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Three National Guardsmen Honored In Mendon Memorial

The Town of Mendon dedicated its "Dust Off" Military Memorial to three New York Army National Guard members on Sunday, June 11, during a moving ceremony.

Mendon resident Chief Warrant Officer 4 Christian Koch, Chief Warrant Officer 5 Steven Skoda and Chief Warrant Officer 2 Daniel Prial were killed when their Blackhawk UH-60 MEDEVAC helicopter crashed during a training mission on January 20, 2021 in a field on West Bloomfield Road. MEDEVAC is known by the radio callsign, DUSTOFF, and was first used in South Vietnam in 1963 because dust billowed up on takeoff

and landing, hence the phrase "Dust Off" in the memorial's name.

The town began making plans for a memorial to the fallen guardsmen later that year. A committee was formed and, with input from the Koch, Skoda and Prial families, a design and site were chosen for the memorial. Honeoye Falls' sculptor Mary Taylor made the sculpture of three life-sized snow geese in flight as a lasting tribute to the three pilots. She researched the symbolism of various bird species and discovered some Native American and Celtic traditions described the snow geese as strong, family-oriented, disciplined and tenacious, she selected those birds to symbolize the three men. To northern Native American tribes, the goose is symbolic of cooperation. In the Celtic tradition, the wild goose is a Christian symbol for the Holy Spirit, in addition to the dove.

The memorial is located on Semmel Road at Dreisbach Fields, which also has the recently-opened spray park in honor of Koch and some soccer fields. The site was chosen because it allows adults and children to learn about the men and their lives and

reflect together.

Mendon Town Supervisor John Moffitt welcomed a huge crowd of people gathered at the dedication ceremony. American Legion Falls Post #664 presented the Colors and the Gates Keystone Club Police Pipes and Drums played "The Army Goes Rolling Along". Honeoye Falls-Lima graduate Jonathan Stills sang the National Anthem, which was followed by the Gates Keystone Club playing Amazing Grace. After the introduction of elected officials, Adjutant New York Army National Guard Major General Ray Shields spoke. He was followed by Major Michael Jamieson, who spoke on behalf of the Skoda family, Susan Bock, who spoke on behalf of the Koch family and Greg Prial and Becky Prial-Fullam, who spoke for the Prial family.

American Legion Falls Post #664 gave a rifle salute and also played Taps. Colonel Douglas Brock, the New York National Guard State Chaplain gave the benediction.

The American Red Cross, Patriot Guard Riders and the Rochester Peacemakers Motorcycle Club also helped with the dedication ceremony.

Lima resident arrested on felony weapon charges

Livingston County Sheriff Thomas J. Dougherty reports the arrest of a Lima resident on felony weapon charges following an investigation by the Sheriff's Office.

On May 26th 2023, at about 8:00 pm, Livingston County Sheriff's Deputies responded to an address in the Village of Geneseo to speak with an individual about a separate incident that occurred earlier in the day in the Village of Lima.

During the investigation it was discovered that, 39 year old Jose E. Rivero of Lima was involved in an argument with a family member. During the argument, Rivero allegedly brandished a handgun and threatened to kill the victim. Members of the Patrol Division with the assistance of the Criminal Investigations Division later obtained a search warrant in regards to the investigation. That search warrant was later executed at Rivero's home, where he was found to be in possession of a loaded handgun which he did not have a license to possess.

Deputies then continued their investigation, and learned that the handgun was reported stolen out of Jacksonville Florida in 2014.

Rivero was arrested and charged with felony Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the Second Degree, felony Criminal Possession of a Firearm, felony Criminal Possession of Stolen Property in the Fourth Degree, Menacing in the Second Degree, and Harassment in the Second Degree.

Rivero was transported and turned over to Central Booking Deputies at the Livingston County Jail for processing and prearrestment detention. The District Attorney's Office was contacted in regards to bail due to the felony level charges, who recommended he be held on \$10,000 cash or \$50,000 bond.

Rivero was later arraigned at the Livingston County Centralized Arraignment Part (LC-CAP) at the Livingston County Jail before Justice Werth. The Judge did order that Rivero be held on \$2,000 cash or credit, or \$5,000 partially secured bond.

The Livingston County Public Defender's Office was present and represented Rivero at the court arraignment for his defense. The Livingston County District Attorney's Office was notified but did not appear to represent the people.

SMITHS' LISTS: 10 MOST DOGGONE DOG-LOVING COUNTRIES

Last week we doggedly started our countdown of the 10 most dog-loving countries in the world. These ratings are based upon statistics cited by *WellBeing International* indicating how many dogs were owned as pets for every 1,000 people. So far we have covered #10-Mexico, #9-Portugal, #8-Poland. This week we'll pick it up with #7.

#7 - Argentina - Edging out Poland for the #7 spot on our list is Argentina with 197 pet dogs per 1,000 residents. The country's best-known native breed, the Dogo Argentino are bred to hunt large animals such as wild boars and pumas. These are usually white and look like a Pit Bull with longer legs. However, in terms of national popularity, the Dogo Argentino runs behind some of the more traditional favorites. Argentina's most popular breeds are... 1) German Shepherds, 2) Labradors, and 3) Poodles.

#6 - Brazil - While Brazil is the largest country in South America, it will have to settle for second on the continent in the dog-loving contest. That being said, finishing #6 in the world in our international countdown is nothing to bark at. For every 1,000 people in Brazil there are 199 pet dogs.

If you were to visit the country for some of the iconic carnivals and beautiful beaches, expect to see an inordinate number of cute canines. In addition to the alliteration, "cute" is a particularly appropriate word to use because Brazil actually has the highest percentage of small dogs in the world, with 55% weighing less than 20 pounds. Why the preference for small dogs? Throwing another percentage figure at you, 87% of Brazilians live in cities where space is at a premium. Playing off a Brazilian soccer phrase, their hat trick of favorite breeds are... 1) Shih Tzus, 2) Chihuahuas, and 3)

Terriers.

#5 - Philippines - Please climb aboard for our only trip to Asia in this countdown of the Top 10 dog-loving countries in the world. A former U.S. possession, the Philippines, comes in at #5 as the first country to break the 20% barrier and register 200 pet dogs per 1,000 people. In honor of the Philippines #5 finish in our countdown we'll share with you that nation's top 5 favorite breeds of dogs. The final standings come in as 5) Poodles, 4) German Shepherds, 3) Chihuahuas, 2) Labradors, 1) Shih Tzus. Holy Shih, that's the second #1 finish for the Shih Tzus. If you recall from earlier in this column, that breed was also #1 in Brazil.

