Patterned after the festive balls, carnivals, and banquets hosted by the lodge in the early 1900s to raise money to purchase and renovate

the hotel that would become their new temple, the occasion this November will be fun, memorable, and charitable.

There will be music, dancing, tours, and perhaps a view into the mysterious history of the nearly 200-year-old brick building. The event kicks off with the interment of the Union Star 2020 Time Capsule. Community Band to Celebrate Local Heritage

Renowned composer, arranger, and professor of Jazz (Eastman School of Music and Lawrence University) Fred Sturm (b. 1951 - d. 2014) graced our community which he called home while raising his family and teaching at Eastman from 1991 to 2002.

Fred naturally gravitated to local musicians and teachers, including Lindsey and Mark Borden, and members of the Honeoye Falls Community Concert Band (HFCCB). Fred's wife, Susan Sturm, played tympani drums in the HFCCB for a few years. And their children, Maddy and Ike, both played in the band at one time or another. A musical family, indeed!

Around the time of the band's 10th anniversary in 1998, the Borden and others, with minimal arm twisting, convinced Fred to compose a concert band piece to commemorate the anniversary. Fred engaged in extensive research on the area, assisted by local historians Diane Ham and Anne Bullock. **Heritage Suite** was composed and first performed by the band that year. The music is officially published, so any concert band can celebrate the suite's themes that echo in many communities.

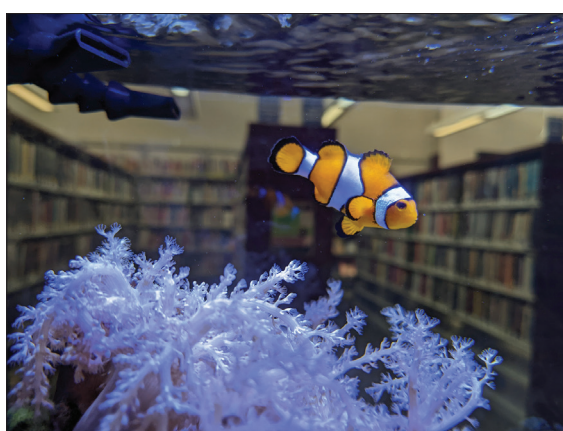
Through five movements, **Heritage Suite** commemorates the people and history of Honeoye Falls and the broader Mendon community. *Dance of the Forebears* resonates with Iroquois dance melodies reminiscent of Totiakton, the Seneca village once located on these lands. *The Mill on the Creek* recalls the hope and innocence of the late 18th century when Zebulon Norton built the first mill on Honeoye Creek. *From Steeples, Sunday Bells* reproduces the neighborly cacophony of Honeoye Fall's several early 19th-century churches. *Letters from the Front* is a musical reading of the words of Omar Richardson, a local Civil War soldier who died serving his country in 1863. The suite ends with *The Black Diamond Express*, sounding like the train that roared through this area between 1895 and 1959.

This year the Honeoye Falls Community Concert Band begins its 35th season and will reprise **Heritage Suite** as part of its traditional Autumn Concert on Saturday, October 22, at 7:00 PM in the HFL District Auditorium, 619 Quaker Meeting House Road, Honeoye Falls. The band invites all to this Autumn Concert to enjoy the season and the music. We know Fred will have the best seat in the house.

Pittsford Volunteer Fire Department will hold a recruitment open house on Saturday October 15 from 9 a.m. to noon at Pittsford Fire Station #1, which is at 8 Monroe Avenue in the village of Pittsford.

You can see the fire trucks and view demonstrations, meet firefighters and more!

As with all local volunteer fire departments (and ambulance services too), Pittsford Fire Department needs more volunteers. Currently, it has about 75 members who collectively repond to over 800 calls for service each year. These calls range from structure fires to car accidents to vehicle fires, Emergency Medical Response, automatic fire and Carbon Monoxide alarms, public assists and other emergencies and requests for service.

This year alone, the fire department has responded to 700 calls for service, according to the department's website.

My son Ben got his first deer last night.

This is a big deal when you are a young man and we are proud of him. Ben received his hunting license during a class held four years ago at our Scout House-Troop 10 in Honeoye Falls. But it was Scouts and local Veterans like Dick Gatto that exposed him to the outdoors and conservation better than I could have.

