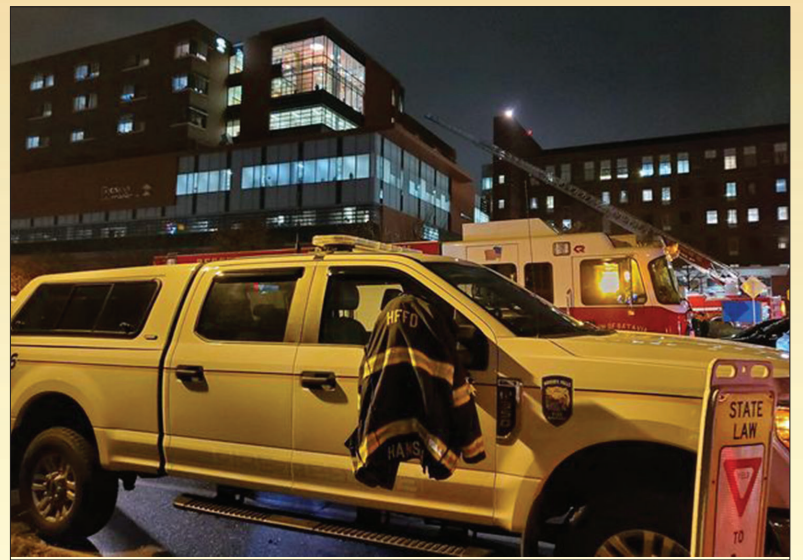

HF-L voters pass Capital Project proposal

In a light voter turnout, residents of the Honeoye Falls-Lima Central School District passed a \$40.2 million dollar capital project on December 13.

The proposal passed with 218 yes votes to 135 no votes. The vast majority of the project money will be spent at the high school with the next highest at the middle school, then Lima Primary and then Manor School.

With its passage, the district will start the design phase in hopes of submitting that information to the New York State Education Department in 2023 and the awarding of bids and start of construction to begin in 2024.

We're Dreaming of
a White Christmas

This week we're going to conclude our colorful commentary regarding idioms and phrases containing the word white. And, for the record, the definition of an idiom is an expression or phrase which takes on a meaning other than what the words would appear to mean on the surface.

We're not going to "beat around the bush" or "cut corners;" we'll just give you some examples you can "wrap your head around." If you're "feeling under the weather" when "it's raining cats and dogs," don't get "bent out of shape." So, there you have a flurry of wordplay exemplifying the concept of the idiom.

In previous weeks you saw our "white knight" ride in on his "white elephant" ready to "wave the white flag." This week we'll get musical with the story on "White Christmas" as well as sharing some other white musical highlights.

WHITE CHRISTMAS - The two-word expression "white Christmas" first began to appear in the English language in the 1840's to describe the phenomenon of having snow fall on December 25th. But it would be a century later when the song "White Christmas" would elevate the expression to the iconic status it's come to hold in our language and society.

Many of our readers probably know that it was Bing Crosby who recorded the original version, but there are some truly interesting storylines regarding the early history of the song with which many people are probably not familiar. So stay tuned and we'll endeavor to jack up your "White Christmas" IQ. One aspect of the song that most of you won't think about when you hear it in 2022 is how deep the connection was between the original release of the song and WW II.

Pearl Harbor, which brought the U.S. into WW II, occurred on December 7, 1941 and a mere 18 days later, writer Irving Berlin had "White Christmas" ready for its world debut when Bing Crosby sang it on the *Kraft Music Hall* radio show.

The Bing Crosby record did not come out until the Christmas of 1942 and the lyrics were totally appropriate to verbalize the thoughts going through the minds of the thousands of U.S. troops who were sent overseas during that first year of the war. The nostalgic memories of Christmases past would be the only family traditions all those soldiers had to celebrate during that first wartime holiday far away from home.

Next let's turn our attention to songwriter Irving Berlin who wrote many classic tunes such as "Alexander's Ragtime Band" and "God Bless America." When you, in the 1930's, have written a song that is still played at the 7th inning stretch of every major league baseball game in the 2020's, well, by God, you certainly have written yourself a Jim Dandy.

So, if you're Irving Berlin, how do you top that? How 'bout you write the song that becomes the biggest selling record of all time?! That is the accolade which is attributed to "White Christmas." There has to be a single song planted atop that perch and "White Christmas" is it. It is the angel mounted on top of the tree, so to speak.

Ready for a final kicker on this Christmas classic? Irving Berlin was Jewish. The dude who wrote the biggest Christmas song of all time didn't believe in Christ! That's almost like finding out... the Easter Bunny is Muslim, that Buddha has gone on a diet, and the Pope isn't Catholic.

The Carosa Commentary

A Classic Christmas Postcard

There's something about this season that evokes bygone memories. These aren't sepia toned memories – I'm not that old – they're more like a mix of warm vibrant colors filmed with a soft lens. In other words, they bring forth feelings both nostalgic and pleasant. Think of a classic Christmas postcard, its snow covered landscape offering the perfect contrast to the brilliant but somehow muted colors surrounding a heartfelt home filled with love and the joy of expectation. This paints the picture of the memories I'm writing about.

Except my memories aren't make believe. They are very real, although the distant years sometimes make me wonder if the soft lens distorts more than the crisp definitions we've become all too accustomed to in the digitized world in which we live. No matter. The price of a slight distortion here and there is well worth the comfort of the inner smile they bring.

Of course these memories, as they do for everyone and almost by definition, come from our own childhood. It's not as though we seek escape to some imaginary past. It's more like we wish to capture that same feeling we had in our youth and pass it on to our own children. After all, some day in the future, time will soften that sharp digitized reality of today into a pleasurable fuzzy memory of tomorrow.

For now, I close my eyes on this late evening and take myself back to a time when the snow fell in large Charlie Brown sized flakes. The small house is warm as the lone street light illuminates the white blanket outside of frost covered windows separating the warmth of our family parlor from the lake effect wind chill on the other side. Mind you, not all that frost is real. Some of it comes from a powder decoration we sprayed on those windows to augment the appearance of that outside chill. The colder it looks outside, the warmer it feels inside, with your family beside you and those small tokens you value most.

