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Town Of Mendon To Build New Splash Park As Part Of Military Memorial Honoring National Guardsmen Killed In Tragic Helicopter Crash

Dedicated to the memory and sacrifice of Chief Warrant Officer 4 Christian Koch, Chief Warrant Officer 5 Steven Skoda, and Chief Warrant Officer 2 Daniel Prial

Town Supervisor John Moffitt and the Mendon Town Board on Friday, August 27, announced plans for a Military Memorial centered around a new splash park that would honor the lives, memory, and sacrifice of Chief Warrant Officer 4 Christian Koch, Chief Warrant Officer 5 Steven Skoda, and Chief Warrant Officer 2 Daniel Prial, the three New York State National Guardsmen who lost their lives in a UH-60 MEDEVAC Helicopter crash in the Town of Mendon while on a training mission in January. All three Guardsmen lived in Monroe County, and Koch was a Mendon resident. Following the crash, the Town established a Citizens Advisory Committee, comprised of community members and Town officials, tasked to work with the bereaved families to recommend a memorial site location and concept.

In a special Town Board meeting held on August 23, 2021, Moffitt and Town Board Members Cynthia Carroll, Tom Dubois, John Hagreen, and Karen Jenkins voted unanimously to adopt the Committee's proposed recommendations. They approved plans to establish a permanent military memorial and dedicate a new splash park to be located in Semmel Road Park in the Town of Mendon, which is located near the helicopter crash site.

"The entire Town of Mendon has been grieving the loss of these hometown heroes," said Moffitt. "I appreciate the work of everyone in our community who offered to assist with creating a long-lasting memorial in their honor. It is a touching sentiment to think of local families gathering at a Splash Park and seeing the names of these brave men, as well as a monument that teaches them about the service and sacrifice of these heroes. We've wanted to bring a community splash park to Mendon for some time, and now, this project has new meaning and will help ensure the memory of these hometown heroes lives on for generations to

come."

The project includes a Memorial Monument as a place of somber reflection, as well as a community Splash Park for use by local families. A pavilion and restrooms would also be built to accommodate families who spend time at the park. The Town has been working to develop a community Splash Park for more than a year, and the report issued by the Committee concluded that this project would memorialize the memory and service of the National Guardsmen in a place where families will love going, which will be a great way for our community to recognize the sacrifice of the soldiers. Teresa DaGama, wife of Christian Koch, stated, "Christian would love a splash park and would have taken the kids there often."

"From the very start of our work, it was our goal to memorialize these New York National Guardsmen and focus the attention on their lives, service, sacrifice and mission," said Muffy Meisenzahl, Chair of the Citizens Advisory Committee. "Those

priorities, coupled with the wishes of the families, led us to recommend a place where people of all ages could gather and learn about these men who gave so much to their country and our community."

The "Citizens Advisory Committee for a Military Memorial" consisted of ten Mendon community members: Robert Booth, Town Board Member Cynthia Carroll, Town Board Member Thomas DuBois, Peter Lehning, Myron Lemperle, Muffy Meisenzahl (Chair), Edward O'Brien, Anne-Marie Sweeney, Stephen Tschiderer, and Dawn Worboys. The project proposal also received input from the bereaved families and Town officials.

The Town of Mendon hopes to break ground on the project as soon as this fall. A budget has been established utilizing Town reserves, which are the result of long-term budget strategies, and federal funding received by the Town through the American Rescue Plan.

HF-L School District Expands UPK Offerings

Honeoye Falls-Lima School District has worked with local, state, and federal officials to provide and expand Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) services for full day programs to residents of the school district. The District has secured funding for 54 full day spots.

Livingston County Begins Budget Planning Process

Livingston County has officially started the planning process to begin developing the County's official 2022 budget.

The process begins each year

with the County Administrator seeking requests, feedback, and recommendations from County department heads on spending and revenues for the upcoming year. Next, the County Administrator works with each department head to review and hone their numbers before presenting a draft to the County's financial oversight committee, the Ways and Means Committee, in September. A budgeting workshop in October refines these numbers further, after which the County officially files a tentative budget and holds a public hearing in November, said Livingston County Administrator Ian M. Coyle.

According to Coyle, development of the 2022 budget, while having its normal challenges, is a markedly improved situation from the previous year.

“We are not out of the dark with COVID, as evidenced by our recent case trends here locally, but fiscally we have rebounded in sales tax revenues, and economic and tourism activity has resumed to pre-pandemic levels,” said Coyle. “Additionally, Federal stimulus monies are in-hand and accessible. These are all huge positives as we head into budget season. Areas of uncertainty are the usual and customary annual discussions of New York State government's financial picture and the possible impacts on State aid. But make no mistake about it – Livingston County goes into this budget season with a refreshed, optimistic outlook due to the County's strengthened financial picture and strong reserves and fund balance levels.”

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SMITHS' LISTS 7 LITTLE-KNOWN AMERICAN MYTHICAL MONSTERS

When it comes to legendary creatures of the northern hemisphere, Europe has its Loch Ness monster, Asia has its Yeti and North America has its Bigfoot. But those three do not have a monopoly on the world of mythical monsters. There are lots more where they came from and we have seven stories to share in that regard over the next few weeks.

LOCH NESS MONSTER

Just to set the table on this topic, we'll lead with nutshell summaries on the aforementioned big three and then we will begin to delve into the depths of seven stories that you probably haven't heard before. Loch Ness is a lake in Scotland said to be the home of a giant mostly underwater creature known as the Loch Ness Monster or Nessie.

Nessie first attracted international attention in 1933 when a British magazine published an article about a sighting of the creature. More sightings, as well as some grainy photographs, followed. Nessie is described as a large long-necked beast with one or more humps visible when protruding from the water.

ABOMINABLE SNOWMAN

Returning to land, the Yeti is native to the Himalayan regions of China and Nepal. It is described as a large ape-like creature which stands upright on two feet with white or gray hair allowing it to blend into the snowy background of the region. When a British climbing expedition tackled Mount Everest in 1921 and came across a large unexplained footprint, they bought into the legend and coined the name of the Abominable Snowman, a term which has stuck in the English language.

BIG FOOT - A little bit closer to home, roaming the forests of the northwestern U.S. and southwestern Canada, we have Bigfoot. This creature is also considered to be ape-like, similar to Yeti, but with dark hair. In Canadian legendry, the name of Sasquatch is bestowed upon the Bigfoot beast, so those two names are essentially interchangeable.