Ben is an Eagle Scout and last year Ben completed his Eagle Scout project- a Flag Retirement Box which he donated to the American Legion in Honeoye Falls. 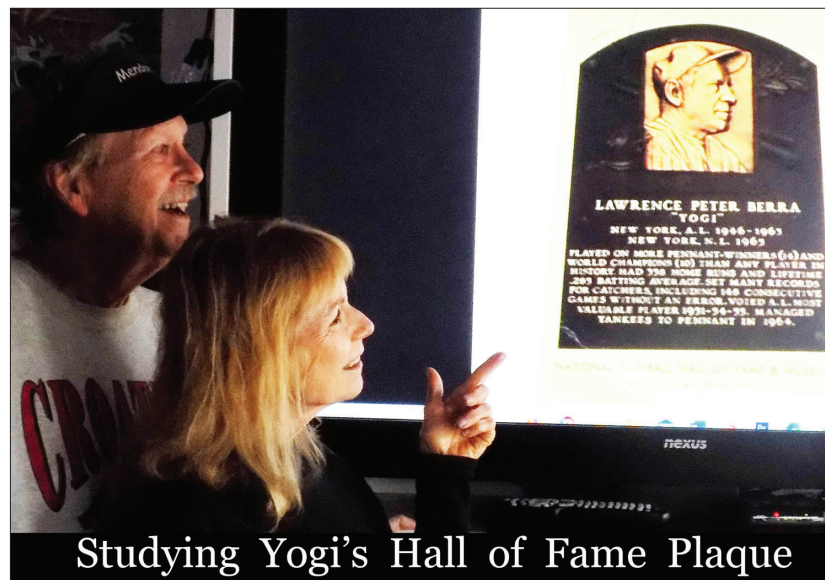
It will be chilly at night but they will be prepared with proper sleeping bags, clothing and food to make it a great weekend.

SMITHS' LISTS: Yogi Berra ~ A Dirty Dozen Yogi-isms



Studying Yogi's Hall of Fame Plaque

We have a book written and awaiting publication that is titled *Listing Dangerously to the Left*. The motif of our book is that every component is written in the form of some kind of list. We've excerpted some of the material from this project in the past, and this week's Smiths' Lists will offer up one of our shorter lists. With the baseball post-season upon us, we hereby present to you our list of favorite quotes from the baseball legend Yogi Berra.

Yogi Berra (1925-2015) was a Hall of Fame baseball catcher for the New York Yankees. In addition to his stellar playing career, he is also revered for his "Yogi-isms" which were unintentionally humorous statements which often held an underlying and powerful message.

Yogi's Yankee career spanned the years 1946-1963 and we'll share a few highlights from his resumé. He was an 18-time All-Star, 10-time World Series Champion and 3-time American League MVP. His 10 World Series titles is a record and he is one of just three players to win the MVP Award three times.

A quick analysis of our numbers in the previous paragraph might lead one to assume that our All-Star stats must be off. How could anyone play in 18 All-Star games during a 17-year career? The answer would be that for a four-year period, 1959-1962, Major League Baseball held two All-Star games per summer. So another way of looking at how successful Yogi was would be to say that of a possible 21 All-Star games, he made the team 18 times!

His unusual nickname was given to him by a friend who had seen a newsreel about India. The friend thought that Berra sat like the spiritual yogis in the Indian film. His name supplied the inspiration for the Yogi Bear cartoon character introduced by Hanna-Barbera in 1958. Conveying the concept that the connection was never lost, in Berra's initial obituary the Associated Press actually wrote that Yogi Bear had died.

Berra was a beloved figure whose death in 2015, at the age of 90, was mourned by the nation in general and New York City in particular. The Yankees added a #8 patch to their uniforms, all New York City flags were lowered to half-staff and the Empire State Building was illuminated in blue and white Yankee pinstripes. The Yankees have retired his #8 which will never again be worn by a member of the team.

We'll close by sharing our favorite dozen Yogi-isms with you. It is a wonderfully paradoxical collection of unintentional witticisms, combining humor with distilled bits of wisdom. As he so perfectly put it, "I never said most of the things I said." Here's our countdown.

#12 - "Baseball is 90% mental and the other half is physical."

#11 - "Never answer an anonymous letter."

#10 - "It gets late early out there."

#9 - "It ain't over till it's over." At the time he said this, in July 1973, Berra was managing the Mets who trailed the Chicago Cubs by 9½ games in the National League East. The Mets rallied to clinch the division title in their second-to-last game of the regular season, and eventually reach the World Series.

#8 - "He hits from both sides of the plate. He's amphibious."

#7 - "Little League baseball is a very good thing because it keeps the parents off the streets."

#6 - "It's like déjà vu all over again." Berra explained that this quote originated when he witnessed Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris repeatedly hitting back-to-back home runs in the Yankees' seasons in the early 1960's.

#5 - "Always go to other people's funerals, otherwise they won't come to yours."

#4 - "I'm not going to buy my kids an encyclopedia. Let them walk to school like I did."

#3 - "When you come to a fork in the road, take it." This is a perfect example of how Yogi-isms can make sense in a crazy way. He said this when giving directions to his home to Joe Garagiola. Yogi lived on a circle at the halfway point so when you came to the fork in the road it didn't really matter which way you went.

#2 - "I don't know (if they were men or women fans running naked across the field). They had bags over their heads."

#1 - On why he no longer went to Rigazzi's, a St. Louis restaurant: "No one goes there nowadays, it's too crowded."

Here's the limerick we wrote regarding Yogi's comment about not buying his kids an encyclopedia.

*There's no encyclopedia bid
That's not how I will bring up my kid
There will be no doubt
No easy way out
Let him walk to school just like I did*

Can you feel inflation eating away at your income? Are you worried matters will only get worse as the nation dives deeper into recession? Perhaps you're eyeing that favorite hobby of yours, wondering if you can tweak it a bit to bring in some much-needed revenue.