Decorations have long been a tradition of the season. In a time when "off-the-shelf" meant there's most likely something broken on the floor (as in, "it just fell off the shelf"), decorations had to be hand-made. I don't know which magazines my mother subscribed to – Good Housekeeping or Ladies Home Journal – but this time of year they lay on the floor turned to pages promising the reader a cornucopia of inexpensive – or better yet, recycled for free from used materials – Christmas decorations. It seemed each evening when my father returned from work a dozen more decorations greeted

him. They were anything from angels made from old books (and spray-painted gold – oh, the smell of freshly sprayed aerosol paint), to Styrofoam ball snowmen replete with felt eyes, nose, and buttons,

to Christmas colored home-made candles that looked like a square block of Swiss cheese.

I note the candles in particular. The process of making them intrigued me. You melted plain colorless wax together with several crayons of the color you wished to portray, then poured the liquefied mixture into a topless milk carton filled with ice surrounded by a real candle (preferably one of the same color as the wax you just made). When the molten wax returned to solid form and the ice melted, you stripped away the old milk carton and – voila! – you had yourself a Christmas candle. They looked so cool as they burned, especially if the inner candle was able to burn down without melting all surrounding wax. In this way the light would then shine through the holes where once solid ice sat. It didn't take much

imagination to picture that candle as that warm house you would often see on that classic Christmas postcard. That the whole family watch these candles burn felt like we were all snuggling up together in a comfortable blanket.

But these fine memories also include inner directed experiences. There's one that stays with me more and continues to grow stronger every year. I don't know why, it just does. I'm lying on my side, the cold linoleum kitchen floor beneath me. Directly in front of me is my N-gauge train. It's a circular track about twelve inches in diameter. Lap after lap the four finger-long cars repeat. There's a slight oily smell from the grinding gears of the diminutive E-8 diesel locomotive. I'm in my pajamas, and I could sense the sub-zero temperatures outside our small raised ranch. I don't fret. I just watch the tiny train go round and round. Elsewhere the rest of the family busy themselves in their own private activities. We are each unto our solitary selves, yet we are unto our solitary selves together. And that gives me that inner smile I spoke of.

It is this same feeling that becomes magnified on Christmas Eve. We'd normally travel to my grandparents' home, where all my mother's siblings would gather. My

other grandparents came, too. The evening was filled with food and games and watching *It's a Wonderful Life* on the television. There were too many people for us to do everything all together. In fact, there were too many people for us to do anything all together. Even the meal consisted of multiple gatherings at multiple tables. Yes, we had the proverbial "kids' table" and yes I was assigned to that table long after I thought it appropriate.

That assignment didn't matter. What matters are, although spread through the house in several separate groups, we were all together. We were experiencing Christmas as a family. Each doing our own separate things, but doing our own separate things together.

And that's the memory from this season that creates the greatest inner smile. Sure it's a memory seen through a soft lens, with all those contemporary anxieties stripped out (why make them part of the memory when, however important they seemed at the time, everything turned out all right).

So I remember the feeling and embrace the memory, and do everything possible to ensure my own children have the chance to store similar memories for later use in their own futures.

I wish you all a Christmas full of memories and may you all be blessed with a wonderful New Year!

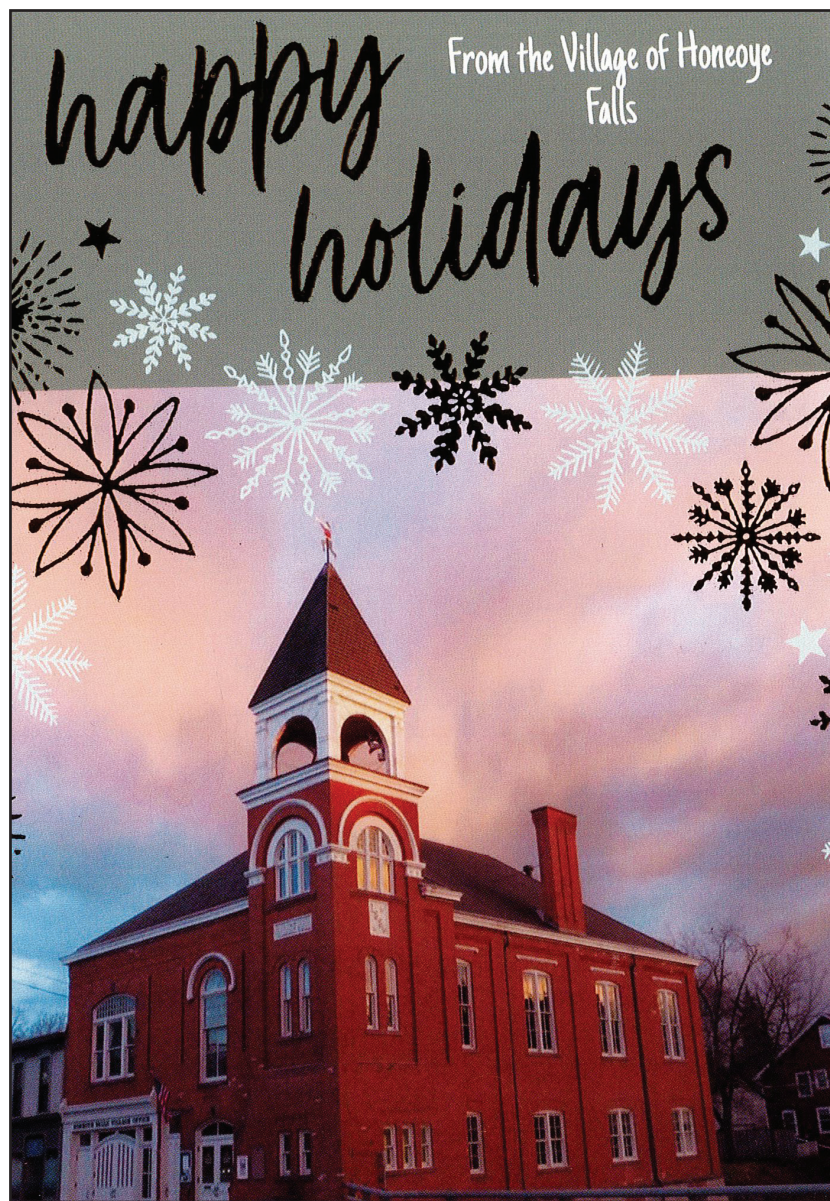

The Santa Train (continued)

Over the first several years of the Appalachian *Santa Train*, a chuffing *Clinchfield Railroad* steam engine earnestly traversed the circuitous 100+ mile route. Likely manned by a solitary Santa, together with assistance from an elf or two, gifts were dropped on the fly to kids scrambling below.