At this point we are going to take you on a cross-country tour to meet some of America's other mythical

monsters. These guys have not yet achieved the fame of Bigfoot, but let's see if we can't get the ball rolling and drum up some publicity for these B-level beasts who could be just a few horrifying screams away from the Horror Hall of Fame. After all, if the Oklahoma Octopus could use a hand from us we'll be there with arms extended; even though we each only have two of them.

1 - OKLAHOMA OCTOPUS

If the jellyfish can do it, why not the octopus? That was the basis of a theory that began to gain traction in the early 2000's when a rash of unexplained drownings in the state were attributed to the Oklahoma Octopus. We'll get to the jellyfish connection in a minute, but first let us flesh out the rest of the story.

There are three lakes in Oklahoma, (Lake Thunderbird, Lake Oologah and Lake Tenkiller), where the creature is said to seek out swimmers that it can pull down into the murky depths with its extra-strong tentacles. Rumor has the Oklahoma Octopus as being about the size of a cow with multiple tentacles branching out from its reddish brown body.

One theory has it that the creature is a descendant of ancient octopus, which once thrived when Oklahoma was a shallow sea. Zoologists have pointed out that some species of jellyfish have been able to adapt from saltwater to freshwater conditions, and the same adaptation may have been possible for a giant octopus trapped in an inland lake when coastal waters receded.

Tales of the *Oklahoma Octopus* have gained national attention from a variety of media outlets. The cable channel Animal Planet devoted an entire episode of its *Lost Tapes* series to this Oklahoma phenomenon. So if we piqued your curiosity on this one, head to YouTube and check out Animal Planet's take on the Oklahoma Octopus.

Please join us next week when we'll tackle two more American monsters. You won't want to miss our encounters with the Skunk Ape and the Hodag, a creature which combines elements of a frog, an elephant and a dinosaur.

Ode To The Open Road

In the minds of many, the fast-approaching Labor Day represents the metaphorical end of summer. Before we take that literary leap, however, let's spend one final weekend basking in the glory of the sun and the freedom of endless fields of rolling hills, chirping nature, and fragrant wild flowers.

There's more to it than that, though.

From the beginning of our lives, we've come to see summer as a 10-week break. It starts with the calendar of school. Out in June. Back in September. July and August became the carefree times filled with sandlot games, spontaneous treks deep into the woods, and warm muggy nights beneath the stars.

It didn't matter how late we stayed up because we knew we could always sleep in the next day.

As we got older, despite leaving those scholastic halls, we couldn't help but look forward to the return of summer each year. Work naturally eased. We took time off for vacation. And, more often than not, those vacations weren't extensive (or expensive) journeys to distant lands. Instead, we sought drivable destinations.

Here's the funny thing. It wasn't about the destination. It was about the drive. The freedom of the open road. Windows rolled down. T-Tops off. All eight cylinders roaring in perfect harmony.

Did you ever feel the need for speed? This is how we captured that feeling.

It's the quintessential American experience. Perhaps you might call it the ultimate manifestation of the American Dream.

It is the individual unbound. It is the stuff of the Great American Novel. You find it in nearly every classic American film. Nothing exemplifies it more than American Rock & Roll (as opposed to the British Invasion)

as sung by The Beach Boys, Jan and Dean, and any number of 1950s tunes glorifying the hot rod.

Before we get a little too far ahead of ourselves, remember how those old western movies always ended. The lonesome cowboys always rode off into the sunset on the far away horizon. (Granted, sometimes he wasn't so lonesome and rode off with the damsel he had just rescued, but you get the idea.)

The wagon trails of yesteryear would hardly be considered roads today. But they served the same purpose. The true national highway system didn't begin until November 11, 1926, when Congress approved the U.S. Highway System. Incidentally, the famous "Route 66" was designated on April 30, 1926, before the U.S. Highway System was approved. It became "U.S. Route 66" the following year. Locally, Route 15 or Routes 5&20 (a.k.a. "The Genesee Road") represent examples of roads in our region that fall under the auspices of the U.S. Highway System.

You may be more familiar with the Interstate Highway System (whose real name is "The Dwight D. Eisenhower National System of Interstate and Defense Highways").

The Federal Aid Highway Act of 1956 put the U.S. Highway System on steroids. Unlike its predecessor, the Interstate Highway System didn't rely on existing roads. One of the exceptions to this is the New York State Thruway. Completed in 1955, it was incorporated into the Interstate Highway System to become part of I-90.

Whether part of the U.S. Highway System or the Interstate Highway System, you've seen enough car commercials filmed on the open roads in the barren west to get that sensation of freedom.

Picture yourself before you earned your driver's license. What did you imagine it would feel like to be behind the wheel for the first time? Were you frightened? Were you excited? Were you empowered?

Perhaps it was a little of all these things.

Think about what it means to be an American. The kind of American our Founding Fathers saw when they first crafted our country.

America, as they envisioned

it, championed the individual. In school you may have been taught that they focused on "inalienable rights," but this is a bit misleading. It wasn't about the rights. It was about the individual. Each of us had the natural right to do what we wanted, without interference from anyone else, including this somewhat artificial construct we call "government."

Now, before you jump to the conclusion our Founding Fathers were mindless anarchists, they weren't. The failure of the Articles of Confederation made it all too apparent that a land of free agents would not last long. They realized a contract outlining commonalities was needed to ensure their new country would endure. That contract would be limited in scope and focus only on the most necessary things that require collective agreement. Anything else would remain within the individual's sole right to exercise.

That contract became the Constitution of the United States.

Very quickly, one common need emerged. At first, this wasn't a national need, but it was an individual state need.

There was a need for roads.

States, particularly those with uninhabited western regions, wanted to encourage settlement into their frontier lands. You need look no further than New York State as an example of this. They needed something more than the

Indian trails they inherited. These would become more than the muddy wagon trails that would line the west a century later.

These new roads, after some effect, would become "Macadamized," that is, they would be layered with crush stone. Settlers would travel these roads through the forests and fields of the Greater Western New York Region. They were enjoying the new-found freedom America had recently granted them.

As they traveled the open road of America's First Frontier, they could see the endless rolling hills, they could hear the blissful sounds of the virgin forest, and they could breathe in the sweet smell of the wildflower fields surrounding them.

Archer Butler Hulbert, in *Pioneer Roads and Experiences of Travelers (Volume II)*, (The Arthur H. Clark Company, Cleveland, Ohio, 1904), wrote, "The old Genesee Road passed through as romantic and beautiful a land as heart could wish to see or know."

