimming before they start. So, right now it's still open. They're doing the trimming along the Greenway and it will be closed once they're ready to do the resurfacing. We will let you know when that begins and the bridge and the trail are closed down."

"The updated website is up and running and we've been reviewing it and sent some revisions to the Genesee Penny Saver who built our website. The glitches are being corrected, so keep an eye on that and you'll see what's going on in the Village."

"I do have one thing to add, I got word from our DPW in terms of garbage and recycling collection that our transfer stations have been inundated and haven't been able to keep up with transferring the waste and the recycling. Because of that difficulty in getting it to the correct sites, there may be a slowdown in when we pick up trash and recycling in the coming week. So please keep an eye out on our Facebook page and our website and we will let you know if we're moving the days for garbage and recycling collection this week in order to accommodate this difficulty they're having in handling all of the trash. Please keep an eye out, it will just mean a delay in the pickup during the week, but we want to let everybody know so they don't think we have forgotten them. Thank you."

"Some happy news: longtime residents and former Village employees Shirley and Herman Yahn are celebrating their 70th wedding anniversary. We want to just congratulate them and give them our best wishes. This is a wonderful couple, We're really happy for them."

"So on that happy note I think I'm finished and I wish everyone a good week!"

Village of Honeoye Falls

Rick Milne, Mayor:

"Well, we're doing good, and thanks again for the opportunity. It's great to see everyone."

"In the Village of Honeoye Falls, the big news or the big push this past week and in the next couple weeks is going to be the Hyde Park project that has started. It's actually going very well. We think we may even be ahead of schedule. The company came in and did all the excavating work. The embankment retaining area is being put in now and should be completed by next week Wednesday."

"Then it's just a matter of putting in all the new infrastructure, the new road, so it's still potentially a three-week project or so. But it is moving ahead very, very well and we're excited to have that done. We are on track to have Hyde Park reopened before the school season starts, so our school buses and emergency services vehicles will be able to get up and down that road."

"The Fire Department project continues to move forward. A lot of discussions are happening. It's going to be a long-term project, but we're excited about what's happening there."

"Lastly, regarding the Covid variant, we're not seeing a lot of new ambulance calls but we do know that it's getting bigger in our area as well, so all we can do is suggest to folks that they mask up where they can, and they just be respectful of other people in their safety as well. I appreciate it."

Town of West Bloomfield

Todd D. Campbell, Supervisor:

"Thanks to everyone for their patience as we complete the QMH and Bean Hill Rd projects!"

"We are starting to see some impacts from the Delta variant. This will be a major topic for a couple of weeks, especially for the schools as the emergency orders for the state are no longer in place—so local authorities will be providing guidance."

"Ontario County will be working with many of the same parties/partners/agencies that coordinated through the Finger Lakes Control Room last year. Our County Administrator will be coordinating with his peers and also with the school Superintendents. The school discussion and guidance is important as we have multiple districts that have students from multiple counties so it helps to have consistent guidance. Please continue to follow the most current guidelines and be aware that they may change frequently as new cases change the status of the County and what the recommendations from the CDC are based on average number of daily/weekly cases."

Town of Mendon

John Moffitt, Supervisor:

"The wood doors at Town Hall are being refinished. We are still open and have an additional entrance on West Main St. We have been reassured by the company that the doors will be finished by Labor Day. Just in time for school taxes!"

"The Town of Mendon will start collecting school taxes for the Honeoye Falls-Lima Central School for all Town of Mendon residents in September. We also will collect for the Pittsford Central School, providing you are in the Town of Mendon. Please remember your address is not a good gauge on whether or not you live in the Town of Mendon. The Town does not set the rate or amount for school taxes, this is a service we provide for our residents, the HF-L and Pittsford school districts. If your taxes are escrowed, your tax payment will be completed by your financial institution. Call the Town Hall at 624-6060, if you have questions."

"The Citizens Advisory Committee for a Military Memorial will be presenting at the Town Board meeting on August 9. The Town Board will be making a decision after the meeting on an appropriate response."

"Just because we don't have snow and ice season, we all need to be diligent about our driving habits. Speeding is a frequent complaint throughout the Town. The Town Board will be considering purchasing two Solar Speed Detectors that can be placed on Town roads to make drivers more aware."

"The Town Budget is being compiled, as always we are always aware of the large burden on the taxpayers in New York State. Our tax rate has been flat or reduced for nine years, we will continue to be cognizant of the fact it's your money and our budget will continue to scrutinize every expense to provide the best value for a dollar."