#4 - Romania - This country was the actual birthplace of Count Dracula, and it is still the actual home of the region of Transylvania, but don't be scared. Who could be afraid of the people who proudly assume the position of #4 in our countdown of the greatest dog-loving nations in the world with 206 pet dogs per 1,000 people? If you added the number of people and dogs that live in Romania you would get a total of about 24.5 million and the approximate breakdown would be 20 million people and 4.5 million pooches. More than half of Romanian households own a dog.

The Romanian Mioritic Shepherd is recognized by the American Kennel Club as a native breed. These dogs grow to around 125 pounds and are known to be reliable, loyal and fiercely protective. Another impressive historical breed, the Transylvanian Hound, is known for its hunting prowess which includes the pursuit of lynx, wolves and bears.

Ground Control To Commander Tom

You hear stories from older generations about having to “walk a mile back and forth to school each day... in a snowstorm... and it was uphill both ways!”

Well, truth be told, for my brother and me, it was just under a half mile each way. Four-tenths of a mile from our house at the end of the street (187 Abbott Parkway) all the way up to the school bus stop at the corner of South Park Ave, then a narrow two lanes.

Living in Blasdell meant we were in the crosshairs of the lake effect snow machine south of Buffalo, so you could bet your bottom dollar we often walked during snowstorms. And rainstorms. And thunderstorms. And thundersnow. And even hot (almost) summer days towards the end of the school year. Yeah, mom made sure we always dressed for the weather. So we learned from an early age to pay attention to the weather.

And, yes, sometimes Kenny and I felt like we were walking uphill both ways.

But walking up and down the street was like riding a commuter train. We “boarded” at the end of the line, but as we “rode” towards our destination, we “picked up” fellow travelers along the way. It didn’t take long for us to find other passengers, either, as our next-door neighbors immediately joined us on our journey.

Things really got hopping at the halfway point, when my best friend Angelo and his younger brother Markie would meet us for the rest of the commute. Their companionship made going to school a daily joy (and sometimes an adventure).

I’ve written about those adventures in these pages, both the amazing but true stories, (see the start of the trilogy “Terror At The School Bus Stop,” *Mendon-Honeoye Falls-Lima Sentinel*, January 11, 1990) and the harsh lessons (see “If You’re Not Guilty, Don’t Act Like It,” *MENDON-HONEOYE FALLS-LIMA SENTINEL*, November 9, 2017). There are probably more stories to tell. If

something happens to trigger my memory, I’ll happily share them.

But this story is more about the end of the line in the other direction: the return home. Going to the school bus stop represented an invigorating crescendo of the day’s coming excitement. Even cold winter winds couldn’t deprive us of our enthusiasm.

And those winds were cold. Very cold. How cold? Imagine thirty-odd elementary school children huddled en masse, as close to the brick walls of the small house on the corner of the street, desperately trying to retain as much communal heat as possible.

At the end of the day, however, we got off the bus only to have the immediate reality of the hike home hit us like a ton of those cold bricks. With each house we passed, we’d lose a few more kids. They’d be home. They’d be done for the day. But Kenny and I had miles more to travel (actually, tenths of a mile, but for our small legs, it might as well have been miles).

The worst feeling came midway to our terminus. That’s when Angelo and Markie “got off the train.” I could still see Angelo’s eyes, stricken with sorrowful guilt, knowing he was leaving us on our own.

Not quite. Remember, our next-door neighbors had to walk almost as far as us, but they stuck to their respective packs and, being older and with longer strides, were well ahead of us by that point. Angelo, Markie, Kenny, and me. We were our own pack. And when Angelo and Markie peeled off for their front door, it was like Kenny and I ventured forth alone into some barren wasteland.

From that point, we would invariably pick up our pace. Kenny more than me. His legs were shorter than mine back then, so he had to spin the gears faster than me just to keep up.

The last tenth of a mile was eerily quiet. These houses had

older folks. Their kids had long ago grown up and moved out. But that wasn’t the worst of it. Immediately after those homes, and right before the last few houses at the road’s dead

end, lay three empty overgrown lots straddling the not-so-wide street.

It was here, when I was in kindergarten and before Kenny walked shotgun beside me, that I once saw a giant sewer rat waddle across the road in front of me. The sewers were open back then and, from that point on, I always hesitated at that spot in the road, looked both ways, then scurried through that rat path.

I never told Kenny about the rat until years later. In fact, at the time, I insisted I had seen a possum.

It wasn’t a possum. I knew it. My father knew it. We just didn’t want my little brother (or mother, for that matter) to know it.

For all the anxiety held within those last few footsteps, walking into our raised ranch home returned us to that elevated joy that we had in the morning. For one thing, our mother was there to greet us. But she wasn’t the only one.

Before we unloaded our school gear (you know what I’m talking about: book bags, lunch boxes, change pouches), we rushed to the TV and quickly turned to Channel 7. We always got home before 3:30pm but we didn’t want to risk missing the familiar refrain signaling the start of *The Commander Tom Show*.

The Commander Tom Show was the afternoon bookend of our before-school/after-school TV day. It started each morning with *Rocketship 7*. Oh, how we yearned to have Dave Thomas call out our names on our birthday or other special day and say, “Go look under your bed for something special.” Alas, it was a desire never realized.

Not that it would have meant anything. No matter what pleasant surprise was hidden under the bed, we would have still had to begin the half-mile hike up Abbott Parkway on our way to school.

Unlike *Rocketship 7*, however, there was no duty to perform following *The Commander Tom Show*. The affable Tom Jolls possessed precisely the right character to keep us entertained and smiling until just before dinnertime. Heck, if it wasn’t for Commander Tom, how would we have ever been introduced to *The Adventures of Superman*, *Flash Gordon*, and the Three Stooges? (OK, that last one aired on Saturday mornings, so we got an extra dose every once in a while from *The Commander Tom Show*.) In the 1970s, he added other shows, but we had moved to Rochester by then and couldn’t get Channel 7 on our TV very well.

Before the opening theme started, Kenny and I nestled ourselves either directly on the floor in front of the TV or on the couch a safe distance away. Very quickly, the debate began. Was Tom Jolls voicing the puppet Dustmop? Was it his hand moving the puppet’s mouth?

These are important questions when you’re not quite seven years old.

By the way, for those of you keeping score at home, the opening theme of *The Commander Tom Show* was a song called “Dancing Notes.” It appears at the 10:45 mark on the YouTube video of “The Exciting Sound of Acquaviva and His Orchestra.” The Decca album was released in 1963, two years before the December 20, 1965 debut of *The Commander Tom Show*.

Commander Tom, both in his actions and in the short old-time serials intermingled throughout his 90 minutes of air time, taught us important lessons in life. Some serious (“do a good deed”) and some healthy (“salubrious”). His promotion of the idea that kids could hold their own Muscular

Dystrophy carnival inspired me to convince the kids on my street (after we had moved to Rochester) to hold an annual summer carnival.