The romance and beauty remains. You can still experience it. So take the advice of Mike Love of the Beach Boys and channel the "whole other vibe" of "Endless Summer."

The Summer is endless if you choose it to be. So, too, is the open road.

Don't let the calendar stop you. Enjoy the endless road.

At least until football season begins in earnest.

“Lord of the Pool” (June 28th, 2007)

Our town is rather lacking in legends, but here's one. Honeoye Falls (Community) Cemetery and neighboring burial grounds include people whose spirits are embodied in none other than a big, old snapping turtle that lives in the creek – “The Lord of the Pool.”

Is it real or is it an apparition? For generations, this fearsome snapper, with its massive head, jaws and tail way out of proportion to its gnarly-shelled torso, reminds us, as it patrols the waters beneath the falls, to be wary of the watercourse of the Honeoye.

Over our history, a number of folk have fallen victim to accidents along Honeoye Creek... swept away on an ice floe... a drunken tumble from cliff to creek... a sudden, fatal cramp... a fateful step on thin ice. Such tragic mishaps resulted in local undertakers making solemn trips to nearby burial grounds.

While memories of the victims faded with the generations, the old snapper has always lingered at the base of the falls... seemingly appearing only when the danger of a new season heightens. You can spot it, as News did a fortnight ago, or in reflecting back to when he was a wee rock hopper many years ago.

School is out for the summer and another crop of youngsters is setting out on creek adventures. To remind everyone to be careful, our ghosts from the past reside with one of God's homeliest creatures... a legendary resident of Honeoye Creek... “The Lord of the Pool.”

Recent Rains Make Honeoye Creek Swimmers Paradise



No one knows how long the sparkling waters of Honeoye Creek have slipped and frothed over mellowed stone terraces lying above the new bridge on Martin Road and the old metal bridge in Honeoye Falls-West Bloomfield Road, but one thing is certain - as long as there is enough water to wet the seats of their swim suits, children of the neighborhood will gather there each summer to engage in that fascinating fun known locally as “playing on the rocks”, a sport which local youngsters have delighted in for far over a hundred years past. In recent summers the fun of the children has been spoiled when controls at the creek's source have sadly diminished the once beautiful stream until it dwindled to a smelly trickle over weed-choked rocks, and the waterway which has for scores of seasons been the loved and historic heart of each neighborhood through which it wanders, became an eyesore and a matter of concern from the standpoint of health as well as of beauty and summer pleasure. This spring proved an exception, however, as abundant rains increased land drainage and more water was released at the head of the creek, so once again laughing boys and girls paddle and splash in the cool water, rest in the shade of sheltering trees and steep themselves in the quiet contentment of “playing on the rocks” as generations before them have done.

Fowler's Pool (July 12th, 2007)

Trivia buffs! How many swimming pools are within a five-mile radius of Honeoye Falls' Four Corners?

Frankly, “quite a few” is enough of an answer for this history analogy.

Over seventy years ago, when toddling News was too young to be allowed in yours, a typical backyard swimming pool was strictly an affair of ingenuity. Also, Red Cross training classes were few and far between and learning to swim meant a long jaunt to Rochester's YMCA, an unseaworthy homemade raft, or getting tossed into Honeoye Creek by one of the big kids. That's how it was in America's hinterlands around 1950.

The late Ray Fowler, a one-time Rochester attorney interred in Chase B of HF Cemetery since 1967, was the man who brought safe swimming to the Honeoye Falls area. Residing in what old-timers called “the old Hamratty place” on Rush-Lima Road, just south of the Monroe Street intersection, Fowler designed a sluice system to create a 50' by 100' pool.

Being a good-sized affair, and with Ray's blessing, in 1948 and 1949, a Red Cross swimming program for young people was sponsored by HF's American Legion Post #664. The program's director was the legendary

School buses transported swimmers to Fowler's Pool. (Honeoye Falls Times, June 30th, 1949)

Rochester Royals/Syracuse Nats basketball star and NBA Hall-of-Famer, Al Cervi. (Before you ask, in those days, pro athletes' salaries necessitated off-season employment.)

For the few years before in-ground (and later above-ground) pools became commonplace, a popular destination during the summer was the unique Fowler pool. It utilized spring water (rather than runoff from Lima's cow pastures) that eventually flowed to the ocean via Spring Creek. [Let's see... Spring Creek to Honeoye Creek, to the Genesee River, to Lake Ontario, through the St. Lawrence Seaway, to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and finally into the Atlantic Ocean... and in a single breath!]

Of course, the natural conditions included a few creepy-crawlie things in the crystal-clear water. Muskrats, frogs and the good-sized water snakes that lived nearby were rarely an issue... being that they were just “passing through.”

But that was then. Checking out the site of that pool today, would any of the past two or three generations of super-chlorinated-backyard-pool-swimmers even dare set a toe in such

References can be given from customers in this and other States, if required.

The top photo shows the first group of youngsters waiting at the side of the Fowler Swimming pool for the class to begin under the direction of the Red Cross instructors. These boys and girls are all from the Village of Mendon. At left we see Basil E. Moore, Legion representative, Ray Fowler, owner of the property, and Arthur F. Burson, local Red Cross Chapter chairman. The center photo shows Al Cervi, director of the project, adjusting a safety line across the pool for the non-swimmers. The picture far-right shows an assistant swimming instructor calling the roll for registration of the pupils. Below can be seen a group of the ladies who are all qualified swimming instructors of the Red Cross method. The swimming classes, which started on July 7th, will continue each Monday, Wednesday and Friday for a period of eight weeks. With the gracious consent of Mr. Fowler, the Falls Post No. 664 are sponsors of the program, with the Rochester Chapter, Red Cross, doing the directing. The program includes approximately 250 children from the Town of Mendon, and about 60 from Rush. Considering the fact that many families are away on vacations during the summer months, this figure is exceptionally high. The school bus used to transport the youngsters to and from the pool is driven by Mr. John Kuntz, and his schedule has worked out to perfection. News from Mendon Foundation President Drew Saur

The 2021 Black Diamond Express Races Were a (Wet) Success!

On Sunday, August 29th, we hosted a record 176 Half Marathoners and 52 5K'ers on the Lehigh Valley Trail for the in-person 10th Annual Black Diamond Express Races, which were our first since 2019. These numbers don't include Virtual Runners and no-shows, which brought us to 289 total participants. Our returning runners comprised 30% of the field, which is an outstanding achievement, and a testament to how people feel about these races.