Town of Lima

Mike Falk, Supervisor:

"We had a really great time with the Festival last week!"

"The Town of Lima did have its board meeting, though, on August 3rd and because the Town Board members are the Commissioners of the 4 water districts that the town operates outside of the village, we did take that opportunity to do the annual setting of the water rates."

"Water District 1 will see a decrease in their quarterly fee from \$45 to \$10. This is Ideson Road, half of Martin, and a couple houses on Bragg Street. Water costs are to remain the same as 6.05 a thousand. Water District 3: no changes, \$45 a quarter and 6.05 a thousand. Both of those districts are supplied by the City of Rochester water supply and the City of Rochester did not increase their rates. The District 3 is the rest of Martin, Bromley, and a couple houses on York."

"Water Districts 2 and 4, however, will remain at the \$45 a quarter and an increase to 6 a thousand. District 2 is Rochester Street north of the Village, Rexom, Slocum, a couple properties on Gale. District 4 is Tupelo Trail. The water increases are due to the fact that the supply there is from the Monroe County Water Authority which is considerably higher than the City of Rochester."

"The first Town Water Survey letters have been mailed. If you live outside of the Village of Lima and you do not have public water, you will be receiving one of these survey letters which will encourage you to go online and fill out a very quick survey, so that we can see where people's minds are. Please follow directions to take the online survey. If you have any questions, call me at the Town Hall at 582-1130."

"I am also working on our Town's 2022 budget presentation. It will be presented to the Board at the September 7th meeting."

"Some things, of course, are unavoidable and every four years we do a complete reassessment. The town wide reassessment is in 2022, and that means that we will incur extra hours in the assessor's office for the assessor and the assessor's clerk, so it's always a huge jump in their budget, and then the year later, it goes back down because we simply don't need the amount of time."

"Our goal is to stay underneath the 2% CAP and we will see how we do with that."

"The Town did receive its first draw of ARPA funding. There is a formula that sort of came out in the FAQs with it. That's our first stop. We have to look at the annual update document, which is what we have to file with the Comptroller's office for 2019 and 2020, pull all the numbers out, stuff them into the formula, and then that actually gives us what they believe to be our losses for Covid. We can then take the Covid losses and put them against the ARPA funding to sort of federalize it and move it into the regular budgeting area, and then the balance of it is sort of trapped in the five things that were mentioned before, about what you can do with the money. So, we'll see how that works. Probably in the next couple of weeks we'll have an answer there."

"The National Night Out for all sheriff's departments is August 17. The Livingston County Sheriff's Department will be celebrating National Night Out on August 17 from 6-8pm at the Leicester Village Park, which is right in the middle of Leicester. You'll be able to go there and see the SWAT team, the mounted patrol the canine unit, if you have a child seat in your car, they will inspect it. If you need a new one, they will put one in for you. They also do Save Kid IDs and that kind of thing. If you are interested in joining the Livingston County Sheriff's Department, they will also have recruiters and people there that can explain things and hand you an application, if you do like what you see."

"No report this week."

Gerald Kusse, Supervisor:

"Well, we are doing great, and I am wearing this mask and I'm going to take it off now I was wearing it only to express my feeling of uncertainty about where are these new strains of Covid going to go in the future, and how are they going to affect us."

"I happen to have had to cope with Covid, as you know, and I happen to be a fully vaccinated resident. But I'm not a scientist, so it's hard for me to hear all these different opinions about what is going to happen, how fast it might come, etc. etc. so I'm going to be one of those who plays on the safe side and not only rely on my previous infection with the disease but also my vaccinations and my mask. It's not that I think Halloween is coming early I just don't want to catch Covid again or any variant of it. It was not a fun experience."

"I want to add that we also have received our first half of the ARPA payments, and while that seems like a whole lot of money when I think about what our needs are – and I'm focusing especially on treated water to certain neighborhoods in town – it hardly makes a drop in the bucket when you consider the cost of bringing water in."

"I think we're going to be relying heavily on grant applications and see where that takes us. I am planning a meeting sometime in the next probably month or two, where we would have our State Assembly person, our County Legislature, I'm going to have a couple of engineers from local agent engineering firms and we're going to have a public meeting and just let people know we'd love to put water throughout town, but the cost of it is prohibitive and even when you get the state comptroller's office involved who makes a determination as to whether or not the people can afford it, it all becomes a very big kettle of soup with too many cooks."