It began as a holiday act of charity, to bring delight to a region rife with isolation and destitution. “Appalachia,” is synonymous with mineral wealth, where a few were enriched, while the majority was bedeviled by chronic poverty and debilitating health issues. Change has been erratic and slow.

As *Santa Train* grew increasingly longer, its reputation spread beyond the region. A tidal wave of donated gifts poured in, volunteer manpower increased several fold and, in 2022, the run to Kingsport approached nine hours.

A surefire plan for orderliness, similar to meeting a department store Santa, was instituted. Only scheduled stops allowed for interacting with popular culture’s icon of Christmas. As safety protocol disdained tossing items (i.e. candy, stuffed animals, Christmas wrapping paper... lots of wrapping paper) from the moving train, original plans were quickly overwhelmed.

Each *Santa Train* experience by this observer indicates ever-changing strategies for crowd control and, most importantly, getting gifts into the hands of the neediest children. Simple mid-century logic led to children... 1) queuing patiently... 2) connecting with the jolly personage face-to-beard... 3) thrilling from lap time and a cheerful word... 4) and departing with a gift (perhaps their only Christmas present of the season).

Fortunately, other than sluggish highway traffic and parking congestion all along the route, one human element was not much of a bother... at least in fleeing the action to chase the train further down the line. Whether for profit or pleasure, their eye candy was savored in photographs and videos. They are collectively known as “railroad fans”... “railfans” for short.

Unique unto themselves, everywhere *Santa Train* rolled, the crowds became larger, especially in the number of *railfans*, who appeared trackside, mostly at the head-end of the train... which lingered for a half-hour or so at each stop to (or have we forgotten) distribute gifts to wide-eyed children.

Armed to the teeth with the world’s finest photo and recording equipment, they made this guy, operating with a simple digital Nikon, a walking-talking anachronism. Sure, the casual observer may peg the writer as a *railfan*, though his little camera is hardly a ticket into the club.

Those bad boys (and girls) were there for #1, the motive power, and #2, the rolling stock – not to wave to Santa or grab free stuff. Frankly, the human element seemed a pesky aggravation to most of those folk. And, not too long ago, the man-made dragonflies known as “drones” appeared. Surely many a photographer has had to edit those hovering, buzzing little devils out of their own work.

Undaunted and hoping to stay out of the way of kids, many saddled to helicopter parents, Stew Mulligan scouted the route the previous day and chose Dante, Virginia (locally pronounced “D’aint” or “ant” with a D) as his observation point. Once a robust coal camp, the epicenter of “*Clinchfield Coal Company*,” the community is a shadow of its former self. Its essential element, an artistic prop for *Santa Train* viewing, was Dante’s derelict railroad station.

When “we” first met ten years ago, the former passenger/freight depot of the *Clinchfield Railroad* (now *CSX Transportation*) was a solid brick building, but shabby and utterly forlorn. Every window was broken out, every door ravaged. Even the former waiting rooms of the *Jim Crow* era, shown as “*White*” and “*Colored*” on architectural drawings, were indistinguishable from one another. (Embodied by the motto “*separate but equal*,” *Jim Crow* is one institution that needn’t come back.)

There were many places to choose from, since, except for management and absentee operators, the coal industry has not been a panacea to the folks of Appalachia. The number of trackside enclaves littered with vacant homes, businesses and lots is high. Naturally, unemployment is too, thanks to advanced mechanization in the shafts and surface mining monstrosities under the throttle of one hand... and environmental concerns.

In fact, the *Clinchfield Railroad*, route of the *Santa Train*, carried off much of the bounty. It is too bad the anti-fracking lobby wasn’t around to protect the people of this downtrodden region. For decades, long before “*fracking*” became a thing, unsophisticated mountain folk paid the price for being duped out of timber and mineral rights. A landowner’s simple “X” often resulted in old growth forests and mountaintops of the Cumberland Plateau being ravaged for its natural treasures.

Downslope, many families were driven from the hollows by tainted drinking water, rampant erosion and flash-flooding. The likes of Harry Caudill, Wendell Berry and Maria Gunnoe sounded the alarm, but their words were lost in the fog of big business and political puppeteering. The stories from such old folk as Verna Mae Sloan, “*The Sage of Pippa Passes*” (1914-2009), describe an irretrievable past. More Verna Maes were needed.

Only in recent times have enough people in positions of power listened to the voices of foresight. Decades ago, under immense pressure, a Letcher County (KY) man named Lilley Cornett (1888-1958) refused to sell away his timber rights to coal interests. Today, this property (“*Lilley Cornett Woods*”) is prized as one of the few old-growth forests left in the country.

Conversely, the landscape is far from ameliorated, when coal-fired public relations campaigns, under the guise of “*land reclamation*,” leave vast portions of the region under gravelly surfaces hardly fitting for a scrubby bush. Paradoxically, while immense tracts of the mountains seem less hospitable to humans, over the past two decades the majestic elk has been reintroduced with stunning success.

A typical company town, founded by the *Clinchfield Coal Company*, Dante, Virginia’s former population of 4,000 has dwindled to just a few hundred. Its business district, as the writer found it in 2012, was literally the post office, a museum in the former bank, and a soda pop vending machine... in 2022, there are two vending machines.

Placed next to the fire hall, just above the remnants of downtown, were three coal-black granite slabs comprising the “*Dante Coal Miners Memorial*.” Over 400 names are carved into those stones, three dozen of which have a star *, meaning “*killed in the mines*.” In an obscure spot that few passersby would see, the memorial was moved down to the community park opposite the post office, where the crowds gather for *Santa Train*.