With official recorded temperatures ranging from 74 degrees at 8 am. (with a dewpoint of 70 degrees) to 85 degrees at Noon (with a dewpoint of 75 degrees), these races were hot and humid! But everyone survived, and we had some amazing finish times.

While the weather was not conducive to record performances, Mason Coppi from Ladera Ranch, California (who recently moved to Syracuse) set a new men's Half Marathon course record of 1:10.04 (gun time), besting the previous course

record set by Bryan Morseman, with a gun time of 1:10.46 back in 2019. All Half Marathon finishers were presented with ceramic "Gravenware" medals that were designed and individually hand-made by Mendon's own Geoff Gretton.

Between about 9:25 a.m. and 9:35 a.m., significant rainfall caused a lot of drama for our runners, but with the rain came welcome clouds and cool breezes that provided respite.

Including donations and virtual runners, the races brought in over \$15,000 for the Mendon Foundation, which is half of our anticipated income budget for 2021, putting us close to on-track to meet our \$30,000 goal for the year.

Robinhood Racing will soon post race videos that cover the finishers from the entire race, with the exception of 10 minutes or so of footage that was lost to fallen equipment during the rainstorm. Thank you to everyone who raced. We couldn't have had such a great event without your support! That performance helped her earn a spot at the NCAA Division III Championships and she tied for 18th place nationally.



HF-L Football Ready to Defend Their Title

Fall 2021 Preview

When the Cougars open their 2021 Fall Season on Friday, September 3rd, it will have only been 125 days since HF-L captured the district's first football Sectional Championship. Despite the shortened offseason, the players still made the most of that time with weight training, optional 7 on 7 drills, and a July training camp. Practices began on Monday, August 23rd, and the Cougars will not be able to hold a scrimmage prior to their Week One contest.

This fall, HF-L will be without a handful of players who graduated this past June, including Jacob Derby (1st Team Class B All-Star), Colt Green (1st Team), Reece Joint (Class B Player of the Year), Patrick Lustyk (1st Team), Sam Miller (2nd Team Class B All-Star), Mason Wanzenried (1st Team), and Nolan Yates (2nd Team). However, three players from the 1st and 2nd Team lists will be returning, Mitchell Bulling (OL/DL), J.T. Killenbec (WR/DB), and Nolan Smith (WR/DL). Other returnees include Charlie Kirby (OL/DL), Carson Joint (OL/LB), and Zachary Meacham (RB/LB). All three were named as Honorable Mentions to the Class B All-Star lists.

The Cougar offense will be led by a new signal caller this season. Senior Brody Young got reps at quarterback in five of HF-L's games last Spring. He completed just under fifty percent of his passes attempted, but threw for three scores, including a 51-yard touchdown pass to J.T. Killenbec in the Sectional Semifinal against Pal-Mac. Senior J.T. Killenbec and Nolan Smith will likely be the favorite targets for Young. Head Coach John Russ noted that "Smith is '6' 5" with long arms and huge hands; all you have to do is throw the ball to Nolan and he's a kid who can go get it." During the Sectional Championship game last Spring, Nolan Smith hauled in three catches for 56 yards, including a 31-yard touchdown reception. Alongside Brody Young in the backfield will be senior Zac Meacham, who ran the ball efficiently this past season when the Cougars were chewing the clock late in the game. Meacham average just over 6 yards per touch. Head Coach John Russ said Meacham "is a big weight room kid; (Meacham) put on a ton of muscle over the last year and a half, so we are looking for big things out of him this season, especially at the running back position." Meacham will be the beneficiary of the Cougars' returning three of their starting offensive linemen from last season. Mitchell Bulling, Carson Joint, and Charlie Kirby will reprise their roles on the O-line. Coach Russ praised Bulling, the three-year two-way starter for HF-L, who "knows the game very well and is hands down our leader." Fun fact about Charlie Kirby: last Fall he was the third string quarterback for the Cougars, but by the time the Spring season began he was the starting right tackle. Kirby unselfishly chose to switch positions, because the team was in need at that position.

All of last season Coach Russ touted the four starting defensive backs as the leadership of the defense. With all four graduating, this responsibility will shift to the three returning linebackers: Rhyen Garey, Carson Joint, and Zac Meacham. Joint will serve as the defensive signal

caller. Coach Russ mentioned that Joint "plays very quick and now trusts his reads after getting better and better every week last season." The new defensive starters for HF-L benefited from a healthy amount of playing time last season as a result of the early lopsided scores. In some cases, the Cougars' second-string defense got reps against the opposing teams' first-string offense. Special teams' contributors from a season ago, such as senior Hayden Meehan, will now have the opportunity to make big plays for the defense. Speaking of special teams, senior J.T. Killenbec, will be returning as the return man for HF-L. Killenbec who Coach Russ described as "a game changer who we want to get the ball to as much as possible; whether it's a deep ball, punt return, or kick return." Killenbec had some key returns during the Cougars' Sectional Championship run and returned a punt 52 yards to the house during the regular season game against Pal-Mac.

Fall 2021 Outlook

Back to an eight-game slate, the Cougars will be playing an equal amount of home and away games (see schedule above right for games that will be broadcast live by the *Sentinel*). Of their eight opponents, HF-L played five of them during the Spring 2021 season. The Cougars were scheduled to play six, but HF-L received a win over Geneva last season due to forfeit. One of the teams the Cougars will face has switched classes: Wilson Magnet has moved down to Class B.

Right out of the gate, HF-L will face stiff competition. The Livonia Bulldogs won the Class C Sectional Championship this past Spring. The last time these two former Livingston County League rivals faced one another was the 2019 Class B Sectional Championship. Other games of note include their October 8th meeting with the Batavia Blue Devils, which will be a rematch of this past season's title fight.

Fans should expect a more balanced attack from the Cougars offense rather than the pass heavy offense from last season. The Cougars feel confident with their size upfront and believe they should be able to move the ball effectively on the ground. That being said, they should not run the ball as often as 2018 with Mason Ferrara. Another wrinkle in the offensive scheme will be sophomore Matt Meacham, who will play at least one or two series in some of HF-L's games. A new rule allows athletes to play in JV games after a two days rest and not playing more than ten snaps during the Varsity game. Defensively, the Cougars will continue their physical style of play. During their five regular season games last Spring, HF-L shut out two opponents and allowed a total of 16 points. The defense should also benefit from the return of the Cougar Freight Train (student fan section) to the stands.