What's holding you back?

If you've spent the bulk of your career working for someone else, it's only natural to wonder if starting a business right now is worth it. You can be on the cusp of retirement or even in retirement. "If you value autonomy, being in control of your own time, guaranteed employment, and if you believe in your idea to the utmost, starting your own business is a great option," says Joe Chatham, Founder & Managing Partner of USA 500 Clubs LLC in Boston. In a world where you are always being asked to give of yourself, it's almost impossible to consider your own wants and needs. Someone is constantly there to demand your attention. This burden of others can distract you until the day you die.

Don't let it.

At the same time, don't ignore it.

Yes, there are ways to share your time and talent, but it might be easier to do once you've secured your treasure.

Rather than fighting it, lean into it. Other people have wants and needs that aren't fulfilled. Instead of working for them to

fill that void, why not create a business that supplies the product or service that provides to them?

"We live for the chase," says Walicki. "Setting a vision, developing a strategy and executing against it, provides an immeasurable sense of pride and accomplishment. We are solving real problems. The punctuation mark on living for the chase is hearing customers tell us how our products made their lives simpler. They now have time for more strategic work and their family."

Sure, they'll have to pay for it instead of getting it for free by corraling your time. But, then again, if they're not willing to pay for it, do they really want it or need it?

Michael Nova, Director of Nova Custom Printing in New York City, says, "Starting your own business is immensely gratifying and allows you to experience freedom in your life that you may have thought impossible before. Imagine living a life of freedom, without the feeling of having anyone looking over your shoulder, telling you what to do. It is literally a weight lifted off of your shoulders. The freedom of making your own hours, following your own dream, and living life on your terms and no one else's, is irreplaceable. If you have a dream of becoming an entrepreneur, I say with all my heart, follow that dream."

Think about that the next time you sacrifice your day for somebody else.

FROM HITHER AND YON

We interrupt this segment of *Railroad Avenue* for **BREAKING NEWS** from the world of sport... the renamed Cleveland **"Guardians"** have arrived!

What should be everyone's favorite Major League Baseball team (certainly the writer's since childhood) has gone from being expected to finish last in their division to contending for the 2022 American League crown. We're talkin' about an organization in a former smokestack city that has cleaned up its act... and its once-flaming Cuyahoga River... Cleveland, Ohio.

Deserving of another champion in the major sports, only its 2016 *NBA Cavaliers* have won since the *NFL Browns* beat the *Colts* in 1964. For someone negotiating this near-wasteland of championships, this sage advice tempers the annual pain inflicted upon a Cleveland baseball maven: "Pennant fever in Cleveland usually is a 24-hour virus."

More the baseball fan than anything else, Mr. News & Notes was literally in diapers in 1948, when the city of Cleveland was blessed with its last *World Series* championship. Thus, he's never truly known the euphoria of sending home the likes of the *Yankees*, the *Red Sox*, or any of those big shots in that other league. Meanwhile, except for a couple of excruciatingly close calls lost amid the decades of mediocrity, my blue-collar team can only fantasize about champagne showers.

It must be said that, in 1954, Cleveland set the league mark for most wins in a season, 111. However, they were swept by Rochester's own Johnny Antonelli and his New York *Giants* in the *World Series*. Except to say that the family got its first television set that October (coincidence?), it was a season to forget.

However, there have been several reasons to stick with this club, whose century old nickname, "*Indians*," became a four-letter word in recent years, and was banished with the current 2022 season. Their cartoonish logo, "*Chief Wahoo*," which disappeared the previous year, was a major reason for my attraction. It never dawned on me that it was derogatory or racist... no more than the caricatures of Elmer Fudd or Charlie Brown that should make white folks laughing stocks by comparison. Those guys haven't been banned, nor have they been used as a cudgel on an entire race of people

As part of a national campaign, spearheaded by Native Americans to eradicate offensive nicknames, icons, fashion statements, et al, the directors of *Cleveland Indians Baseball, Inc.* relented by phasing out both the *Indians* name and the *Chief Wahoo* logo. Now they are the *Guardians*, inspired by the "*Guardians of Traffic*," eight 43-foot-tall art deco sandstone sculptures on Cleveland's Hope Memorial Bridge, which happens to be adjacent to the ballclub's stadium, *Progressive Field*.