The bank, a handsome one, was closed forever in 1931 by effects of the Great Depression. Formerly repurposed as a beer garden, a teen center and then an auto repair shop, the building was saved and remodeled in 2003 by “*Dante Lives On*,” a grassroots citizens’ group. The jewel of the community, it survives as the “*Dante Coal and Railroad Museum*.”

Operated by geriatric volunteers refusing to let their hometown turn to rubble, they labor to make Dante a worthwhile stop on *Santa Train Day*. Most celebrations, like homecoming reunions, are modestly attended – except for this

day, when, for an hour or so, the town swells to many times its size. (Sage advice to see *Santa Train* on the Saturday before every Thanksgiving... show up about 9 a.m., park most anywhere – show up at 10 a.m., prepare for a long walk – show up at 11 a.m., park most anywhere... but you missed *Santa Train*!)

Utilizing the park’s rudimentary concert stage (a stone’s throw from the railroad tracks), the ladies sell baked goods, coffee and commemoratives, with every dollar going toward keeping afloat “Dante Lives On” and its museum. Plans have been afoot to turn the bank vault into a replica coal mine entrance.

(Years after Stew’s first visit, however, there’s still no entrance, but “Portal 31 Coal Mine Tours” can be had just over the Kentucky state line in Lynch... sixty, albeit very mountainous miles away. The writer’s grandson purely loved it.)

Reduced to a scant population, Dante hasn’t been able to go it alone. In 2013, upon arriving the previous day, I assisted a couple from Canada (her grandfather was a native) setting up lights and decorations around the open-air stage. A grandfather from Massachusetts quipped he’d brought three generations down to experience the joy about to roll through his distant relative’s hometown. The next morning, there he was, purchasing several “Dante Lives On” sweatshirts.

The museum houses a superb 8’x10’ HO-scale model of Dante in its heyday. It literally appeared one morning. A stranger, relying on website photos, devoted untold hours and expense to erect and donate the replica... just because he was intrigued by the layout and lore of the gritty community. Several years hence, the docents say he has not reappeared.

If slightly larger, the model would show a baseball diamond, hard-by Bear Wallow Mountain... and still the site of ballgames. That’s where Dante’s primary team, displaying “Clinchfield” across their chests, played for pride and glory in the “Coalfield League” against other mining towns... some, like Harry Perkowski, who stifled Rochester’s “Red Wings” a time or two, even made the big leagues.

HF-M Historical Society meeting to focus on architecture

The January 5th meeting of the Honeoye Falls - Mendon Historical Society will feature Christopher Brandt and Katie Eggers Comeau. The topic of their talk is the Architecture of James H. Johnson.

James H. Johnson, Rochester’s most imaginative mid-20th century architect, is best known for his “Mushroom House”. Over the course of his nearly 60-year career in Rochester, he designed over 400 projects, but only a few received public acclaim. Sponsored by the Greece Historical Society after the loss of an important but previously little-known building in Greece, the team of Brandt and Comeau spent a year and a half reviewing original drawings, interviewing colleagues, sorting through original slides and clippings and visiting strange and marvelous buildings to develop a fuller picture of this stunning and largely unknown body of work. This talk features original photographs and videos from Johnson’s personal collection that will take you inside some of Rochester’s most daring and adventurous buildings.

Christopher Brandt is a project Architect at Berio Architecture - a firm with a legacy of historic preservation practice. He was born and raised in the Rochester region and has been active in its historic preservation community since high school. After completing his college and graduate education in architecture and historic preservation in 2013, Chris began working at Bero Architecture as an Architectural Associate, achieving his professional license in 2018. Outside his day job restoring and adapting old buildings, he serves as Chair of the Irondequoit Historic Preservation Commission and as Advance Education Coordinator of the Young Urban Preservationists. He researches local history with a specific focus on past architects / designers of Rochester and is restoring the small historic home he shares with his wife.

Katie Eggers Comeau is a Rochester native who has worked in the historic preservation field for over two decades, starting with a three-year stint as a preservation consulting firm in Washington, DC. In 2001, she moved back to upstate New York to take a job with the Landmark Society of Western New York where she spent nine years advocating for the historic buildings, landscapes and communities of the Finger Lakes area. From 2010 - 2021, she was the Architectural Historian at Bero Architecture, where some of her favorite projects involved the works of architect James Johnson and Thomas Boyde, Jr. as well as many other projects documenting historic resources in the Rochester area and beyond. She is currently Vice-President for Policy and Preservation at the Preservation League of New York State, a non-profit organization whose programs and initiatives help New Yorkers throughout the state

protect their heritage and strengthen sustainable historic communities.

Brighton/HF-L hockey splits week

The Brighton/Honeoye Falls-Lima Varsity Ice Hockey team snapped a three-game losing streak with a victory in its second game last week.

Brighton/HF-L began the week with a 4-3 setback to Spartan Hockey (a combined team from Gates Chili, Rush-Henrietta, Wayne, Wheatland-Chili and one student from Eastridge) on December 13. HF-L senior Trevor Reese scored the only goal of the first period, assisted by HF-L senior Braydn Trybuskiewicz and Brighton junior Shawn Oelheim. Spartan Hockey netted two goals seven seconds apart in the second period to jump ahead 2-1. "I felt we were the better team, but we had some breakdowns that have been plaguing us," coach Brendon Rothfuss said. "We outshot them 33-16, but couldn't get the puck in the net."

The Bruins snapped the skid with a 4-2 victory over Webster Thomas on December 17. A goal by Reese (Nolan Gangarosa assist) and a power play goal by HF-L sophomore Emmet Landt (HF-L sophomore Matthew Brassie and Burslem assists) after a penalty for boarding and unsportsmanlike conduct powered the Bruins to a 2-0 lead just seven minutes into the game. Webster Thomas tallied a goal to make it 2-1 by the end of the first period. The Titans scored the only goal of the second period to tie the game at 2-2. Trybuskiewicz's unassisted goal on the power play after a hooking penalty broke the tie and Landt sealed the game off an assist from Trybuskiewicz. Hurwitz stopped 12 shots.