The path to repeat as Sectional Champions may be a bit easier this season, mostly because the playoff structure has returned to pre-pandemic rules. Eight teams, rather than last year's four, will make the Sectional tournament. Last year's success doesn't guarantee anything this season and the Cougars will have to earn their right to defend their crown.

COVID-19 Update from Livingston County

The Livingston County Department of Health as of August 24, 2021 reports that the County's current COVID-19 vaccination rate is 61.3%. In addition, there is a COVID-19 case volume of 96, weekly positivity rate over 5.7%, ICU bed capacity of 85%, and no hospitalizations related to the virus.

For residents who would like to receive a COVID-19 vaccine, appointments can be made through New York State at <https://covid19vaccine.health.ny.gov/>.

"Even as many of the County's current positive cases are among the vaccinated population, the facts are clear that – on a national level – the vast majority of cases leading to hospitalization and, sadly, deaths are among those who are not vaccinated," stated Jennifer Rodriguez, Livingston County's Public Health Director.

County Administrator Ian M. Coyle would like to commend Livingston County staff and residents for their resiliency and pragmatism during the latest COVID-19 wave.

"Our staff continues to serve the public with the highest regard for both safety and service, and our residents, customers, taxpayers and clients have been respectful and receptive to our continuation of operations during the pandemic. We are thankful for that," stated Coyle.

"In Livingston County, we have a strong tradition of both robust public health efforts and an emphasis on personal responsibility. Despite what you might hear in other places – we believe those two traditions are mutually compatible," continued Coyle. "You have a role to play in the community. Be safe, smart and health-conscious. Know that vaccinations work. We have said all along that COVID-19 appears to be staying, and the virus will morph and have variants. The case volume, too, will have ebbs and flows."

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Livingston County is at a high level of community transmission.

Coyle said, "Please understand what the classification of high means to Livingston County and the actual statistics. High for our county means 96 confirmed cases out of a population of over 61,000 residents. That, of course, means scores if not more of unconfirmed cases because of the often asymptomatic nature of the virus response in certain individuals. That being said, of our 96 confirmed positives, many are fully vaccinated individuals. Our vaccination rate is over 60% and rising daily, albeit very slowly at this point. While we still encourage the usual and customary vigilance and protective efforts in a pandemic, the sky isn't falling. COVID-19 is here to stay, and you will likely get exposed to the virus. We will get through a variant wave like we got through other, previous waves of this pandemic."

"From a county government operations perspective, our situation remains status quo. Our building access and mask policies currently in existence will continue as is for the present time," continued Coyle.

Honeoye Falls-Lima, Lima Christian School and Wheatland-Chili ready to welcome back students

The Honeoye Falls-Lima and Wheatland-Chili Central School Districts and Lima Christian School can't wait to welcome back students for the 2021-2022 school year next week and all three plan in-person learning for all students.

Board of Education meetings across the Rochester area have been lively affairs of late due to some parents voicing concerns about universal masking indoors. Neither HF-L nor Wheatland-Chili, as public school districts, have been immune from those discussions, which in some districts have turned into shouting matches. However, HF-L Superintendent Gene Mancuso and Wheatland-Chili Superintendent Lynda Quick point out that the main thing is keeping students and staff safe and making sure in-person learning goes forward. In any case, New York State Governor Kathy Hochul took the matter off the backs of district officials and boards of education by mandating last week that all students and staff wear masks indoors, regardless of vaccination status.

"The masking has been an issue," Mancuso said this past Tuesday during a phone interview. "None of us like masks but whatever it takes to keep the kids in school and allow in-person learning to go on is what we will do."

Quick said that "We have had some people with concerns over masking. However, we want to re-open fully with all of our kids back in school five days a week and this is what will allow us to do so."

At Wheatland-Chili, this year's plan will require the universal masking when indoors and the new three feet of social distancing in classrooms, whenever possible (six feet when students are eating). Mask breaks will be incorporated throughout the day, particularly for the district's youngest learners. Masking will be optional when outdoors. There will be handwashing reminders to students and explicit handwashing instruction for the youngest learners. Hand

sanitizing stations will be available and hand sanitizing encouraged throughout the day. Classrooms, buses and high traffic areas will be cleaned and sanitized regularly. Masks will be mandatory on buses as well, but bus windows will be open when possible to increase air flow. The district will limit visitors to school.

The district, however, will allow for limited parent volunteers in its PreK-5 classrooms, when possible. District officials also hope to allow in-person extracurricular clubs and activities such as open houses, etc. and offer short field trips when it is possible and safe to do so.

Asked about any concerns one week from the opening of school, Quick said there are no huge concerns.

"It is my hope that we can keep COVID at bay," she said during a phone interview last Tuesday. "We are fully staffed except for one position. We have enough bus drivers, but we do not have any extra drivers so I would like to get some substitutes."

HF-L's plan is similar. As did Wheatland-Chili's plan, HF-L had already planned to require masks be worn indoors with mask breaks being taken. Masks will be optional outdoors. Masks also will be mandatory on buses. Each cafeteria table will become a "pod" and would be subject to quarantine if there was an exposure. Students will be physically distanced for meals with some eating in classrooms. Custodial staff will clean high-touch areas throughout the day and do a deeper cleaning at night. Visitors will be permitted on a limited basis and field trips will be offered as deemed appropriate and safe.

The biggest concerns that Mancuso has is getting the district back into a routine again and recognizing that there will be some bumps along the way and hoping the community will allow the district time to get over those bumps and staffing concerns, particularly with bus drivers.

"We have always counted on the community to give us the time to work out things the first couple of weeks and

get into a routine and I hope that they will give us that time again," he said. "The staff is doing the best we can to get the kids back into the classroom and into a routine because the kids belong in the classroom. Staffing-wise, we would like to have about 10 more bus drivers. We can get the kids to and from school, but we are concerned about buses and drivers for after school events. Thankfully, we have our third teacher about to be certified to be a bus driver as Mr. Clarry will be joining Mr. O'Connell and Mrs. Northrup."

Unlike HF-L or Wheatland-Chili which had their K-5 students in school all the time and the 6-12 grade students on hybrid schedule, Lima Christian School had all of its students in class last year. It was able to do that because of its small size. The school is planning to maintain its six feet of social distancing rule this year in hopes that students won't be required to wear a face mask in classrooms during most of the school day. LCS board member Jason McGuire said on Tuesday, August 31, that the school is in conversations with Hochul's administration to see if that is going to be possible. He did say that masks would be required in common areas of the school such as hallways and restrooms.