They lived in Rochester, so they never heard of Commander Tom. That made them different from every other kid from Toronto, Canada, to Erie, Pennsylvania. *The Commander Tom Show* was an after-school treat. Even Betsy (who grew up in Jamestown) has fond memories of it (as well as Dave Thomas and *Rocketship 7*). It was a delight every school-age kid within the viewing area looked forward to after a long day in the classroom. And Commander Tom never disappointed us.

Tom Jolls, a.k.a. “Commander Tom” also served as the weatherman in Buffalo’s famous Eyewitness News triumvirate. He’s probably the reason I became so interested in meteorology. Together with news anchor Irv Weinstein and sports director Rick Azar, the three ruled the news broadcast airwaves in the Queen City.

On June 7, 2023, Jolls, the last surviving member of these three icons, passed away at Buffalo Hospice in Cheektowaga. A native of Newfane (just north of Lockport, NY), he was 89 years old.

He once said in an interview he had the entire run of *The Commander Tom Show* on tape. He showed it to his grandkids. Would that the kids of today had the same access to those archives. Who knows? Maybe fifty-odd years later, they, too, would remember what they looked forward to once they ambled into the house after trudging miles home from school. In a snowstorm. Uphill. Both ways.

Maybe, like me, they wouldn’t remember that odyssey as a burden.

Instead, they’d view it as nothing more than the last hurdle to overcome before relaxing to savor the best part of the day in the comfort and warmth of home and family.

Skiptunas organized the ceremony and read the proclamation. Along with Noto and his parents and siblings, Lima Town Supervisor Mike Falk, Honeoye Falls Village Mayor Rick Milne, Mendon Town Supervisor John Moffitt and Honeoye Falls-Lima Central School Superintendent Gene Mancuso were in attendance as well as representatives from State Assemblywoman Marge Byrnes’ office, State Senator Pam Helming’s office and U.S. Congresswoman Claudia Tenney’s office.

This year, he placed fourth at the NCAA Division 1 championships after winning his second consecutive individual MAC title at 125 pounds and posting a 34-4 record. He was named the Mid-American Conference Wrestler of the Year this year. He continues to give back to the community by organizing

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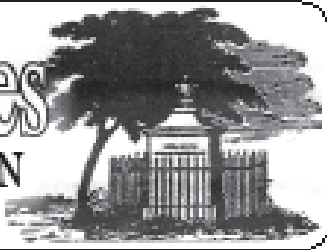

One man's memories of "Home"

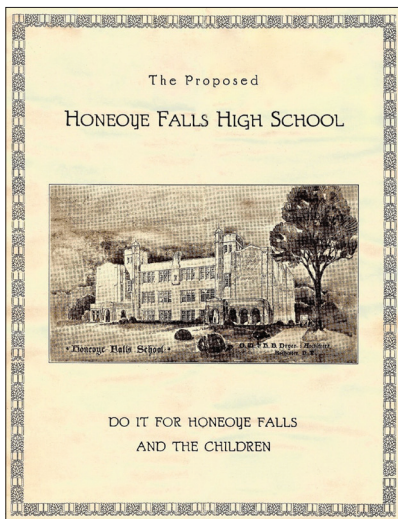
Part VI

At this festive time of year, with commencement exercises looming, Mr. News & Notes, this dweller in the past, harkens back 95 years to when Honeoye Falls' Village Hall was the venue for such joy. The year was 1928, when the mothers of two News classmates, Dorothy Snoddy and Pauline Jones, donned cap and gown and set out into the world.

The community would never be quite the same for, in 1929, the new complex at East and South Church had become the immediate epicenter of life for school and community. Aside from the Wall Street Crash late that year, (that brought on the Great Depression), the spiffy new school welcomed graduations, plays, sports... even a baseball field for a resurrected high school nine and the relocation of the vaunted Husky Farmers town team.

For over a century, downtown HF had been the place to go for diversion from the humdrum existence of agrarian life. Technically, all was not lost, since holiday parades, fairs, and concerts in the park (set up where the old Union school stood) continued to inject that small town feel into residents and visitors alike. Then again, perhaps it was just the sour times of the '30s that kept most folks close to home.

Moving through his 70s at the time, Irving Shuart paused to reflect on the "used to be," when the Wilcox Hotel (now the Masonic Temple) and two iterations of the Village Hall hosted traveling and local talent shows, and all manner of folk looking to make a buck on their talent or secure a vote on their promises. Concurrently, Mendon, with its Grange Hall, cobblestone schoolhouse, churches, and roadhouses, was (and some remain) lively at times. Karen Mireau, recent author of *Tell Me Again... the Mendon Poems*, is plumbing that project for details.

Road Companies Played Village in Years Past

I. J. Shuart, *Honeoye Falls Times*, September 8th, 1949

The old temperance melodrama, "Ten Nights in a Barroom," which has been recently reproduced at the *Pittsford Theatre*, is said to have been played for the first time in Rochester in 1864 (according to a copy of the *Rochester Union-Advertiser* on file at the *Rundel Library*).

It states that: "it was running nightly and won much favor. Patrons hiss the villain, and cheer the good people." This play came to Honeoye Falls when the writer was quite young, and was given by a traveling company in the ballroom of the Wilcox Hotel, there being no other place for it. I recollect that it drew a large attendance, despite the fact that there was no fire escape on the building, which necessitated going up two flights of stairs to get there, with a barroom on the ground floor!

There was at the time, a more or less local prejudice on the part of the church-going people as to attending shows at the hotel. Nevertheless, a good many went, since but few plays came here in those days. The hotel proprietor was "Jack" Sylvester Wilcox, who was a member of the village board and prominent in other ways (including providing the U.S. Government with cavalry horses during the Civil War). Check out the huge Wilcox marker in HF Cemetery.

One of the early arrivals here, after Zebulon Norton, was Samuel Sterling, who came in 1795 and located on a farm afterwards owned by Gilbert Graham. His son, Samuel P. Sterling, had a general store at the corner of Main and Monroe Streets for many years and his home was in the rear. I remember the store, but am not certain it was much more than a grocery, although it had an active trade with farmers in exchange for their products.

Mr. Sterling's daughter became the wife of Sylvester Wilcox and, having no

children, they lived in their rooms at the hotel until, finally, they built the house that is now the residence of Mayor William Despard on Monroe Street. (That handsome Victorian structure was razed in the 1960s... for a parking lot.)

When we consider the changes in recent years that have brought the movies and other forms of entertainment to the public, the melodramas and vaudeville shows appear remote and anachronistic. Yet it looks now as if they may be revived to some extent.