"We outshot them 22-14 and we had a good start," Rothfuss said. "We focused on our power play the last few practices and that had results with two power play goals against Webster."

Brighton/HF-L played Greece Storm on December 20 and hosts West Seneca West December 29 and Sweet Home December 30.

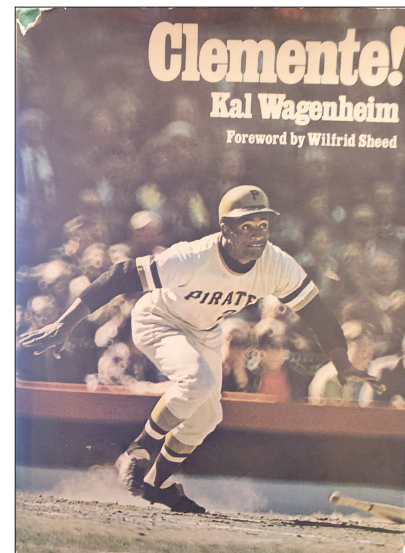

Clare Ruff poured in 17 points with four assists, three rebounds and

December 31, 2022 will mark 50 years since the death of one of the greatest ballplayers to ever play the game of baseball but even more importantly a great humanitarian. That baseball player and that humanitarian was Roberto Clemente.

Clemente was my hero when I was growing up (I was almost 10 years old when he died). He was my favorite player on my favorite sports team: the Pittsburgh Pirates because of the passionate way he played – in today's lingo "He was all in", but also for the man he was off the field. This native of Carolina, Puerto Rico was already a superstar when I was born. He had been signed by Branch Rickey for the Brooklyn Dodgers, who saw him during the Puerto Rico Winter League in the winter of 1953. He played one season (1954) for the Dodgers' International League farm team in Montreal, but the Dodgers lost him due to the bonus rule in effect at the time that stated that any player who received a bonus higher than \$4,000 and was not on the major league club's twenty-five man roster was subject to being drafted by another club, the first choice going to the club that finished last in the league the previous year. That club would be Pittsburgh whose general manager was Rickey who had moved from the Dodgers organization. Clemente got his first big league hit on April 17, 1955. The right fielder scored his first big-league run shortly thereafter when a teammate hit a triple. His first three seasons, Pittsburgh finished last, seventh and seventh in the league but the club had budding young talent just like Clemente. The Pirates finished second in 1958 and fourth in 1959. Pittsburgh won the National League pennant in 1960 and faced the Yankees, who had stars galore like Mickey Mantle, Roger Maris and Elston Howard. Nonetheless, Pittsburgh won the first game of the World Series 6-4. The Yankees took game two in a 16-3 rout and then game three 10-0. Pittsburgh managed to capture games 4 (3-2) and 5 (5-2). The Yankees won game 6 by a 12-0 margin to set up the climatic game 7. The Pirates took a 2-0 lead in the first, adding two in the third. The Yankees would score a run in the fourth, four in the sixth and two in the eighth for a 7-4 lead. Pittsburgh pulled within 7-5, but with two outs and two runners on base, Clemente came up to bat and topped the ball dribbling it weakly toward first base. While most thought it was the third out, Clemente ran so hard to first base that he beat the pitcher to the base and the first baseman had no play. The Pirates scored a second run on the play to pull within 7-6. The next batter belted a three-run home run to give the Pirates a 9-7 lead. The Yankees tied the score 9-9 in the top of the ninth, but Bill Mazeroski who led off the bottom of the inning ripped the second pitch over the left field wall. In that Series, Clemente had nine hits, batting .310, with three runs batted in and a run scored. He won the National League batting title in 1961, 1964, 1965 and 1967 and won Golden Gloves for fielding excellence for 12 seasons (1961-72).

In 1971, I watched as the Pirates again advanced to the World Series, this time against American League champ Baltimore. Once again, Pittsburgh was a huge underdog and lost the first game 5-3 and the second 11-3. The Pirates won games 3 (5-1), 4 (4-3) and 5 (4-0). The Pirates lost game 6 by 3-2 in 10 innings. Pittsburgh won game 7 by a 2-1 margin with Clemente hitting a home run for the Pirates' first run. The 1971 World Series was Clemente's Tour de Force: he hit .414 with 12 hits, including two homers, two doubles and a triple and tied the world record by hitting safely in all 14 games of the 1960 and 1971 World Series. He won the MVP award for the Series. In his final season, 1972, he connected for his 3,000th hit on September 30 in the final game of the regular season and hit .312 that year when the Pirates lost to Cincinnati in the National League championship.

Off the field, Clemente was compassionate, according to the book *Clemente!* by Kal Wagenheim published in June 1973. He sometimes spent afternoons with the children at Children's Hospital in Pittsburgh. He once gave a ball to a young fan in the stands after an older man had grabbed a previous foul ball away from the youngster. By far, though his most compassionate act was his last. On December 23, 1972 a devastating earthquake struck Nicaragua and killed 6,000 in Managua. Clemente and others from Puerto Rico formed a relief drive. Three flights with relief supplies were sent to Nicaragua, but their distribution by the Nicaraguan national guard was spotty. The last and fourth flight of supplies was to be sent on a cargo plane on December 31 and Clemente decided to be on it to make sure the supplies reached those most in need. There were mechanical problems that delayed the plane's departure but it finally got into the air at 9:22 p.m. from San Juan airport. Moments later the plane crashed into the Atlantic Ocean. Clemente and the other four people aboard died; his body was never found.

Weeks after his death, Clemente was the first Latin American to enter the Baseball Hall of Fame after the Baseball Writers Association voted to waive the rule that a candidate must be retired from the game for five years before he is eligible. He was elected on March 20 and was formally enshrined on August 6, 1973.

I remember New Year's Day in 1973 and hearing the news of Clemente's death in the plane crash and I just cried, not for the loss of him as my favorite baseball player but for the loss of him as a humanitarian and the selfless act that ultimately cost him his life. He gave all that he had to give, on and off the field.

LCS girls capture three wins to open season

With eight returning players from the squad that posted a 6-10 record last year before falling in the Section V Class D2 Tournament quarterfinal round, the Lima Christian Girls Varsity Basketball team has experience even though it is a young team with no seniors and just two juniors.