"We did not have a lot of COVID cases last year with our plan last year and both the county and state health departments commended us for our plan," McGuire said. "The cases we did have all came about from outside the school. We want to be responsible and that is why we are looking to keep the six feet distance in place. We are concerned about the busing situation and lack of bus drivers some of the districts that our students come from are having and are keeping a watch on that transportation issue. However, our parents have indicated that if it becomes an issue for them in the district they live in that they will make sure their children get to our school by driving the students here themselves. We are in a good position staffing-wise."

Livingston County announces new funding with Back to Business Program

Livingston County Economic Development has received supplemental Community Development Block Grant funding to be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the impacts of the coronavirus pandemic. In response to the economic hardships experienced by businesses resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, these funds are being used to provide grants to eligible businesses to support customer and staff safety, improve business resiliency, reopen Livingston County businesses to full capacity, and expand businesses to recover revenue quickly.

Eligible businesses must be located in Livingston County, must be a for-profit sole proprietorship, partnership, corporation, Limited Liability Company or other legal form of business, and must have 25 or fewer employees. Eligible businesses must create new jobs, restore jobs

(including increasing hours), or retain jobs that are at risk of being lost if financial assistance is not received. If the business has five or fewer owners and employees, the applicant may be able to income qualify for funding in place of creating jobs. All projects must be located in Livingston County, New York and have a "brick-and-mortar" business location that is not a home address.

"This is an opportunity for resilience and growth in the businesses of Livingston County. These grants are meant to spur innovation and adaptation to the new reality of economic life with a highly contagious virus," says Bill Bacon, Director of Economic Development. Back to Business will make grants of up to \$60,000 per eligible applicant. "This program will bring back jobs, enhance the way business is done, and expand services to increase customer

satisfaction", says Bacon.

Grant funds will be provided as a reimbursement for eligible expenses, not to exceed 80% of total project cost. Eligible expenses must be incurred after award, and within 90 days of award. Program funds may be used for any justifiable business purpose associated with the expansion or reestablishment of operations after the negative impacts of COVID-19 including, but not limited to furniture, fixtures, equipment, operating expenses, and working capital that will prevent, prepare for, and respond to the impacts of the coronavirus pandemic.

Mayor, Supervisor Weekly Update As Of Friday, August 27th Budgets Galore & A Splashpark For Mendon?

Village of Honeoye Falls

Rick Milne, Mayor:

"We're doing good. It's great to see everyone. Things are going well. We continue to be in close contact with our Honeoye Falls Ambulance Chief and our Fire Department Chief regarding any upticks in the Covid variant and any of those things that we continue to watch over. We are talking more and more about asking people to consider wearing a mask when they come into the Village Office just to be safe, but we are not mandating that at this point in time. I think it's just one of those things where we need to act and do what's best for ourselves and just keep other folks in mind. It is a concern out there for sure, numbers continue to go up over all, but we continue to do well locally overall."

"Again as I mentioned last week – we did have a great concert this past Tuesday – we do have a bunch of concerts to be made up during the month of September. We're going to finish with a large concert on Sunday the 26th with Steve Grills and the Roadmasters. We're potentially going to have that at Harry Allen Park still, but we're trying to set up a rain area where we could move it down to the Fireman's training fields if need be. That is all still in the planning stages."

"The Village will be starting its process, probably earlier than ever this year. We're concerned about cost increases. There are some things that are flattening out. We're very concerned about our budget as well and what type of increases that we have to consider. We're assuming, based on the numbers we're seeing so far, our health insurance will be going up a little bit. We thought that the retirement was going up significantly, but right now some of the numbers we're seeing are a little flatter than we anticipated. At the same time, our sales tax revenue has come in very strong. We're hoping that will offset some things."

"I am also talking with our local businesses and around the County and we're all seeing the same thing. It is very difficult to hire people. I am being asked, 'How do combat that?' I would like to see the County work on some sort of program – it's sad to say – how do we get people to understand it's really important to be working instead of getting a check. I've always prided myself on working hard and getting out every morning and going to my job. I get fulfillment from that. I've tried to teach

Village of Scottsville

Eileen Hansen, Mayor:

that to my kids and people I know. I am concerned that there are people who could be working that are just not going back to work yet. We have to work hard to try to turn that around."

"I know that's a bigger subject that maybe we can get to at another time, but I think it's important. I know I'm not going to be afraid to vocalize that. We need to get people to go back to work. Every situation is a little different, but there are those who I think can do that."

"With that, we're going to continue to work hard on our budget. We have good partners in the Town of Mendon, Lima and Bloomfield, especially with our ambulance, etc... We're trying to make sure we keep those numbers as flat as we can. I know our departments are working hard to keep their budget line numbers as flat as they can. I think any increases we see are going to be strictly based on costs and not that we are inflating budgets at all – bringing numbers up because we need the money – it's costing us more and we have to try to keep things level without cutting things out if we don't have to. We know our residents still want their sidewalks plowed. They still want the brush picked up. They still want to see the parks clean and orderly. They want to see the playgrounds kept up and the roads paved. We're going to do as much as we can without raising our tax rates if we can. We're working hard to do that."

"I appreciate the opportunity. It's always good to see everyone."

Town of Mendon

John Moffitt, Supervisor:

"Thanks for having us as always. This is a great opportunity to share information with our residents."

"First of all, due to the recent activity in Afghanistan and the loss of some of our servicemen's lives, we have lowered the flags at the Town of Mendon's facilities. They will remain lowered for the next few days, probably through September 11th."

"We also are working on our budget for 2022. Our budget year coincides with the calendar year. I will be presenting the tentative budget to the public and the Town Board on September 13th at 7 o'clock at the Community Center."

"At our last two Town Board meetings, the Military Memorial Committee presented to the Town Board. The Town Board scheduled a special meeting which was held on August 23rd. The Town Board is going to proceed with a memorial that would be appropriate for the loss of life of the three servicemen who were involved in the helicopter crash in the Town of Mendon, one being a resident of the Town of Mendon. We're going to proceed with that. The location is going to be on Semmel Road at Drysbeck Park, which is east of the Highway Department."

"One of the things that Officer Kochs widow wanted was something positive that she could take her children to as a positive remembrance of their father, something positive for the community. We have been kicking around the idea of a splash park for some time. For 3-4 years we've been squirreling a little bit of money here and there for it. So, the Town Board is looking to proceed with that at same location. There are already rectangular fields for soccer at that location. We'd be putting up a pavilion. We'd have rest rooms. And, as I said, there would be a memorial for those three servicemen that were tragically killed in the helicopter crash."