And that name, while under the guise of Flo and her *Progressive Insurance* bosses, who pay dearly for stadium naming rights, typifies the progressive nature of the management of Cleveland *Indians Baseball, Inc.*, sorry, Cleveland *Guardians Baseball, Inc.* Except for several intransigent organizations, municipalities, and a number of stubborn fans, all manner of Native names and symbols have

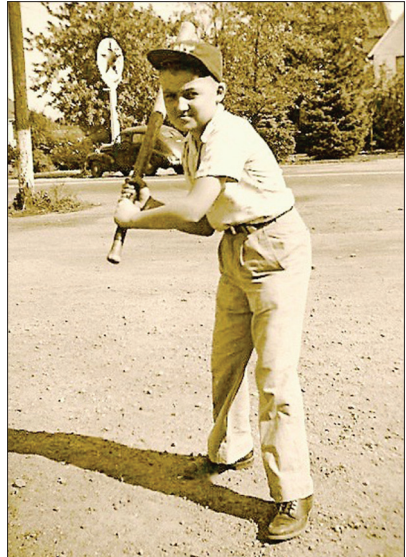
been eliminated from the public eye. America still has a long row to hoe, but Cleveland's baseball gurus deserve credit for trying. Here are a few reasons why...

In 1947, the second African-American man to follow Brooklyn's Jackie Robinson into the big leagues weeks later, and the first man of color in the American League, was Cleveland's Larry Doby. He suffered the same indignities as Robinson, but his struggles did not generate much media attention. Noted one baseball reference: "Whether it was being forced to stay in separate hotels or eat in separate restaurants on the road, or not being accepted by some of his teammates, Doby persevered."

Just to prove he belonged, Larry was an All-Star seven of his first eight years in the majors; the first black man to hit a *World Series* home run, helping Cleveland win its last baseball title (1948); and the first of his race to lead both leagues in four-baggers (1952). Cleveland introduced six black players into the majors by 1951 (including national favorite, Satchel Paige, and a local favorite to be mentioned later), while the vaunted *Yankees* failed to integrate until 1955 (Elston Howard). Their storied rivals, Boston's *Red Sox*, were the last team in baseball to do so... in 1959 (Pumpsie Green)... fully a dozen years after Robinson and Doby.

Additionally, Cleveland pioneered the hiring of Frank Robinson, *MLB's* first African-American manager in 1975. He was followed in 1978 by Doby, the game's second black manager, who took over the *White Sox* helm in 1978. In 1998, based on his big league start in Cleveland, Larry Doby returned the favor by being elected to the *National Baseball Hall of Fame* in Cooperstown.

Cleveland's baseball era of the 1940s into the early '60s, literally gave the game a melting pot of ballplayers. Concurrently, it spawned avid Cleveland baseball fans, Russ Mahr (HFCS '58), whose favorite childhood players were surnamed: Feller, Avila, Doby, Rosen, Lemon and Wertz; Paul Swartz (HFCS '60), added Colavito, Wilhelm, Wynn, the unlucky Herb Score (his career stunted by a Yankee line drive to the eye), and Roger Maris, who started with Cleveland, ended with St. Louis... but wore Yankee pinstripes long enough to break Babe Ruth's home run record with 61 in '61.

That year News' older brother, yet another Cleveland fan, graduated HFCS. The origins of his fondness for Cleveland date to the 1920's, when our father emulated *Indians'* Hall of Famer, Tris Speaker, when contesting his older brother (a.k.a. Detroit's Ty Cobb) in spirited one-on-one farmyard baseball games. Dad carried his love for Cleveland until the day he died... and, in appreciation, the Cleveland organization posthumously saluted his dedication.

Soon to follow was the writer, an equally effusive Cleveland fan (HFCS '66). I took a fancy to: Al Smith, "Sudden Sam" McDowell, "Daddy Wags" Wagner, star-crossed Tony Horton, wacky Jimmy Piersall, glass-chewing Joe Charbonneau, "Thunder"

Thornton, Mel Hall (from Lyons, NY) and Ray Fosse (a promising catcher, until his friend, Pete Rose, crashed into him in the '70 All-Star Game).

Not to be forgotten was monstrous Luke Easter, base coach for Rochester when the writer saw him, but formerly hitting prodigious homers from the Negro Leagues to the Big Leagues. In fact, in 1950, he hit the longest home run ever stroked in Cleveland's Municipal Stadium. He was one of the most popular men to ever play for Cleveland... and Rochester and Buffalo, too! Tragically, as a payroll courier after leaving baseball, he died on a Cleveland street in 1979... shot to death by robbers.

Then there were talented players adding Latin blood to the game via the Cleveland pipeline... the aforementioned Avila, plus Minoso, Power, Davalillo, Carrasquel, Tiant, Vizquel and Baerga, along with many others. To this kid, the Cleveland club was the "United Nations of Baseball"... and I loved them for it... even though they played in that huge, drafty Municipal Stadium (1931-1995) that was especially designed for football. "*The Mistake by the Lake*," 'twas often called.

Today, wrapping up the first year of "*Guardians*" at the helm of Cleveland's diamond fortunes, this group (youngest in baseball, averaging ~26 years), plays like no team has in many years. Their infectious style is becoming "must-see TV" while re-energizing fan interest in the game. At five players each, they have an equal number of California natives and Dominicans, three Canadians (two are brothers), a pair of Venezuelans, and an array of other Americans... including a key starting pitcher born in Brooklyn.