Coach Val Coykendall welcomed back juniors Abigail Britton and Lillian Herring, sophomores Lily Swan and Jordyn Warsaw, freshmen Sophia Britton, Brielle Hammond and Genesis Leathersich and eighth-grader Alyssa Marsh. A pair of eighth-graders, Abby Dils and Rachel Negbegble will join the squad in January once the modified club's season is done. Abigail Britton and Herring are the team captains.

Marsh and Herring were the team's top scorers a year ago at 22.4 points per game and 12.8 points a game. Leathersich averaged 2.3 points a game and Abigail Britton 1.8 points a game. The Lady Saints led 12-6 after the first quarter. While the team kept pressing and trapping in the second quarter, the shots weren't falling as easily. LCS

led 19-11 at halftime. Lima's offense ignited in the third period with both Abigail Britton and Swan dropping in six points apiece during the club's 20-8 run over the quarter. Lima slowed its scoring in the third period with just eight points for a 34-10 lead. Marsh tallied 19 points, Hammond 9, Herring 3, Swan 2, Warsaw 2 and Abigail Britton 1.

"Brielle's nine points was a personal high," Coykendall said. "Franklin is new at the varsity level this year and has a couple of promising players but they are still learning. We were able to slow down and see the shot options available, instead of making just one or two passes and shooting. We are getting a variety of contributors and I feel good about where we are at."

LCS played Rochester Prep on Dec. 19 and then is off until January 3.

"Our pumper 563 was responding to an MVA on Clover Street, near Stony Lonesome or out near Mendon Ponds, and on the way down Davis Hill, as we call it, the big hill coming out of the Village and into the Town and heading up north on Clover Street. Our driver was going down the hill, and of the sudden he reported to his crew that he had lost control."

"The roads were in real perilous condition for everybody. I know the Town crews and the Village crews had been out doing everything they could to keep it up. But you know the weather was changing so fast from rain to sleet to snow, back to rain. It was just treacherous driving, which is obviously why we had so many accidents."

"As the truck was coming down Davis Hill, the driver reported he had lost control. We were really lucky. He maintained his composure. He rode it out as best he could. The truck started going off the road and it was buried in a field off Clover Street. It went through a ditch. How that truck didn't roll, I don't know."

"Thanks to the Town of Mendon crews again on Friday, as well as the Honeoye Falls DPW Staff. They had to come in and cut down a whole lot of trees and brush off of 65, so the heavy one-ton truck could come in and hook into the truck. They were afraid if they tried to hook it out from the back end, they'd rip out the axle and everything else. So, they had to come at it from the front end. Obviously, our crews had to go in there and empty all the water out of the tank. It was really quite a production, but they did get it out."

They had to put it on a flatbed and take it to a special frame repair shop to give it a good look at."

"You know, it's close to a half-million dollar piece of equipment, right? And even though it's a few years old, we worry about that expense. But at the end of the day, that's nothing when you look at our crews. Everybody was okay. Nobody was injured. The driver did a heck of a job. We got lucky. Again, thanks to John and his staff for everything they did."

"It's just always a tough situation, and we're going through so many things right now, with all of our volunteer services. It's tough to get people to step up. And John's got a great committee going right now looking at fire service in the community overall. We struggle with the lack of volunteers, and we are just so blessed to have the ones that we do. So, kudos to the crew."

"We're looking forward to Christmas. I know we won't have this call next week. We hope everyone has a great Christmas holiday. We have the Hanukkah celebration this coming Wednesday on the 21st at 5:30 PM where we'll have the menorah lit. We're looking forward to that."

"With the county, this week was a very busy week. We did indeed pass the budget with a unanimous vote. I think it's important to say that wasn't after a lot of dialogue, a lot of discussions, a lot of questions when you're talking about a budget that's over a 1 billion dollars. There's a lot of questions to ask, and the Legislature has to be the stewards of the funding and the financing, and where the money goes."

"Along with that, we passed the ARPA funding this week. There were some things in the media that said the Legislature was holding up the ARPA funding. That really couldn't have been any further from the truth. The Legislature was doing its job, while there was a committee that went through all the projects and scored the projects, and then had their recommendations for what projects should be funded in this first round."

"It's truly up to the Legislature to look at all those and make sure that it makes sense, and make sure that the money is being given out and spent properly. None of the contracts could be approved before the first of the year. Actually, we approved this ARPA spending in plenty of time. But we're talking again about over 99 million dollars that's going out. So, the Legislature did its job. We worked hard. We looked at all the projects and reviewed them."

"I think the administration did a good job as well, but we have to do our jobs and make sure that we can answer to the people that elect us and make sure that we did our due diligence, and I think we did so. We're proud of that and we're now getting into the next year."

"Again, I just hope everybody has a great holiday season, and I thank you, the SENTINEL, for setting these calls up. I know our residents really love it. So, thank you very much, and happy holidays to everybody."

Town of Mendon

John Moffitt, Supervisor:

"I want to reiterate some things Mayor Milne mentioned. We do want to wish everybody a very Merry Christmas and happy holidays for whatever season you choose to celebrate. We're hoping that people get together with their families and enjoy this time. During Covid, we certainly saw times when we weren't able to get together in situations like this, so I hope all of our residents have an opportunity to spend time with family and friends."

"I would like to talk today about one before I get into the main subject. I just want to report that the streetlight at the Mendon Community Center has been fixed. It was quite a buzz, I guess, on social media, and it was flashing, and of course it was flashing off the white building. It has been fixed. It took a little time, but it has been fixed, so I appreciate everybody giving us a heads up on that one."

"What I wanted to really talk about today was the Mendon Highway Department. We have an elected Highway Superintendent. All towns do not necessarily have one. Our Highway Superintendent, Andrew Caschetta, is elected. There is a difference between an appointed and elected highway superintendent."

"We currently cover 217 lane miles. That is on town roads, state roads, and county roads. Some of those county and town roads are within the village of Honeoye Falls, and the Town of Mendon maintains those as far as salting, plowing that type of thing."