"I would encourage participation from the public. We want to know what you think. We want to know if you think it's a good idea or if you don't think it's a good idea. We still want to hear from you. We have a press release that will be in the next [Ed.: current] issue of the SENTINEL."

"We did relight the falls. The lights that light the falls come from the Town building. The lights get in rough shape because of the mist. A lot of minerals from the water, no matter what we do, seem to seep into whatever light fixture we put there. We have put some new light fixtures on the building to light the falls. We are currently in the middle of adjusting them for the benefit of the neighbors. This always takes a little bit of time because it's hard to adjust during the daytime. You have to give it a day or two, talk to the neighbors, see what they think, and then we readjust. The falls were dark for a while, but we have them relit now."

Town of Lima

Mike Falk, Supervisor:

"Things are going pretty well here in Lima right now. Of course, budget season is going on. Gerry did allude to we were talking personnel costs before the meeting. We did set up a 4% raise pool here in Lima for the budget. We will be underneath the 2% cap this year. The giant formula that helps figure things out – we had some increases in housing values and other things that helped offset the rest of the budget so I could crop the percentage way down."

"Health costs are going up for us 2.74%. Next year is a revaluation year for the Assessor's office. Every four years there's a 50% increase in their hours. That looks like a huge increase in their budget, but it's just more time. It goes back down the following year. We do get a tiny amount back from New York State for doing the revaluation, but it doesn't quite offset almost completely, but we won't see that until the following year."

"Town insurance will probably be up about 10%. I still expect the tentative budget presented at the September 7th Board meeting."

"The Water Interest Survey is still going on in the Town of Lima. If you live in the township and you do not have water, please take the survey. Lima-NewYork.org is our website. There's a survey tab. It takes five minutes. Asks you questions about how much bottled water you buy, are you hauling water in a tank behind your Subaru with a basketball stuffed in the top because you lost your cover. Those kinds of things. Please go ahead and take the survey. We'll have the results tabulated next month. If you're unable to use the computer, you can always call the clerk to get the survey, but, again, we're closing it out on August 31st."

"And that's all I got!"

"The 9-11 memorial at Honeoye Falls Cemetery, I will be participating in that. I encourage all to attend. It will be on September 11th, I believe it starts at 8am, coinciding with the tragic events at that time of day."

"The Mendon Fireman's Carnival is on for September 10th and 11th. The parade will be on the 11th at noon. I encourage everybody to attend."

"The Highway Department will be doing their brush pickup this Fall. I don't have any dates to announce but I will on subsequent meetings we have here."

"I mentioned this before, but anyone in the Town of Mendon who's either in HF-L or Pittsford School Districts can pay their school taxes at the Town of Mendon, either in person, by mail, or in our dropbox which is on the Main Street side of the building."

"Lastly, our Town Clerk Jim Merske will be retiring at the end of 2021. So, if you see him around Town, be sure to wish him well in his well-deserved retirement."

"Again, thanks for having me and have a great weekend everybody."

Village of Lima

John Skiptunas, Mayor:

No report this week."

Town of Rush

Gerald Kusse, Supervisor:

"We are doing fine in Rush. We are the best kept secret in Western New York and we are holding to that handle. I'm going to surprise all of our audience with the introduction of Deputy Supervisor Amber Corbin, who will replace me on this broadcast next week and the week after. I think it's time for her to get her feet wet in some other things. So, Amber will be joining you."

"We are deeply entrenched in the budget. It's going fairly well. We're trying to figure out things and Mike just helped me out a little bit with his proposal for a 4% increase in Lima. I think we're going to be near that, but I don't know how near. The budget process isn't anywhere near complete, but sometime between now and when we get the final budget numbers, we'll probably come around 4-5%."

"I know I mentioned water before, we've got an all-hands water meeting coming up. I believe it's on October 6th. Everyone is invited. We have representatives from the Water Authority, from MRB, from Cluff-Harbor, our Town Board, our Town Attorney, and yours truly, who will be there and will try to get everybody on the same page as far as establishing a water district and what's involved. It's a very complicated issue, as all of you know. It's confusing to residents who are hoping for better water."

"I talked to the Recreation Director. She said everything is smooth in Recreation. She's looking forward to the kids coming back to school so that some of the recreation programs for kids can be launched once again."

"That's about all I got to report on."

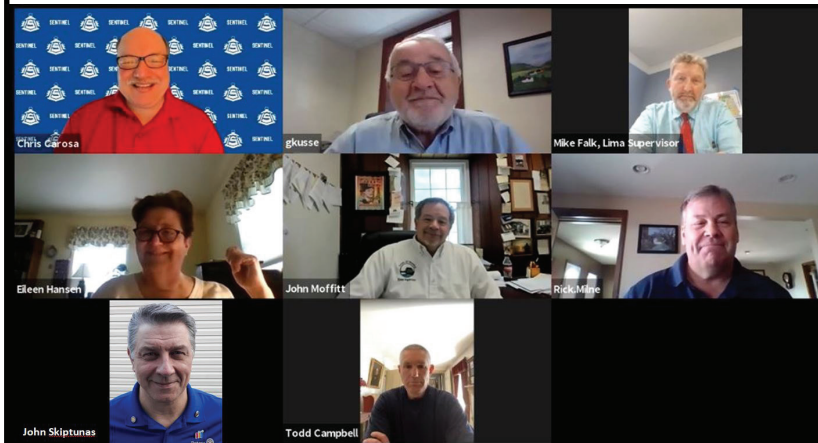

A large cluster of COVID cases in Provincetown gave the CDC the opportunity to learn more about the Delta variant and breakthrough infections. There were over 900 positive infections, but only 7 hospitalizations (all resolved), and no deaths. The vaccines are still highly effective.

The new CDC guidance is if the rate of COVID transmission is Substantial or High in a county, all persons should wear masks indoors, regardless of vaccination status. Monroe County now is within the Substantial rate of community transmission. We now require people to wear masks for indoor services and meetings until the county is below the Substantial rate of community transmission. I hope this is a temporary layer of prevention to protect our parishioners and our neighbors.

We do not anticipate lockdowns or mask mandates from local officials. The new guidance does not address social distancing. I reached out to the Monroe County Health Department and their responses that masking is more important, but it is wise for families to sit apart.

We will continue with an online worship service. We are examining going from a recorded service to a live streamed service, which you would be able to access at your convenience.