[Sadly, Brighton's Ernie Clement, quite familiar with local ballfields during his high school, travel and Legion ball days, spent the past two seasons with Cleveland, before being released three weeks ago. His daring mad-dash from second base to home saved the *Guardians* on September 16th and made ESPN's highlights of the week... but he was let go eight days later, only to finish the season with the lowly *Oakland A's*. Baseball can be a cruel game. At 26, fortunately, let's hope Ernie has a lot of baseball left in the tank.]

Not a team of mashers, Cleveland hitters make contact at a higher rate... steal or take the extra base with aplomb... spend more time working with the score against them... but never quit and often overtake their opponent in the late innings. They run into walls, rip pants and apply a patina of green to the seats of those pants. Their starting pitching has been clutch, supported by a lights-out relief staff that struts in to finish the job.

Closing the regular season at 91 wins and 71 losses, the prognosticators could only blush, when 71-91 was more to their guessing. Chicago's *White Sox* and Minnesota's *Twins* would overtake the *Guardians* during September, "they" said. But 24 wins in their last 30 games left both rivals in the dust, 11 and 14 games behind, and only the Houston *Astros* and the *Yankees* finished with better records. "They" have been falling all over themselves, praising the *Guardians* ever since.

Then came the playoffs. First, their "Wildcard Round" versus the Tampa Bay *Rays*. Game #1 was decided on a two-run homerun, by veteran run producer, Jose Ramirez... Cleveland 2, Tampa 1. Game #2, a 15-inning marathon last Saturday afternoon in sunny Cleveland, was the longest post-season game in *MLB* history... Cleveland 1, Tampa 0... thanks to a dramatic solo launch by rookie sensation, Oscar Gonzalez. Call it poetic justice, but the reputation for lacking sluggers faded with the clouts that won BOTH of these critical games.

To close out the *Rays'* season, it took a classic game for baseball purists... not only the **15 innings**, spread over **4 hours and 59 minutes**, but a combined **39 strikeouts**, on merely **11 hits**, contested by **40 players**. Nearly 35,000 people were in rapt attendance, with perhaps a couple of thousand on their way home when the nail-biting conclusion transpired. Tsk, tsk... those folks should have stuck around for the epic finish.

What could be more fitting than having this latest chapter of Cleveland baseball highlighted with momentous home runs by two players of color? By the time you read this, barring rainouts, the *Yankees* of New York and the freshly-minted *Guardians* will have contested one or two games of their best-of-five series.

As long-time Cleveland rooters, we may have had to accept a more sensitive alternative to *Chief Wahoo*, the Native American mascot, displayed since 1915. Even so, there are myriad reasons to luxuriate in the team's progressive approach to the democratic ideals of baseball. If for no other reason, this team plays with joy and camaraderie... isn't that what the essence of this game is all about?

LCS girls soccer earn second victory in a shutout

The Lima Christian Girls Varsity Soccer team has faced the injury bug the last couple of weeks with three of their games played with just 10 players during most of those three contests.

LCS bowed to C.G. Finney 6-1 on September 27. Already down a couple of players due to injury, the Lady Saints wound up playing most of the game with just 10 players after an injury to another player. Genesis Leathersich opened the scoring six minutes into the game, assisted by Jordyn Warsaw. Warsaw also assisted on the second goal, which was scored by Brielle Hammond seven minutes after Leathersich's goal. Two minutes later, Leathersich tallied an unassisted goal for a 3-0 lead. Abby Britton made it 4-0 with a goal 21 minutes into the game. Jasmine Lakra added a goal with 11 minutes remaining in the first half, assisted by Sophy Britton. Megan Sanders popped the ball into the net with 10 minutes left in the half and Abby Britton connected again, assisted by Lakra, with three minutes left in the first half as the squad held a 7-0 halftime advantage. Marsh recorded the final goal three minutes into the second half. Dils split time with Anna Durkee and each was called upon to make only one save.

"It was a good win by the girls after the losses," Britton said. "We were able to check on how a new formation was working. We have also worked on our passing, stringing several passes together instead of kicking the ball and running after it. Abby Dils and our defense have come along. I am happy with how the team overall is improving. We played really well and I am hoping it sets us up for a good week this week."

LCS ends the regular season with games against Mount Morris on October 13 and School of the Arts on October 14.

HF-L runners have spectacular week

With strong performances in a pair of invitationals bookending the first week of October, the Honeoye Falls-Lima Varsity Cross Country teams are on a good path as they make their way toward the postseason championships.

HF-L's girls finished fourth with 134 points in the Girls Varsity AA (Medium schools) race at the prestigious McQuaid Invitational on October 1. They were the best team from Section V in that race as the only schools who finished ahead of them were a pair of schools from the Albany area and one from Ohio; the next best school from Section V in that race was Pittsford Sutherland which finished seventh. Kate Brennan led the Cougars with a 10th place in a time of 19 minutes, 34.9 seconds. Cayla Lawrence took 15th with a time of 19:44.9 over the 3-mile course at Genesee Valley Park. Wanzenried led the defense with two interceptions and a fumble recovery. Miller added one interception.

Things don't get any easier for HF-L which hosts undefeated Batavia on October 14 at 7:30 p.m.