Dramatic Group Nothing New in Honeoye Falls

I. J. Shuart, *Honeoye Falls Times*, October 6th, 1949

After the present brick Methodist Church was built in 1875, the former white painted, frame structure was sold to be converted into the Village Hall. It had served since 1821 for religious services, Christmas entertainments and other events. With the change in ownership, the pew seats were replaced with chairs, and a platform stage was built at the rear of the building on the upper floor.

Quarters for Village Board meetings were arranged on the lower floor, other meetings were also held there, and the limited apparatus of the fledgling fire department was stored there. (When it burned in an 1885 conflagration, the present Village Hall was erected and included space for the fire department.)

Among the people who used the hall for public gatherings in that period, were those who attended the winter season of lectures given by prominent personalities and arranged by a bureau organized for that purpose. Among the local residents promoting these lectures were the Rev. S. A. Freeman, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, who faithfully served his

congregation for several years; a retired North Bloomfield Universalist Church minister, L. C. Brown; and Dr. Chambers, the Methodist pastor at that time and a man of much refinement.

The correspondence feature as to lecture candidates and other details was conducted by banker, A. M. Holden, who had a hand in many key civic affairs. Season tickets were offered and quite generally taken, not only by residents of this village, but also the surrounding towns.

Being that I was quite young at that period (born in 1860), I do not remember many of the lecturers, but among them were Lyman Abbott, Thomas K. Beecher and a Professor Willetta, who was interesting to young people. These professionals who came here were hosted by lecture patrons in

their homes. The series was repeated during several seasons and, no doubt, it tended to increase interest in cultural and public affairs.

Later on, the hall was used by the "Alpha Dramatic Club," a coterie of young people, several known in their married life to be Mr. and Mrs. William Kirkpatrick, Dr. and Mrs. Charles Otis, Mr. and Mrs. J. Leslie Weller (a dentist who later moved to Rochester), and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Jobes. Miss Etta Gardner, Miss Helen Johnson, Matt Pierce, Addison Holden and myself were also active.

As the histrionic ability of the actors was being developed, the club's first rendition was "Above the Clouds" (anticipating the 'aeroplane' era) which was well-attended and proved to be quite popular. Other plays, including "The Last Leaf," were given during the next few years and, from the proceeds (and not having to pay for the hall, except for heat and light), a drop curtain was procured, together with those for the wings, all of which were later donated to the village. The association was not exclusive, but we maintained a high social standard.



In 1886 (as with 1928, when the Honeoye Falls High School was erected), the *Village Hall* became an immediate hit with the public. Long since a ghostly specter now, that library-quiet performance hall teamed with every activity imaginable... including being a movie theatre AND the village's first official basketball court!

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HF-L boys track concludes season with third place at sectionals and good efforts at state qualifier

The Honeoye Falls-Lima Boys Varsity Track team had a great close to its season with top 10 performances in all of its events at sectionals and sending several representatives to Section V's Meet of Champions.

HF-L compiled 54 points for third at the Section V Class B1 Championships on May 26. Calvin Burke was the only event winner as he took the 3200 meters in 10 minutes, 13.59 seconds. He led a 1-3-7 finish by the Cougars in the event with Braden Bellizzi coming in third (10:19.50) and Drew Larsen seventh (10:39.74). Burke also took second in the 1600 meters at 4:32.29 while Bellizzi's time of 4:39.93 put him in third and Amer Armbruster's 5:23.80 was good for 12th place. Matt Ross clocked 2:02.60 for fourth in the 800 meters, followed by Riley Cushman in eighth (2:08.57), Henry Burke 11th (2:11.69) and Lukas Wilson 12th (2:13.74). Nolan Guckian, Nolan Tompsett, Armbruster and Wilson combined for third at 9:23.64 in the 3200 relay. Cushman claimed fourth with a time of 10:47.20 in the 3000 steeplechase and Henry Burke posted a 10:54.52 for fifth. Rhyan Garey accumulated 2,317 points for fourth in the pentathlon, winning the shot put event (35-9.5) and placing third in the 1500 meters (5:09.68), third in the 110 hurdles (18.30), eighth in the high jump (4-9.75) and eighth in the long jump (16-10.5). Sawyer Ferraro finished fifth at 1:00.79 in the 400 hurdles. Ferraro, Henry Burke, Calvin Burke and Ross teamed for fifth at 3:41.14 in the 1600 relay. Larsen soared 9 feet, 6 inches for seventh in the pole vault and Braeden Weaver also cleared that height, but needed more jumps to do so and finished eighth. Teammate Joseph Webster was 14th (8-6) in the pole vault. Ferraro, Eli Cleveland, Jonathan Clark and Trevor Lewis turned a time of 47.60 seconds for 10th in the 400 relay. Jack Wirth jumped 5 feet, 4 inches for 10th in the high jump.

"We had a really great day," coach Nolan Hoh said. "Overall, our strength was moving kids to events where their best ability was and where they would get points. On the distance side, Calvin and Braden being first and third in the 3200 meters and second and third in the 1600 meters was significant. Matt did well in the 800 meters, setting a personal record by two seconds. Riley had just done the steeplechase and came back with a good 800 time after hitting one of his knees on the steeplechase barrier and taking a tumble. Both Riley and Henry did quite well in the steeplechase. All three of our relays did well. Taking third in the 3200 was great because it was one of the first events and we were able to get points. The 1600 relay is the last event, so the boys were just trying to squeeze out the last bit of energy because by then it is 'Survival of the Fittest'. Our 400 relay has room to grow because

the four boys are a combination of sophomores and a freshman. We just wanted to get them exposure in a sectional event so they can get their feet wet for next year. The 400 hurdles were great for Sawyer who had a solid race to finish behind three seniors and a junior; so that is something to look forward to since he is only a sophomore. For Jack to take 10th in the high jump was a success for him because this is his first year on the track team and he was on the bubble as to whether he would even get into the sectional meet. All three of our pole vaulters did really well. Rhyan's fourth place in the pentathlon was a great way to finish up his high school career; it's one of the hardest events because it is a daylong thing and you need a lot of focus to complete it."

HF-L had competitors in seven events at the Meet of Champions, Section V's qualifier for the state championship, on June 2. Calvin Burke was second (9:48.10) and Bellizzi fourth (10:01.92) in the 3200 meters in the Division 2 (small schools division). The quartet of Ross, Calvin Burke, Henry Burke and Cushman clocked 8:35.67 for third in the 3200 relay. Bellizzi placed fourth at 4:34.05 in the 1600 meters. Cushman and Henry Burke went 4-5 in the 3000 steeplechase as Cushman clocked 10 minutes, 58.23 seconds and Burke 11 minutes, 1.09 seconds, respectively. Ross placed seventh in the 800 meters (2:03.35). Ferraro came in seventh at 1:00.77 in the 400 hurdles. Garey totaled 2,420 points for seventh in the pentathlon by winning the shot put and placing ninth in the 1500 meters, ninth in the 110 hurdles, ninth in the high jump and 11th in the long jump. None of the Cougars advanced to the state championship meet.