"We use an average of 4,000 tons of salt. When you go to wash your car, and you start seeing rust and things like that, that's not your favorite thing to see that we use that much salt, but also when we have an event like Rick mentioned on Thursday, where we have freezing rain and ice and raining conditions and snow all at the same small time period. We certainly need that salt for that type of activity."

"There's 4.6 miles of snow fence that are put up alongside the road to help deter the snow from filling in the road in various places where the wind can blow. Also, we have dispatchers that are at 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Those dispatchers call out not only the Town snowplow drivers, but the Village of Honeoye Falls plow drivers as well. They also monitor the roads 24/7, monitor the weather, they're out looking for, in windy situations, for down wires, down trees, dead deer that have been hit by cars, that type of thing, and that their pay is subsidized by both the State and Monroe County."

"Also, I wanted to mention that if you are cleaning out your own personal driveway, do not push or plow snow out into the road that is against the law. So please don't do that. You're creating a hazardous situation on the roads. If you have a fire hydrant on your prop-

erty, please clear that fire hydrant. Make it accessible. We've had a couple of fires here recently within the Town. We don't want any more, and we certainly don't want our firefighters trying to find a hydrant underneath a pile of snow."

"We do have in the Town of Mendon some limited sidewalks in the hamlet. That's one of the things we're looking at for 2023 is extending sidewalks, but we do not salt those sidewalks. We do plow them. I just want to make sure that everyone is aware of those things. If you have any questions, call the Highway Department. They'd be more than happy to answer any of your questions, and of course, with this latest snowfall—and it was what it was heavy—even though the plow might not take out your mailbox, the wet, heavy slush snow may take out your mailbox. So if your mailbox was taken down due to a snow event, the Town offers you either \$35, or we will come out and fix and or replace your mailbox. You do have to contact the highway department for that, and we certainly are more than willing to help repair any mailboxes that are damaged during snow activities."

"One last thing, and probably the most important thing I'm going to talk about regarding this subject today, is children playing in the snow. We have a lot of cul de sacs in Town. It is very appealing for kids to go out and dig into this big pile of snow in the middle of the cul de sac and play there. Please do not allow your children to do that. They can be a very dangerous situation upon another snowfall."

"Certainly, children love to go out and play in the snow. We're not trying to say they shouldn't, but not within the frame of the road they need to, keep, stay in their yard, stay back away from the edge of the road because a lot of times that wing is pushing snow back from the edge of the road. So, we certainly want them to go out and have a good time, but be aware of that, and we want to eliminate those dangerous situations."

"Mendon Town Hall will be open Friday, December 30th from 8AM to 1PM and Monday, January 2nd from 8AM to 4PM for County/Town tax payments."

Mike Falk, Supervisor:

"A Merry Christmas, and Happy Holidays to all! Now is the time for parties of all kinds to celebrate. So, the New York State Police, of course, have declared that it is a DWI concentration from now, right until the New Year over the first of January. Please be careful when you are out enjoying the holiday season."

"Along with that, there's a different kind of party we should discuss. At the New York State level, they have moved to strike the words 'Independent' and 'Independence' from all of the New York State ballots going forward."

"There is a lot of confusion about the Independence party and the folks who have wanted to be politically independent when they have registered, but many have mistakenly registered with the Independence party. To be truly independent, you actually have to register as a blank. If you have any questions about that, or you're not sure how you registered, your County Board of Elections can answer your questions and if you need to change your registration or fix that up, they can help you with that, too."

"Trihalomethane is something that is on the minds of everybody who operates a water district. Those THM Levels, depending on how high they are, dictate how often lines are flushed. If you are flushing the lines on a regular schedule without testing the THMs, you may not be doing it often enough or you may be doing it way too often."

"The only way to know is to actually test. The Livingston County Water and Sewer Authority, in partnership with Livingston County, is purchasing a THM Analyzer. This science, and this is incredibly cool, and it's about the size of a laser printer, but they can know now, within 30 minutes, what the THM Levels are around the systems. Because it is going to be a bit of a shared asset, it will be opened up to the surrounding municipalities to take advantage of quick testing normally to get your THM stuff tested—50 bucks to throw, and 2 or 3 weeks to get your results back, or you're paying 2 or 3 times as much to get a much faster test. This would help everybody in the area, and I do not know that it will be limited to just Livingston County. So that's something to look forward to."

"Otherwise, Merry Christmas, and we will talk next year."

WHAT'S IN A NAME? ~ HOME FOR THE HOLIDAYS

This is actually the conclusion of a series that we started during Christmas 2021. It's also a product of our third book which came out last year and was called *What's in a Name? ~ Our Geography Hall of Fame*. To sum it up in one sentence, we have scoured the planet looking for places with bizarre and intriguing names and applied our irreverent and sardonic style to share the stories behind those names. This week we're going to head home for the holidays.

In our complete review of this topic, we mentioned that in the United States, towns with Christmas-themed names break down as follows. We have three "Santa Clauses", two "North Poles" and one "Christmas." Below is our limerick...

*On the rooftop sometimes Santa pauses
Naming places with holiday causes
Our one "Christmas" extols
There are two "North Poles"
And then alas three "Santa Clauses"*

The three components that we completely saved for this year are North Pole, Alaska; Santa Claus, Georgia; and Christmas Pie which is in England. In case your *Sentinel* subscription began in the past year here's a recap of the holiday hijinks we covered in 2021.

CHRISTMAS, FLORIDA ~ This town celebrates year-round and has the largest alligator in the world. It's a 200-foot building shaped in the form of a gator which houses a tropical zoo.

NORTH POLE, NEW YORK ~ This is the longest continuously operational theme park in the country. Located in the Adirondacks, we both went there as kids.

SANTA CLAUS, INDIANA ~ Of the three towns in the United States with this moniker, Santa Claus, Indiana rises to the top of the chimney as the only one to have an official post office bearing the jolly name. Furthermore, the USPS has gone on record as saying that no other community will ever be allowed to use the name of "Santa Claus."

SANTA CLAUS, ARIZONA ~ You'll find no shortage of ghost towns along Route 66, but one of the strangest by far has to be the abandoned town of Santa Claus, Arizona. Once a bustling, year-round holiday-themed stop for road-tripping motorists, its glory days are long past. Sadly, and ironically, the rattlesnakes now outnumber the reindeer in the ramshackle ruins remaining here. This one got to us a little bit and we tell the complete story in our book.