"The loss to Monroe stings but it may help us as Batavia is very similar to Monroe in that they have a good combination of size and speed," Russ said.

Mayor, Supervisor Weekly Update As Of Friday, October 7th Nominations for Wheatland Hall of Fame, Lima Water District

Village of Honeoye Falls

Rick Milne, Mayor:

"Village of Honeoye Falls – Updates

- Brush Pick-Up will begin to shut down today. Village crews will make one more trip around the Village early next week but will then get trucks set up to begin leaf pick up only as of 10-17-21.
- Our next Village Board meeting is scheduled for October 17th and we will have two public hearings scheduled. One will discuss and then hear any comments from residents regarding updated Honeoye Falls Cemetery regulations. The other will be to discuss the continued allowance of Video Conferencing for official village meetings (as needed) and to allow Village Board members to vote on line if they cannot attend a meeting in person due to an emergency. (This is not something we want any board members to routinely take advantage of.) Information for these public hearings will be posted in the *Sentinel* and may also be reviewed at the Village office or on the Village Website once it is fully prepared and official notice goes out.
- Saturday – October 15th - 6-8 PM Harry Allen Park – Annual Pumpkin Festival hosted by our local girl scout organizations. This has quickly become a very popular event in the Village.
- Also on Saturday, October 15th – Honeoye Falls Boy-Scout Troop 10 will host a Pulled Pork Dinner fundraiser at Dipper Dan from 1-4 PM for pre-sale pick-up. You may purchase tickets from Troop 10 members."

County Legislature – Updates

- We do expect to vote on the redistricting process at next weeks full Legislative meeting.
- The legislature will begin to review in detail the Administration's plans and requests for the county's ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funding programs. While the county did receive some 140 million in ARPA funds, project requests for funds are over 1-billion dollars. The Legislature will need to come to agreement on the projects to support and the final determination of what projects should truly be PRIORITY projects. I am concerned that there have been no specific projects approved that were submitted by our towns, however we have not seen all the projects that were reviewed.

Town of Mendon

John Moffitt, Supervisor:

"A couple of items this week. First of all, our Mendon Town budget was moved to the preliminary status. There is a public hearing on Monday, October 17th. I certainly encourage all of our residents to view the budget online. You can also see a copy here at Town Hall and I appreciate any comments or concerns that you have regarding our budget."

"Once again, our budget is flat in 2023, the same as it was in 2022. In 2022, we had a 10% decrease in the tax rate. And so, we're holding that this year."

"I also wanted to mention that our Splash Park Military Memorial, and all services are included in our budget. There's no decline in any services. Once again that public hearing is October 17th at the Mendon Community Center."

"October 24th is our Town Board workshop meeting on short-term rentals. We certainly encourage people to come and tell us what they think we should have in our code regarding short term rentals. And if you can't attend, please send me an email. My email is available on the town website."

"I wanted to mention again that we have our recycling event coming up on Saturday the 15th at Semmel Road at the Highway Department. There's a shredding that will take place on site. There's rabies vaccinations for dogs and cats. There is a pharmaceutical collection and an electronics collection. So please, it's from 11AM to 1PM. Please, check your basement, your garage wherever you tend to store things like that until one of these events comes up."

"The Youth Center is up and running. It opened up on October third. That's going to follow the HF-L school calendar. It's open from 2PM-6PM Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursdays."

"A couple of things. We have a couple of new businesses in the Hamlet: one being the train shop, which is in the former Bistro – I had an opportunity to talk to that owner and we're glad to see that building full again; and, the building on the corner that was the Chinese restaurant a few years ago was sold recently, and now it's been resold again. The newest owners are looking into some opportunities for that building."

"The brush pick up from the Town of Mendon Highway Department is still going on. It started October 3rd. They'll probably be a couple of weeks picking up brush based on what I've seen on the shoulders of the road. Once again, this is the Town of Mendon outside the Village of Honeoye Falls. You can still bring your brush to the highway department during normal business hours."

"Lastly, we're in that political season. We certainly want people to exercise their freedom of speech. But I do want to remind everyone that temporary signs which include political signs must be fifteen feet from the edge of the pavement, and also all state and county laws will be adhered to. In other words, you can't put a political sign on the post that holds a stop sign. Things like that. We also remind people try to keep away from intersections. We don't want to block the view at the intersections, that type of thing. The local code for any temporary sign, including political signs, is fifteen feet from the edge of the pavement. Please adhere to that. And, as I mentioned, we certainly want everyone to have their opinions if they choose, but please adhere to that."

**Board of Supervisors
Authorizes
Intermunicipal
Agreement with
Livingston County
Water and Sewer
Authority**

The Livingston County Board of Supervisors has authorized an Intermunicipal Agreement formalizing collaboration between the Livingston County Water and Sewer Authority (LCWSA) and the County to further develop the Leicester/York Regional Water Supply Expansion Project.