Life with the (Word) Smiths

HEADING SOUTH TO THE HAMLET OF NORTH BLOOMFIELD

RESET - Returning to the first half of the 19th century, the original generation of North Bloomfield's first settlers, the Gates family couples of Daniel & Demaris and Marvin & Rachel all passed away between 1833 and 1840. By this time, the bustling Smith's Mills bore little resemblance to the 600 acres of land that the Gates brothers had claimed some 40 years prior.

There were also businesses that weren't dependent upon water power which were contributing to the growth of North Bloomfield. The Martin family, after whom Martin Road was named, had a plow-making business that lasted from 1832 to 1875. Here's our favorite advertizing slogan. The Goodrich General Store demonstrated their diversity by acknowledging that customers could purchase, "everything from clocks to coffins." Because everyone needs to know when it is their time to die. (That last line was ours, not theirs.)

BUSINESS AS USUAL - As was the case in other small hamlets across the country at the time, the same building often served to house both the business owners as well as their businesses. While the business would be front and center, the living quarters might be above, behind, or adjacent to the business.

In looking at the roster of businesses that thrived in North Bloomfield here's a concept that occurred to us. We could for the most part divide the businesses into three categories. There are businesses that are still basically the same so people would be totally familiar with the concept. General stores and taverns would fall into this category.

There are business concepts that basically don't exist anymore, but the type of business became so established that when you hear it, the recognition would be almost universal. Virtually everyone would know that a blacksmith would have put horseshoes on horses although you rarely see a sign for a blacksmith shop nowadays.

WHAT'S A TANNERY? - So we thought we'd pick one that most people would not know at all today and explain it. Every 1800's hamlet would have had a tannery. What happened there? People would have brought in their animal skins so the tanner could have pounded the crap out of them in order to make the skins more pliable. This noble profession does survive in one modern-day cliché. In terms of describing a beating most people are familiar with the expression, "I'm going to tan your hide."

To take this one step further, we'll address the question some of you may be asking which is, "Why would you need pliable animal skin?" Well, after softening up their skins, North Bloomfield residents would wait for the itinerant cobbler (shoemaker) to swing through town and make these animal skins into shoes.

Fully connecting the dots, the cobbler storyline serves to provide confirmation that in the second half of the 19th century, North Bloomfield was becoming a more affluent community. The fleeting services of the itinerant shoemaker were no longer needed when there was so much business that a permanent cobbler established a shop on Main Street.

SCHOOLS - Schooling in the early 1800's would have taken place in private homes. The first school building on record was built in 1814 opposite the cemetery on Rt. 65. The one-room edifice came to bear the self-descriptive

name of "The Little Red Schoolhouse." In terms of the disciplinary nature that would have characterized all schools of the era, we came across one line we liked enough to use in this piece. About the Little Red Schoolhouse it was said that "the ruler was used freely; not always for making straight lines on paper."

That school was eventually replaced by a new building across the street from what was the Universalist Church at the time. That church building eventually morphed into the North Bloomfield School, the white brick building which is still extant on the south side of Martin Road. The church-to-school transition story we fully cover in the portion of this piece devoted to the churches.

HONEOYE FALLS TIMES - Our original North Bloomfield historian hostess Doreen Sensenbach Haller gave us a series of articles titled "North Bloomfield in Early Days" that was published in the *Honeoye Falls Times* in 1917. The series was written by W.R. Hunt who had been a lifelong resident of North Bloomfield, and he had some interesting memories.

One of these was in regard to the man who was, in all likelihood, the most famous person to ever visit the hamlet. Hunt wrote, "An incident in the old church about 1846 made a lasting impression on the mind of the

writer. The abolition of slavery was being agitated as a political factor and Frederick Douglass, the noted colored man and orator, was invited to speak."

As might be expected there was a full house in the North Bloomfield Universalist Church to greet Douglass and listen to his speech. The room was illuminated by candlelight and Hunt remembered gazing up at the speaker standing behind the pulpit, his black face lit by the four candles which stood before him on the pulpit desk.

UNIVERSALIST CHURCH - The North Bloomfield schoolhouse was built on land donated by the Martin family in 1827. The building was originally a Universalist Church which underwent an interesting transformation which we'll share below. The meeting house's architectural style, rarely found in Western, NY, is known as the "Federal Style".

Originally the building had balconies which ran around the entire perimeter of the inside of the building, leaving the center with the high ceiling commonly seen in churches. In 1847 the four balconies were extended and connected to make a full second floor at a cost of \$800. In 1848 the church deeded the first floor to the school district while keeping the second floor for religious services.

CHURCH TO SCHOOL - Joint use continued with the church

occupying the upper floor until 1872, when the Universalists built a new church on the site immediately east of the building. The second floor that had previously served as the Universalist Church was converted to a public hall which hosted a variety of social events.

For the record, that new Universalist Church existed until 1920. It was during that year that the building was torn down and all the church items were sold to St. Paul's Catholic Church which was building its new cathedral in Honeoye Falls at the time.

As stated previously, the second floor of the building continued to be used as a meeting place and there was a stage and accommodations for dances, plays and other events. There was no plumbing; water came from the creek, and outhouses were located behind the building. In school records we found from the late 1800's, the number of students ranged from a low of 76 to a high of 114.

Altogether there were four schoolhouses in North Bloomfield, three of which burned down at some point in time. The remaining one still stands on Martin Road as a two-family residence. It's the large white brick building on the south side of Martin Road, between Bragg Street and Ideson

Road.

WWII TRIBUTE - Pictured in the August 19th issue is a memorial that serves to immortalize the connection between the Ontario County hamlet of North Bloomfield and the Monroe County Honeoye Falls-Mendon community as we stated in the opening week of this series. When WWII ended a tribute memorial was erected which stood on the northeast corner of Honeoye Falls. That would be the corner where now there is an optometrist office, and back in the day it was the State Bank of Honeoye Falls.

The memorial listed an "Honor Roll" of local soldiers who paid the ultimate sacrifice, giving up their lives in the war effort. The soldiers honored on that memorial included all of those from the "Town of Mendon ... and North Bloomfield." This seems to be a meaningfully significant indication of the closeness that was felt between HF-Mendon and North Bloomfield. Their deaths were our deaths.

OUTRO - One of the historical elements that brings North Bloomfield under the umbrella of the *Sentinel* is that during the era of school centralization North Bloomfield was absorbed by Honeoye Falls. How did that happen? Come back next week for the details.