SANTA CLAUS, GEORGIA

Located halfway between Macon and Savannah, Santa Claus is a small town of 165 people in southeast Georgia. All of the streets have Christmas-theme names like Candy Cane Road, Rudolph Way, and Sleigh Street.

The name Santa Claus was a 1930's brainstorm of a local entrepreneur, C.G. Greene, whose goal it was to lure travelers off the highway to visit his pecan stand and adjacent motel. At the time, the town sat right on U.S. 1, and there was a hope the small community could turn itself into some kind of a tourist attraction. Then the interstates came. Interstate 75 to the west and 95 to the east were too far away for Santa Claus to become a viable tourist attraction.

But that didn't put a dent in the residents' holiday spirit. When they built their new Town Hall, it went up at

25 December Drive. In 2014, residents built a 40-seat chapel surrounded by a prayer garden. At Christmastime, when it is decorated with red bows and holly, the quaint little chapel makes the perfect photo op. The Santa Claus Chapel is located at 15 Holly Street.

While Santa Claus, Indiana, may be more famous, Santa Claus, Georgia, has plenty of holiday spirit. The town adopted the motto, "Santa Claus... The City That Loves Children" and put it on a sign that welcomes people to town, while simultaneously providing yet another photo op. If you live in Georgia and are looking for a location for that perfect picture for your family Christmas card, Santa Claus should be in your future.

NORTH POLE, ALASKA

Officially a "city" of just under 2,000 people, North Pole is located 13 miles southeast of Fairbanks and 1,700 miles south of the real deal. The real North Pole that is. It does qualify as somewhat of a modern-day success story. In 1944 the entire area was nothing but a marsh, covered with scrub trees and brush with nary a manmade structure in sight. Here's the story of how this Christmas village emerged from nothingness.

In 1891 Congress enacted legislation for town sites to be laid out in Alaska under regulations specified by the Secretary of the Interior. At that point the land that would become North Pole was officially for sale. While the territory featured a wildlife menagerie including moose, deer, foxes, wolves, beavers and snowshoe rabbits; potential buyers were not forming a line. As a matter of fact, it would take over half a century to consummate a sale.

On April 7, 1944, Bob & Bernice Davis arrived in Fairbanks and drove into the countryside looking for a spot where they could live off the land. They found an available parcel at what would one day become North Pole. Little did they dream that their undistinguished 160 acres of scrub trees and brush would ever be more than just a homestead, much less that it would one day be called a city, let alone a city called North Pole.

The Davises gradually began to sell off pieces of their property to others interested in setting up stakes in this rural area outside of Fairbanks. In 1949, the National Board of Geographic Names assigned the name "Davis" to the parcel, attributing it to the couple that had purchased the land. In 1951, when it was determined that electricity would be installed, the value of the property increased significantly.

NEW NAME INITIATIVE ~ In February of 1952 the Dahl and Gaske Development Company bought all

of the remaining land available. The company thought that if the growing settlement was named North Pole, it might be able to attract business. They reasoned that some toy manufacturer might be induced to locate a factory there so their products could be advertised as being literally "made at North Pole." Another thought was that someone might start a Santa Land that could become a northern version of Disneyland which was under construction in California at the time.

The company approached Bob Davis to ask him about changing the name of the parcel from "Davis" to "North Pole." Davis thought that the idea was far-fetched but acceded to their request and the legal process was initiated to change the name. On January 15, 1953 a decree was issued making North Pole the official name of the community.

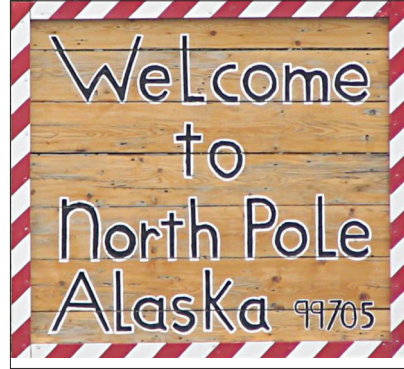
Nothing materialized in terms of the toy factory or theme park, but North Pole continued to grow and there was an ongoing interest in developing North Pole as a theme city, "where the spirit of Christmas lives year-round." Today, many streets within North Pole bear holiday names such as Kris Kringle St. and Mistletoe St., and there's also Santa Claus Lane, Snowman Lane, Holiday Road and Saint Nicholas Drive. Street lights are decorated in candy cane motifs and many buildings are painted with Christmas colors and designs.

ANNUAL FESTIVITIES ~ Each year the North Pole community starts the holiday season with a Winter Festival including fireworks, a candle lighting ceremony, an ice-carving festival and a community tree lighting in December. The Santa Claus House, the "official" home of Santa Claus, greets all visitors who pass through the city on the Richardson Highway.

The Santa Claus House is North Pole's biggest attraction. It's a modern-day incarnation of a trading post (gift shop) established in the town's early days. Made of fiberglass, and standing outside the establishment, is the world's largest statue of Santa Claus, standing nearly 50-foot tall. Live reindeer and an opportunity for a photograph with Santa Claus are available year-round.

The city's firetrucks and ambulances are all red, while the police cars are green and white. The city also has an all-female flat-track Roller Derby league, the North Pole Babes in Toyland whose athletes have Christmas and North Pole-inspired skater names.

Prior to Christmas each year, the USPS post office in North Pole receives hundreds of thousands of letters to Santa Claus, and thousands more from people wanting the town's postmark on their Christmas greeting cards to their families. It advertises

the ZIP code 99705 as the ZIP code of Santa. A community program also responds to letters addressed to 1 Santa Claus Lane. There truly is no place like North Pole.

CHRISTMAS PIE, ENGLAND

This tasty hamlet is located in southeast England and is home for a few hundred. In the 17th century most of the land in town was owned

by two families bearing the somewhat unusual surnames of Christmas and Pie. When the two families merged their farmland to form a larger more efficient operation, the two last names coalesced and the community became known as Christmas Pie. We'd like a piece with whipped cream.