The Honeoye Falls-Lima Girls Varsity Track team had a fantastic conclusion to its 2023 season as the Lady Cougars took second at the Section V Class B1 Championship and then saw their 1600 relay team break a school record that has stood since 2002 at the Meet of Champions and then broke that with a sub-four minute time at the state championship.

HF-L captured second with 117 points at the Section V Class B1 Championships on May 26. Jayne Williams had quite a day in the sprint events as she won the 400 meters in 59.20 seconds, finished second in the 200 meters at 26.46 seconds and fourth in the 100 meters at 12.96 seconds. Rowan Considine was ninth (1:06.32) in the 400 meters. Cayla Lawrence won the 800 meters in 2 minutes, 22.25 seconds, followed by Oli Kraynik in third at 2 minutes, 25.38 seconds. Ava Bagley won the 400 hurdles at 1:04.54 with Schuyler Herbert fifth at 1:10.67, Brinley Cross seventh at 1:16.52, Amelia Somers ninth at 1:17.48, Ellen Burke 10th at 1:19.14 and Miaya Gould 14th at 1 minute, 21.29 seconds. Considine, Kraynik, Lawrence and Ava Bagley won the 1600 relay in 4 minutes, 6.10 seconds. Kraynik won the pole vault, soaring 9 feet, while Thea Ackerman tied for second at 9 feet in the event, needing more attempts at the height than Kraynik did. Kate Brennan was second (5:07.38), Natalie Gilbert fifth (5:29.29) and Anna Nikodem 10th (5:54.88)

in the 1500 meters. Brennan finished second at 11:17.23, Gilbert fifth at 11:51.65, Emma Rozzi seventh at 12:23.95, Nikodem eighth at 12:25.73 and Morgan Company 10th at 13:00.94 in the 3000 meters. Ava Bagley was second in the 100 hurdles in 15.61 seconds while Herbert came in sixth (18.13), Cross ninth (19.13), Burke 15th (20.34) and Gould 16th (20.99). Gilbert, Nikodem, Rozzi and Elianna Davis posted an 11:13.48 for third in the 3200 relay. Williams, Ava Bagley, Lawrence and Madeline Mehring clocked 51.08 seconds for fourth in the 400 relay. Ackerman came in 10th at 4-3 in the high jump. Mehring was 11th (14-5.5), Katelynn Vukosic 14th (14-3) and Considine 15th (13-11.5) in the long jump. Lawrence finished ninth by covering 31 feet, 6.5 inches in the triple jump and Mehring followed in 10th at 30-6 and Considine 13th at 29-4. Kathryn Gabrielsen unleashed a throw of 78-3 for seventh, Ella Heminway a 75-7 for 10th and Bria Torpey a 71-4 for 13th in the discus. Kayla Wells compiled 1,644 points for sixth in the pentathlon after placing third in the high jump (4-4), sixth in the 800 meters (2:54.66), sixth in the 100 hurdles (19.83), seventh in the shot put (19-9.5) and eighth in the long jump (11-7.75).

"The sectional performances were awesome," coach Terra Sheridan said. "There were just some outstanding performances. We were thinking third place going into the meet. Second place was

The Honeoye Falls-Lima Boys Varsity Lacrosse team saw its tremendous 2023 season come to a close in the New York State Public High School Athletic Association semifinals, but it certainly doesn't diminish what the team accomplished this year.

HF-L bowed 13-5 to Jamesville-DeWitt (from the Syracuse area) in the state Class C semifinals on June 9. J-D scored the first three goals of the game within a two-minute span to take a 3-0 lead with 6:58 remaining in the first quarter. HF-L junior Drew Angelo broke that scoreless drought on a goal with 6:46 left in the period and junior Chase Perryman notched the team's second goal only 46 seconds later to pull the squad to within 3-2. J-D had a pair of goals less than a minute apart to restore the three-goal lead to 5-2. Mathew Brassie narrowed the gap to 5-3 with 3:54 left off a feed from Perryman. J-D tallied a goal for a 6-3 lead before Grady Goodberlet ripped a shot into the net with an assist from Perryman. The Cougars trailed 6-4 at the end of the quarter. J-D popped the ball into the net three times in the second quarter to take a 9-4 advantage at halftime. Braydn Trybuskiewicz broke the scoring drought of nearly 20 minutes with the Cougars' final goal with 6:14 to play in the third quarter to bring the team within 9-5. That was as close as the Cougars got, however. J-D recorded one goal in the third quarter for a 10-5 lead heading into the final stanza and concluded the game with three goals in the last nine minutes of the game.

Perryman finished with one goal and two assists, Angelo one goal, Brassie one goal, Goodberlet one goal and Trybuskiewicz one goal. Angelo, who reached his 800th faceoff for his career, won 13 faceoffs and had 10 ground balls. Patrick Donahoe scooped up three ground balls with one take. Trybuskiewicz picked up three ground balls. Defenseman Ben Cook contributed

two ground balls and two takes and defenseman Donnell Hall two ground balls. Brassie added one ground ball and Marco Vengoechea one ground ball. Goalie Trevor Reese made nine saves and had one ground ball.

"After they went ahead 3-0, we called a timeout," HF-L coach Eric Goodberlet said. "We refocused and got two goals, but J-D regained momentum with their two goals. They have a couple of good attackmen and they really seized momentum in that second quarter. In the third quarter, we battled hard and had some opportunities to score, but their goalie made some big saves. The biggest thing was they really pressured our middies and our attackmen. On defense, we only had three takes because they are good ball-handlers. Our primary goal was a sectional championship, so getting to the state semifinals was a bonus. It's been a great season for the boys and I am really proud of this group of kids; the loss in the state semis doesn't take away from our season as a whole."

HF-L finished with a 15-5 record. Four seniors graduate.

Donnell Hall played on varsity for two years with this being his first year as a starter. Hall switched from midfielder to defenseman this season and had one assist, 42 ground balls and 15 takes.

John Irvine was on varsity for two seasons. Irvine was a reserve midfielder and had three goals coming off the bench this spring.

Trybuskiewicz produced two goals and three assists, Kidd two goals, Blythe two goals, Green one goal and one assist and Adams one assist. Brady handled eight saves. Adams and Green both won five draw controls with one ground ball apiece. Kidd won three draw controls. Ruff added two ground balls and one caused turnover, Caroline Smith two ground balls and one caused turnover, Lawrence one ground ball and two caused turnovers and Trybuskiewicz one ground ball and one caused turnover.