"In my opinion, I think, treated water is very important to people. I hear people say yes, especially with kids. Well, I think it's even old people, I wonder why I think that, you can look at me and guess why I think that because treated water is the right thing for new infants and old souls, like myself."

"I also want to make an announcement that we are in the process of starting our budget season and we will have our departments split up into two different presentation meetings. That will be posted on our website, and I hope to see a lot of people there. Traditionally, residents don't tend to flock to budget meetings. "Yes, that's about all I have to share today. I thank you for providing us with this platform."

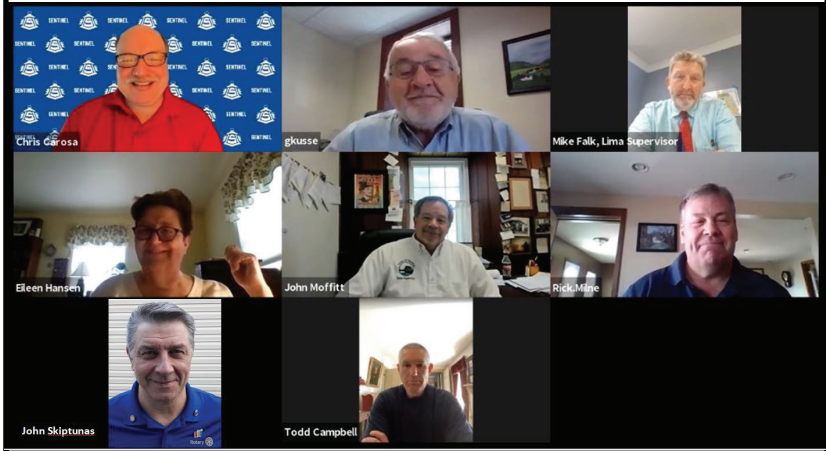

A large cluster of COVID cases in Provincetown gave the CDC the opportunity to learn more about the Delta variant and breakthrough infections. There were

over 900 positive infections, but only 7 hospitalizations (all resolved), and no deaths. The vaccines are still highly effective.

The new CDC guidance is if the rate of COVID transmission is Substantial or High in a county, all persons should wear masks indoors, regardless of vaccination status. Monroe County now is within the Substantial rate of community transmission. We now require people to wear masks for indoor services and meetings until the county is below the Substantial rate of community transmission. I hope this is a temporary layer of prevention to protect our parishioners and our neighbors.

We do not anticipate lockdowns or mask mandates from local officials. The new guidance does not address social distancing. I reached out to the Monroe County Health Department and their responses that masking is more important, but it is wise for families to sit apart.

We will continue with an online worship service. We are examining going from a recorded service to a live streamed service, which you would be able to access at your convenience.

OUR TOP 10 MOST BIZARRE SUMMER OLYMPIC EVENTS

With the summer games of the XXXII Olympiad just having closed, a palpable sense of pride inevitably invades the soul and psyche of sports fans around the globe. It's always a tantalizing time of national pride, unparalleled athleticism, and compelling confrontations on an international stage.

The spectacle is sparked by spanning the spectrum of the sports we watch on a regular basis, like basketball and baseball, to those we have completely ignored for the past 3 years and 50 weeks like rhythmic gymnastics and equestrian dressage.

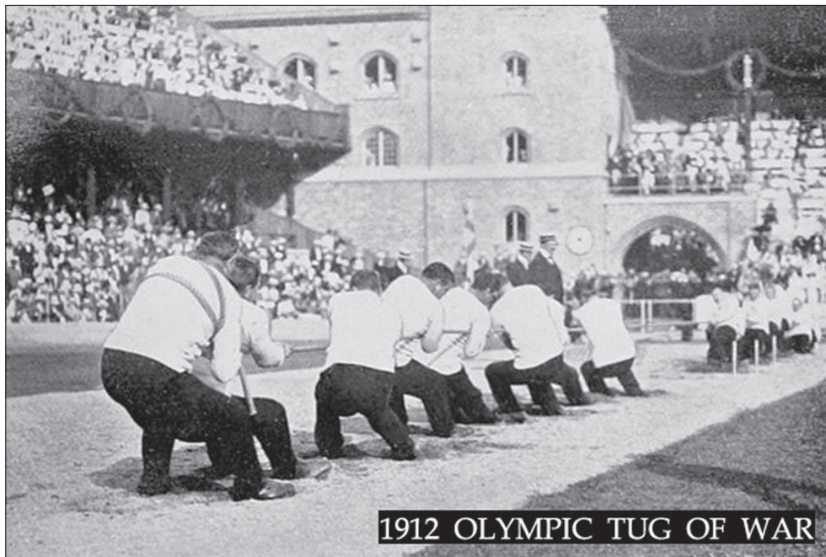

So how would the logistics look for this exciting event? When the Tug of War was officially competed in the Olympics between 1900 and 1920 the number of participants per team ranged from 5 to 8. The rules were simple: drag the rope in your team's direction far enough and you won.