With the demand for potable water expected to grow across Livingston County over the next 30 years, the project, which would be one of the largest regional water sharing initiatives in New York State, will achieve the County's interest in providing enhanced public drinking water infrastructure to the Towns of Leicester and York as well as supporting regional interests of providing greater access to affordable, safe drinking water for all participating municipalities. In addition, the project would significantly upgrade infrastructure including pipelines, pumping stations, treatment facilities and water towers throughout the County while also maximizing current water supplies and planning for future increases in demand.

"Managing and protecting water supplies for residents remains a priority for the County and all of our municipalities," said David LeFeber who serves as the Chair of the Board of Supervisors. "The Intermunicipal Agreement, authorized by the Board, represents an important step towards supporting and funding water system improvements needed for the communities impacted by the Retsof Salt Mine collapse."

To that effort, the Board of Supervisors has approved the Akzo Settlement Committee's recommendations to use funding from the Akzo Nobel settlement for design and engineering work related to the improvement of public drinking water infrastructure in the Towns of Leicester and York. The County is also exploring numerous grant opportunities that would match these funds in an effort to leverage public dollars with available grant monies.

"This Intermunicipal Agreement represents an important step forward in the partnership with the Livingston County Water Sewer Authority to provide high quality and reliable water services for the residents of western Livingston County," added York Town Supervisor, Gerald L. Deming.

David M. Fenaro, Supervisor for the Town of Leicester, also endorses the Board's decision.

"Our goal is to increase the supply of affordable, clean water to our residents here in Livingston County. This regional water infrastructure project will advance those efforts," he added.

In 1994, the Retsof Salt Mine collapsed, rendering an underground aquifer unusable for potable water allocation. As a result, a memorandum of understanding between Livingston County, Akzo Nobel, Inc., the Department of Environmental Conservation and the Office of the New York State Attorney General was established and funds were set aside to address environmental impacts.

To date, six villages and towns throughout the County including the Villages of Mount Morris, Leicester and Avon along with the Towns of York, Leicester and Avon have also signed intermunicipal agreements with LCWSA, further bolstering the support for a regional water project.

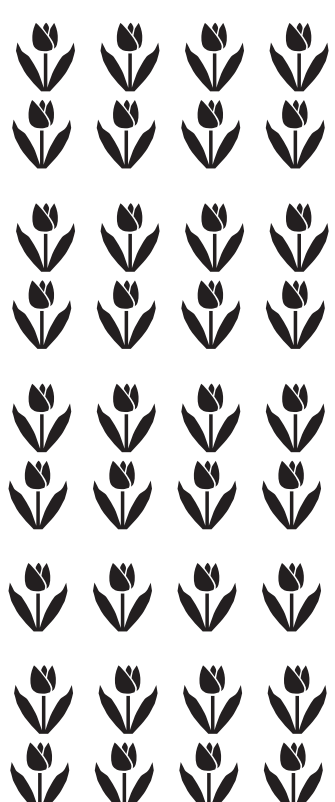

The Four States That Were Once Independent Countries

RESET - As you know if you've read our articles and books over the years, we love the concept of quirky historical/geographical stories. We've saved some of our favorites for you to share over the next few weeks. Some years ago while we were writing our historical geography book, we were intrigued by a quirky concept in U.S. history. Of the 50 United States there were four that were actually independent countries for some period of time.

When we initiated this storyline last week we shared with you the premise that three of the four states which were once countries are what we would consider somewhat logical choices while one of these we would never had guessed prior to researching this piece.

That state, which we covered last week, would be Vermont. The quick backstory on that would be that during the Revolutionary War, Vermont was not one of the 13 colonies, but rather a part of British Canada. In order to extricate itself from British control, Vermont declared independence and was its own country from 1777-1791 when it joined the United States.

The other state we did last week was Hawaii, which was an independent kingdom from 1795-1898 when it was annexed by the U.S. The other U.S. states that were once independent countries were Texas and California. We'll take a look at those two storylines this week.

TAKING TEXAS - Here's an observation of ours regarding the concept of the four states that were once independent countries. When we offered this up as a trivia question and asked people to guess, the most frequent answer we heard was Texas. And if that's what you thought when you read this, you were correct. Texas was once a part of Mexico but as American expansionism drove westward during the 1800's "adios Mexico" was written all over the map of Texas.

What led to the rift between Texas and Mexico? The single biggest factor was the insurgence of American settlers in the territory of Texas. As the percentage of people with Anglo-American roots increasingly grew in proportion to the percentage of people with Spanish-Mexican roots, the swing in sentiment was inevitable.

It was in 1835 when the tide significantly turned. The Texans formed an army and engaged their Mexican counterparts in a three-month war known as the Texas Revolution. The Mexican Army retreated south and on March 2, 1836 Texas made its official Declaration of Independence effectively creating the Republic of Texas.

The Mexican response was to send a 6,000-man army led by Santa Anna into Texas in an attempt to reclaim the breakaway territory. The Mexicans enjoyed the initial success with the most historically symbolic victory occurring at the Alamo. With the Mexicans outnumbering the Texans 1,800 to 200, the besieged Alamo was eventually overrun and most of the people inside were killed including Davy Crockett and Sam Bowie. Santa Anna's ruthless take-no-prisoners savagery however backfired in a sense as "Remember the Alamo" became the legendary rallying battle cry in an inspired and rejuvenated Texan war effort.