"We had great movement with the ball and our offense just clicked," O'Connell said. "Lily played really well with some big saves in the last seven minutes of the game. Our difficult regular season schedule prepares the girls for this time of year."

HF-L had no trouble getting to the New York State Public High School Athletic Association Class C semifinals as they blew out Section VI Class C champion Lakeshore 22-9 in the state quarterfinal game on June 3. Kidd scored the first goal and Lakeshore tied the game at 1-1, then went ahead 2-1. Angelo scored the first of eight straight HF-L goals to put the Cougars in the driver's seat for good. Lakeshore scored to make it 9-3, but the Cougars closed out the first half on a 7-2 run for a 16-5 halftime advantage. In the second half, HF-L's starters scored several more goals before the reserves came in to finish out the game. Ruff collected seven goals, Kidd four goals and two assists, Angelo three goals and three assists, Adams two goals, Bennett two goals, Green one goal, Blythe one goal, Anna DeClerck one goal and Caroline Smith one assist. Brady made four saves and McLaughlin did not need to make a save in the final 15 minutes of the game. Kidd won eight draw controls, Adams four draw controls with one ground ball, Bennett three draw controls with one ground ball, Caroline Smith one draw control with one ground ball and one caused turnover and DeClerck one draw control. Lyndsey Zuber picked up two ground balls with two caused turnovers, Ruff one ground ball with one caused turnover, Angelo one ground ball and one caused turnover, Green one ground ball, Elizabeth Smith one ground ball, Sarah Smith one ground ball and Peinkofer one caused turnover.

"Lakeshore was 19-0 coming into the game, but their Buffalo-area opponents don't play the type of lacrosse that we have here in Section V," O'Connell said. Town & Village Update

Mayor, Supervisor Weekly Update As Of Friday, June 9th Lima Award, Henrietta Golf Course, New HF Summer Hours

Town of Henrietta

Stephen Schultz, Supervisor:

"We have a couple temple dedications or rededications. The first one is Saturday, June 10th. It's at the Wat Pa Lao Temple on Martin Road and the Laotian Ambassador to the United States is expected to be in attendance. Basically, they expanded the temple, so this is essentially the dedication and celebration of that new temple."

"In addition, the Hindu Temple of Rochester is rededicating their temple, and I will not try to pronounce the Hindu name for this celebration. It's far more syllables, and I will just horribly butcher it. But that is on Wednesday, the 21st. It's largely an all day event. Once every 12 years they rededicate the temple. This is the second time that they're having the celebration."

"So that's exciting, a couple temples in Town. As we've talked about before, Henrietta has a very diverse population. I think I've mentioned that we adopted a new slogan 'A Town For All'. We recently had a multicultural celebration. So, having these temples right within our Town is great to be able to serve those portions of our population."

"We have a number of new projects for the Town itself going on. So, we started our new lighting for the Memorial Park ball fields. We've finalized the plans for fields A and B and in fact for field B, we're converting from what is currently kind of a softball diamond slash football field. The football field is kind of squeezed in the outfield. We're actually going to eliminate the diamond itself and replace it with a multi-purpose football/soccer/lacrosse field that will be lit and does have a scoreboard. That will also help with the Fourth of July, because the infield is kind of in the middle of the celebration. It makes it difficult to send the food trucks around with the ball fences and the backstop. In addition, we have to typically fence that whole thing off, or else kids run around and kick up the ton of dust that lands downwind in people's picnic basket."

"So, that'll be a nice conversion. That's again just getting under way, and we're going to be replacing it all with new LED higher energy, efficient and dark sky compliant fixtures. For the new basketball, tennis and pickle ball courts, we expanded the existing courts to add eight new pickle ball courts. Unfortunately, the fencing is back ordered. We were hoping to have it up in place before the Fourth of July. But that's not going to happen but we're doing the lighting there as well, so there'll be new lighting for that. So, we're excited about that moving forward."

"As I may have mentioned in the past, we're in the process of taking over operation of the municipal golf course. In the past, it was always operated by a family on an adjacent property. There's been a legal snag in terms of us taking over operation. We're not actually operating the course this year. We're using that downtime. In fact, this week we have resolutions to purchase the new sand, gravel, sod and irrigation necessary to redo all the problem sand traps. We're redoing a bunch of the irrigation. There's a couple culverts that need to be replaced. So, basically, work that would be problematic if there were golfers about. We're doing that now, while there's no golfers. Don't be surprised when you start to see heavy equipment out on the golf course."

"And then, finally, projects that developers are bringing to us. We have a new senior housing project that's up for a Special Use Permit hearing. I've reached out to the developer to try to encourage them to make one of the buildings more deaf friendly, since we have a large, deaf, and hard of hearing population in Town. So, you know, hopefully, one of the units will be wired with strobes, both from an emergency standpoint, but also from a doorbell standpoint."

"That's about it."

Town of Mendon

John Moffitt, Supervisor:

"Thanks. Just a quick reminder to everybody about upcoming summer rec and if you haven't signed up for summer rec, there is still an opportunity. There is a late fee that went into effect recently. But it's not too late to sign up."

"The Military Memorial Dedication was on Sunday, June 11th. We want to thank everyone who attended that memorial and appreciate the community's support throughout that dedication and the remembrance of those three servicemen who were tragically killed in the Town of Mendon."

"Our Splash Park opened on May 29th. The weatherman must have known what day we planned to open it because the temperature went right to 80 degrees. We had a huge number of people there to enjoy it. We did receive some complaints about the slippery surface and, as somebody who grew up with a swimming pool in the backyard and had to be reminded more than once as a child, and probably even beyond my childhood, not to run. I did remind people to not run, but there were still complaints beyond that. So, we're shut down right now. We shut down because of the Military Memorial dedication. But, also, we're having the engineer look over the surface and determine what is our best course of direction going forward as far as the surface of that park."

"On Semmel Road, there was some discussion about the tennis courts there and adding pickle ball lines there. For those of you don't know, the Town of Mendon has dual courts. Both pickle ball and tennis on 251 Rush-Mendon Road in Mendon Center. The two courts over at Semmel Road are tennis only. We had some requests to make those pickle ball as well, and received quite a bit of information from the tennis players in the Town of Mendon how they would like to just keep those two courts for tennis only. So, the Town Board will be considering that going forward."

"The Mendon Carnival was a big success. I was there working at one of the concession stands, and as advertised, it was one of the best three days in Mendon."

"I want to thank everybody who attended the Memorial Day ceremonies that we had both in the Town and the Village. Appreciate all that. Our next Town Board meeting is June 12th. We have four local laws that are under consideration for the Town Board, and I expect that the Town Board will take action to either ratify or deny those four local laws."