How far was "far enough?" One team had to pull the other six feet along in order to win. If after five minutes no team had done this, the team which had managed to move the center flag in its direction was declared the winner.

Adding to the frivolity was the fact that the teams got to wear uniforms. In assessing the sizes of the participants pictured from the early 1900's, allow us to proffer the following sartorial advice to modern-day uniform designers when the event makes its comeback. Horizontal stripes add 10 pounds to the camera.

THE BIG GUNS - Since we've

#1 - LIVE PIGEON SHOOTING

Where was PETA when we needed them most? Certainly not at the 1900 Paris Olympics where Live Pigeon Shooting was a marquee event in marksmanship.

While this gruesome gunfest garners the top spot on our Top 10 list of the most bizarre Summer Olympic events ever, for the poor Parisians

denigrated by their designation to the cleanup crew, this certainly also has to rank as #1 on the all-time list of most morbidly maleficent mop-ups. It turned into a bloody birdbath with feathers on top. Details to follow.

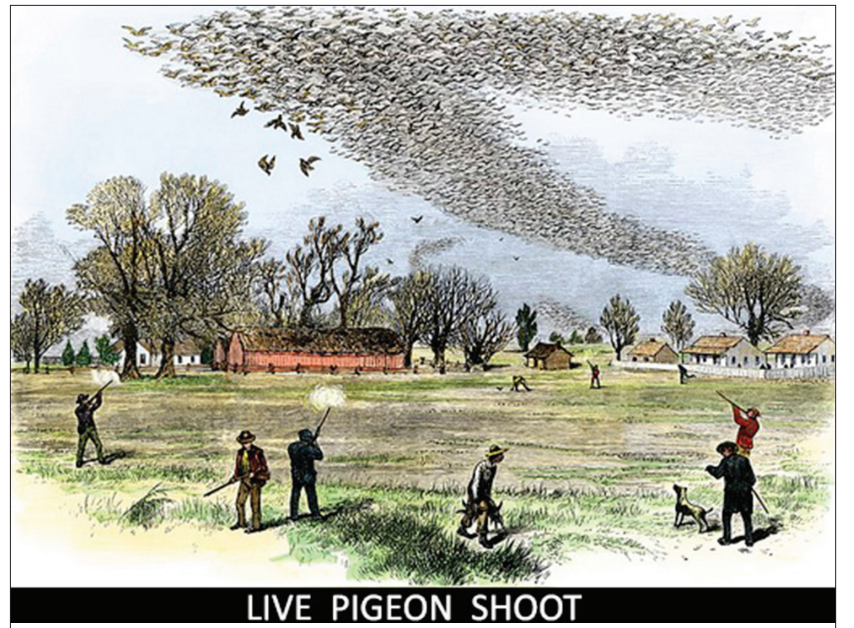
As we have you await the announcement of the final death toll, allow us to disseminate the dire details. The culminating event took place on June 27, 1900 with 54 rifle-toting competitors. It was one shindig of a shootout and here's how the whole shebang shook out.

BYE BYE BIRDIE - With the gunman locked and loaded in firing position, 6 pigeons were released at a time from a distance of 27 meters in front of the shooter. The challenge of each participant was to kill as many birds as possible during a rampage that was allowed to continue until the shooter had missed 2 birds. So theoretically the massacre could have continued indefinitely; there was no time limit.

The gold medal was taken home by Belgian Leon de Lunden who made his kill of 21 pigeons a permanent part of ignominious Olympic history. All told, nearly 300 birds sacrificed their sweet-singing souls for Olympic glory.

In the original before-Christ Olympics, even those grizzly Greeks did not kill animals for the sake of competition and thankfully, the Live Pigeon Shooting in 1900 was the only modern Olympic event in which animals were killed for sport.

THE KILLING FIELDS - It's hard to leave this one without a final visual image of the killing grounds. The field was left with hundreds of birds, both dead and dying (if the bird