On April 21, 1836 General Sam Houston led his troops against Santa Anna's forces in the Battle of San

Jacinto near the modern-day city of Houston. Sam Houston defeated the Mexicans and captured Santa Anna. At that point the Mexican general signed the Treaties of Velasco thus ending the war.

The Texan time as an independent country ran from 1836-1845 when, although Texas governed itself, Mexico refused to recognize its independence. For the first six years, after Texan independence, things remained peaceful. During the year of 1842 Mexico twice attempted unsuccessful military incursions to retake Texas.

U.S. INVOLVEMENT - On February 28, 1845, the U.S. Congress narrowly passed a bill endorsing the concept that if the Republic of Texas asked to be annexed into the United States that request would be accepted. On October 13th of that same year Texans did pass a vote requesting U.S. annexation. On December 29th Texas was accepted as the 28th state in the union.

The Mexican government had long warned that a U.S. annexation would mean war. The Mexican government subsequently broke diplomatic relations with the United States which

assumed responsibility for defending all land north of the Rio Grande River that had been established as the border between Texas and Mexico.

In June of 1845, in anticipation of pending problems with the Mexicans, President James K. Polk sent General Zachary Taylor to Texas with an army of 3,500 prepared to defend what would soon be our home turf.

MEXICAN ATTACK - On April 25, 1846, a 2,000-man-strong Mexican cavalry battalion attacked a 70-man U.S. patrol operating north of the Rio Grande, killing 16 U.S. soldiers. Both nations subsequently declared war. The ensuing Mexican-American War was a fairly one-sided event.

That being said, this no longer qualifies as a spoiler alert, but as an indication of how one-sided that war was, after the aforementioned Mexican assault on the U.S. patrol, there was never another battle fought in Texas. The Mexican-American War consisted of the U.S. army going south of the border and fairly quickly pummeling the Mexicans into submission. The war lasted less than two years and the Rio Grande was permanently established as the border between Mexico and the

United States. Next let's head west to Cali.

CALIFORNIA CALLIN' - The California Republic was a short-lived country that existed in what is now northern California. The legacy lasted for an inspired three-week span in 1846 and managed to spawn some spicy stories. A group of rambunctious Californians jumped the gun and declared sovereignty in California at a time when, unbeknownst to them, a U.S. military contingency was already on its way with the intent of annexing the then-Mexican territory.

As we mentioned, this was during the time when the Mexican-American War was being fought and at a period when, as we saw in the previous component of this piece, the Mexicans couldn't even mount a respectable defense of their territory right across the border. That being said, it was clear that the Mexicans were totally impotent of any ability to defend their former territory on the Pacific Coast. America's imminent domain movement was in full force.

During the era of Mexican rule, this territory was referred to as Alta California and the launching point for the uprising and declaration of independence was in Sonoma, California, near San Francisco. Of the four examples of current states that were independent countries at some point in time, the California Republic was far and away the shortest experiment with autonomy. While Hawaii lasted for 103 years, Vermont had a 14-year run, and Texas lasted for 10 years, the independence party in Cali lasted for only three weeks. Here's the timeline and explanation.

CATCH A WAVE - The date is June 14, 1846, when the San Francisco Freedom Fighters first catch a wild hare and decide to break free from Mexico and declare independence. They storm the residence of Mexican General Mariano Vallejo, who surrenders without a single shot being fired, and hastily raise a flag over the town square in Sonoma, California.

The flag depicts a bear and a single star modeled after the Lone Star of Texas, with the words "California Republic" emblazoned underneath. It is certainly a proud moment for Californians even if, and we think you'll agree when you look at our pictures, their silhouetted bear looks more like a pig!

The Republic's first and only president was William B. Ide, whose administration lasted twenty-five days. On June 23, 1846, U.S. Army Major John C. Frémont arrived with sixty soldiers and took command in the name of the United States. The Bear Flag was replaced by the Stars and Stripes putting an end to the California Republic and marking the beginning of California's formal annexation by the United States. The "republic" disbanded and President Ide enlisted in the U.S. forces as a private.

The primary legacy of this colorful incident in California history is the California state flag, which is based on the flag raised during the rebellion. The original historic flag made its way through a number of hands and is believed to have perished in the San Francisco earthquake and fire of 1906, although photographs of the flag exist to show us what it once looked like. We have included here a pictorial storyline showing the evolution of the flag of California.

So now that we've covered the four states that were once countries where do we go for our follow up? Next week we're essentially going to reverse the process. Rather than going from independent countries to joining the United States, we'll take a look at the (parts of) states which seceded from the U.S. attempting to become independent. And first up will be a storyline which may surprise you. During 1861 there were 12 votes in favor of secession from the United States. Eleven of these were from the states which comprised the Confederacy. The other was from a small town in Western, New York about an hour away from us. There are rebels amongst us and we'll expose them for you!