"Lastly, I want to remind everyone, as did my counterpart, Mayor Milne about speed. We're getting to the end of school year. I know there's a lot of students driving. There's also a lot of people speeding who aren't students. Please be aware of the speed limits throughout the Town and the Village. Please be aware of people who are now on their bicycles, on their motorcycles, walking on the shoulders of the roads, etc. Please be aware of all that, and we appreciate your patience throughout this time of year."

"Lastly, for the Village, and really the community in general, this week the Canadian wildfire smoke has been quite strong within the area. While it appears to be minimizing a bit now, the fires still rage, and with the wind change, it certainly may continue to impact us. The concern for one's health really centers around the heavy particulates within the smoke. These fires are burning much hotter than campfires, and there's really no comparison at all to what we're experiencing versus campfires that you might have at your home or camp. The heavy particulates from the fire and its fuel are then compounded by other pollutants in the air. This can truly be harmful to many in many of our areas. There is an app called airnow.gov, which you may want to take a look at, and that does have some up-to-date air quality measurements. If people want or need masks, the Village does still have some available, and we will look to get more if needed. We continue to monitor this air quality in our area to the best we can. But, at the end of the day, if you feel

"Thanks for having us again. Back on Tuesday, June 6th, the Lima Town Board held a public hearing regarding the school resource officer issue—the proposed 3 way split between HF-L, LCS, and the Town of Lima to place a resource officer here at Lima Primary, Lima Christian School, and here within the Town. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Town Board did approve the one-year contract for the 3-way split. Prior to that, of course, Lima Christian School had also approved that. "Livingston County has seen a reduction in overdoses due to the opioid crisis. Law enforcement agencies using Narcan and first responders using Narcan is a big part of that. But some of it is the other programs. New York State keeps track. They let us know that we're doing well. Overdoses involving opioids resulted in nearly 70,000 deaths in 2020 nationwide, 82% of those being with synthetic opioids. All in all, 932,000 people have died in the last 25 years from a drug overdose, 75% of those involved in opioid. If you would like to learn more about the local programs and support options, the Livingston County Health Department website is the place to go or give them a call at (585) 243-7520."

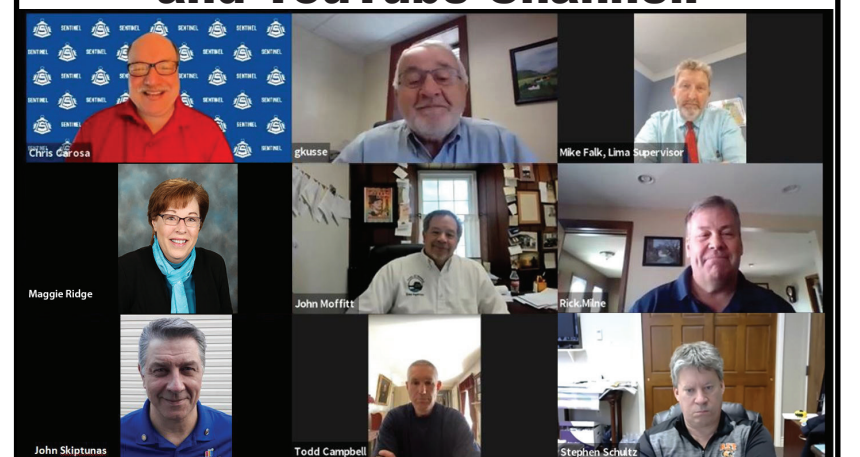

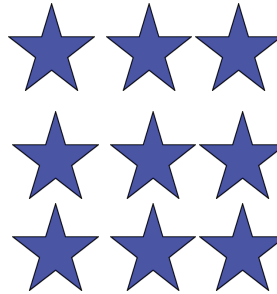

Beginning on June 19th, 2023, the Village of Lima will be conducting leakage testing on the sanitary sewer system located within the Village. This test is being conducted as part of a study to locate and identify areas of ground and surface water entering the Sanitary Sewer System. This effort will help to reduce sanitary sewer flow volumes and operating costs at the Waste Water Treatment Facility. It is anticipated that this testing will take approximately two weeks and end on June 29th, 2023.

During the test, a non-toxic smoke will be blown into the sanitary sewer system to reveal leaks where storm water and surface waters may be entering the sewer. The smoke that is utilized for this testing is manufactured specifically for this purpose, and it leaves no residual odor or stains, and has no adverse affect on plants or animals. It does have a distinctive, but not unpleasant, temporary odor. The visible smoke and odor only lasts a few minutes, where ventilation is adequate.

To conduct the test, smoke will be introduced at specific sanitary sewer manholes located on the streets. During the test, personnel will conduct a visual observation along streets and around individual homes, for smoke exiting storm sewers, roof gutters, and other areas which may be connected to the sanitary sewer system.

Smoke should not enter your home unless the plumbing is defective or if your home contains drains which are infrequently used. Several days prior to June 19th, 2023, please pour or run water down all drains in your home or building to assure that drain traps are filled and in working order.

OUR ROLLICKING ROLLER COASTER RIDE THROUGH LOCAL AMUSEMENT PARKS

SEABREEZE PARK

This week we will continue our tour of local amusement parks picking things up in the early 1920's at Sea Breeze which, by the way, is the 4th longest operating amusement park in the U.S. and the 12th in the world. By 1922 Jack Kirby had arrived at the park, assuming the manager's role for the Jack Rabbit (roller coaster) and the Old Mill (boat ride), two attractions which he would eventually purchase. Faced with the necessity of rebuilding the Jack Rabbit after the fire of 1923, and in the best example we can think of regarding a man taking his job seriously, Kirby invoked a most novel approach. He built a home for himself and his family literally underneath the roller coaster using the same wooden framework to support both his house and the ride.

Here's how the website coasterpedia.net describe the nuances of this unique initiative. "In 1923, following the fire at the Jack Rabbit, Jack Kirby (associate of George Long and Owner and operator of Jack Rabbit at the time) constructed a new home for his family directly below the reconstructed lift hill of the roller coaster. The home and the roller coaster shared a major support beam and were connected. Kirby built the home up at various stages and by 1948 it featured a living room, music room, breakfast nook, kitchen, dining room, bathroom, and 3 bedrooms on the first level. On the basement level a laundry room, bedroom, office, and children's play area filled the space. Alongside the home was the workshop where park owner George Long and Kirby worked together to keep operations running smoothly."

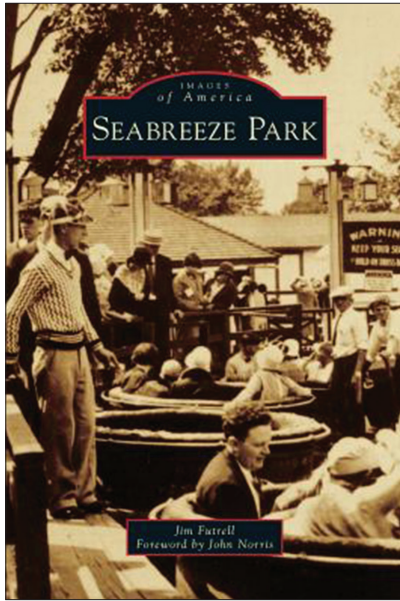
Our thoughts on this scenario... if there were ever a family that needed a white noise machine, the Kirbys must have risen to the top of that list. A 1948 *D&C* article which intricately details 17 different rooms in the house probably makes it seem bigger than it actually was. But any way you draw it up, the house built under and into the framework of a roller coaster has to be one of the more unique storylines in our tour of local amusement parks.

Jack Kirby lived with his family of five in that house until moving out in 1972. The house remained there until the winter of 1982-1983 when it was finally razed. Talk about a great place for your next haunted house... the ghosts that must still stroll that site!

MID-1900'S - Leaving the Kirby story thread in the rear view, let's return to the 1930's when Sea Breeze almost didn't make it through the Great Depression. It would be in the year 1935 that the park would hit rock bottom. The "Park of Rides" that once had four roller coasters was down to one, and the number of attractions dwindled as did business. When it comes down to it, when you have to choose between feeding your family or riding the Jack Rabbit, you choose to feed your family.

When George Long Jr. became park manager, he undertook a major effort to revitalize the park. He added new family attractions throughout the 1940's and 1950's bringing new life to the park. Going back to the "name game" delineation we explained at the beginning of the article, from 1939-1974 the name of the park was changed to "Dreamland Park." Right now let's defer to Historian Kevin Dorey for his explanation regarding the mid-70's rebranding.

"It turned out that relatively few people knew the place as Dreamland. They always called it Sea Breeze Park!

Marketing research in the 1970's confirmed this: a statistically significant number of people had no idea where Dreamland Park was, but they WERE familiar with Sea Breeze Park - and they were the same place! So the decision was made in the mid-1970's to rename the park Seabreeze, a single word to differentiate it from the resort area (Sea Breeze) but to tie back into the park's roots."

WATER AND FIRE - The 1980's would bring water to the park and the 1990's would bring fire. It was 1986 when the Bermuda Triangle Body Flume Waterslides were introduced as Seabreeze's first water attraction. In the decades since, the water component of the park has exponentially expanded to include a wide variety of attractions for adults as well as children with the addition of Kiddie Slides (1988), Lazy River (1990), tube slides (1990 & 1992) and wave pool (2001).

When the water attractions returned to Sea Breeze it was the first time swimming came to the park since the closure of the Natatorium in 1935. We'd like to defer to Kevin Dorey again at this point who wrote for us the following explanation... "The Natatorium was the largest in-land (i.e. not on the shore) salt water swimming pool in the country with the dimensions of a football field; it was a beautiful and ornate facility - one could write a book just about the Natatorium!"

So there's your water... but what about the fire we promised? That would tragically come on March 31, 1994 when a maintenance mishap during the retarring of a roof would lead to the fire that burned down much of the northwest quadrant of the park. The losses included an arcade building, shooting gallery, the Goofy House, historical artifacts, maintenance buildings and most tragically of all, the 1915 Philadelphia Toboggan Company carousel which the Long family operated.

As you might expect from this family who had spent almost a century at Seabreeze, the Longs set out to

recreate the carousel. They started by investing \$300,000 in a new carousel building that was 42-feet tall and 86-feet wide. Then the next phase was to call upon the family's traditional background of craftsmanship and build a new carousel from scratch. The labor of love would be a two-year project resulting in the creation of the Long family's 9th carousel. The new attraction would spin into action when the park reopened in the spring of 1996, the park opening on May 4, followed by the carousel opening on June 1.

MODERN ERA - While fireworks were a summer staple for various Seabreeze events, an additional show that might have been fun to see during that sultry summer of 1996 would have been when the park accountant opened the first RG&E bill of the season. The new carousel was wired with 1,170 lights of blazing glory! Park owner and vice-president John Norris, who is obviously keeping an eye on the bills, personally shared the "FYI" with us that the bulbs were converted to LED in 2022.

Seabreeze has continued to grow and prosper in the 21st century. One example of how everything old can become new again is that live shows are once again part of the program at the park, as was the case in the early 20th century. As of 2005, beginning the third week in June when the park opens daily, there is an acrobatic "Cirque-En-Vol" acrobatic show presented at center stage in the park.

That being said, park VP John Norris did want us to mention that a variety of live acts performed on the park stage and center lawn area from the 1940 through 2005 which included everything from alligator wrestling to circus acts.

ROLLER COASTER ROUNDUP

- Returning to our theme of roller coasters which is the thread running throughout this series, here's a quick overview of the four roller coaster options you'll be looking at when you make your summer sojourns to Seabreeze this season. As your family progresses through the possibilities, you can start out with the Bear Trax, a coaster built for the kids.

Next, you'll probably want to move onto the Bobsleds, a family-sized coaster that traverses a track 1,245 feet long and 31-feet high. This one was the brainchild of owner George Long Jr. after a 1961 visit to Disneyland where he was inspired by that park's Matterhorn Bobsleds and its tubular steel track. According to Kevin Dorey, "The Matterhorn Bobsleds at Disneyland was the first coaster to ever use a tubular steel track and the Seabreeze Bobsleds was the second! Today that is the standard used on most steel coasters."

Then you should venture forth to Seabreeze's newest roller coaster, the Whirlwind which came to the park in 2004. This ride features spinning

cars and a 5-story swooping drop, an 85° banked turn, and multiple twists, turns, and spirals. And, of course, your final move should be to hop on over to the Jack Rabbit, where you can't help but feel the history reverberating through your body the instant you climb into your coaster car.

This classic wooden roller coaster covers 2,150 feet of track featuring a spectacular spine-tingling 75-foot drop, awesome amazing dips, a wild and woolly last curve and a fantastic finale through a dark tunnel. It makes us feel like we're 15 years old again just typing this description up!

So right now we will appropriately wrap up our Seabreeze sojourn with our final salute to the Jack Rabbit, that revered ride of roller coaster royalty. In 2020 the Jack Rabbit celebrated its 100th anniversary, however Seabreeze was closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The ride operated on multiple occasions for park staff and family friends, maintaining its record as the oldest continuously operating roller coaster in North America. In 2021 the Jack Rabbit was able to appropriately celebrate its centennial... at the ripe old age of 101. Sometimes the best things are worth waiting for.

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
